### Resurgence of the Bald Eagles

By now everyone has heard the great news of a nesting pair of Bald Eagles on the Toronto islands and along the shores of Lake Ontario. Equally important encouraging the reports coming from areas around the waters Southern Georgian Bay, and specifically here along the Beaver River watershed.

Historically they were common relatively Ontario, southern especially along the shores of the Great Lakes, but this population was wiped out

60 years ago. Farmers in their quest to protect their crops in agriculture began using the insecticide Dichloro-Diphenyl-Trichloroethane (DDT). It permeated the food chain of wildlife, including the Bald Eagle and affected the quality of eggs it was laying. The egg shells were very thin when forming and were breaking during brooding. With the Bald Eagle being added to the "Endangered Species List" in 1967, the banning of DDT in 1972, and the addition of rehabilitation programs, we are now seeing their numbers increasing and returning to historical ecological territories in both Canada and the US.

For me, a landscape and wildlife artist living in Thornbury, it has been a thrill to watch a pair of bald eagles make their home along the Beaver River. My observations of this pair of bald eagles over the past three and half years have revealed both disappointment and success as they settle in this watershed. In the spring of 2021, Canada Geese entertained themselves in the eagles' nest,





destroyed what was there and caused them to abandon their efforts.

There was anger as the pair chased after these intruders.

The following year they once again made another attempt and were successful this time in raising one eaglet as a result of both consistently guarding the nest. The eaglet learned to fly first by travelling from branch to branch within the nesting tree and now still frequents the area in which it was raised.

At the end of 2023 this pair of eagles once again changed their behavior by building another

### **APRIL 8, 2024**

A solar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes between Earth and the Sun, thereby obscuring the view of the Sun from a small part of Earth, totally or partially. Such an alignment occurs approximately every six months, during the eclipse season in its new moon phase, when the Moon's orbital plane is closest to the plane of Earth's orbit. In a total eclipse, the disk of the Sun is fully obscured by the Moon. In partial and annular eclipses, only part of the Sun is obscured. Unlike a lunar eclipse, which may be viewed from anywhere on the night side of Earth, a solar eclipse can only be viewed from a relatively small area of the world. As such, although total solar eclipses occur somewhere on Earth every 18 months on average, they recur at any given place only once every 360 to 410 years.

Looking directly at the photosphere of the Sun (the bright disk of the Sun itself), even for just a few seconds, can cause permanent damage to the retina of the eye, because of the intense visible and invisible radiation that the photosphere emits. This damage can result in impairment of vision, up to and including blindness. The retina has no sensitivity to pain, and the effects of retinal damage may not appear for hours, so there is no warning that injury is occurring.



### What Is Earth Day?

The first Earth Day was celebrated in 1970, April 22nd, when a United States senator from Wisconsin organized a national demonstration to raise awareness about environmental issues. Rallies took place across the country and, by the end of the year, the U.S. government had created the Environmental Protection Agency. By 1990, Earth Day was an event celebrated by more than 140 countries around the globe.

Today, not only is Earth Day meant to increase awareness of environmental problems, but it is also becoming a popular time for many communities to gather together to clean up litter, plant trees, or simply reflect on the beauty of nature.

nest in the same general area which is unusual. This spring they are both actively exchanging duties consistently sitting on the eggs, the female more so, with the male continuing to reinforce the nest. The eagle that was raised in 2023 has flown over the new nest, but has made no attempt to enter while the male parent sits perched nearby.

This spring a new Solo Art Exhibition of my work will be on display at The Meaford Hall Arts and Cultural Centre gallery starting on April 13 to May 12, with a reception from 1:00 p.m to 3:00 pm on April 13, 2024. There will be about 30 paintings, sculptures and drawings available for purchase.

Most works created are based on observations in the field, specifically, one of the new paintings depicting the conflict that occured in 2021 with Canada Geese.

- 1. Support Our Pollinators!
  Bring native bees and other pollinating creatures to your garden.
  One way to do this is by selecting the right plants this season with pollinator-friendly plants.
- 2. Clean Up in Your Neighborhood or Local Park
  Go on a walk with a trash bag and help to clean up any garbage
  that you find. Perhaps you know of a nearby ditch or drainage area
  around the corner that is polluted with trash!
- 3. Swap Out Your Kitchen and Household Products!

  Think 100% recycled aluminum foil, toxic-free parchment paper for baking, compostable bags made with potato starch, and even vegetable-based inks for their packaging.

#### 4. Plant a Tree!

We love our trees! They capture carbon, cool overheated places, benefit agriculture, support pollinators, reduce the risk of disease transmission, and boost local economies. Did you know that planting one oak tree brings in more insect and bird species than an entire yard of plants?

5. Use Wildflowers and Native Plants

Wildflowers and indigenous species are not only beautiful but also attract native and beneficial insects that improve both pest control and pollination—meaning bigger flowers and better harvests. Try to simply add a couple of native plants to your garden each year, and you'll be amazed at the difference—they'll bring in pollinators as well as birds!

- Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle
   Caring about yourself and nature means being less wasteful and saving money, too.
- 7. Stop Pesticide and Chemical Use in the Garden Much of this is simply about focusing less on the plant and more on the health of the soil that supports the plant. If it's nutrient-rich with organic matter, plants thrive.

You don't need chemicals to get rid of pesky garden pests: Companion planting, natural remedies, and attracting predators to your garden can save you money and also save your plants.

#### 8. Conserve Water!

Avoid watering your garden vegetables and plants from overhead, which invites fungal disease. Water at the soil level.

For gardens, flower beds, trees, and other non-lawn areas, consider installing a drip irrigation system or hose with irrigation holes that puts the water right into the soil, where you want it. If you must use sprinklers, put them on timers.

Harvest your rainwater from a roof, gutters, and sky with a rain barrel. If you have a low-lying area, consider planting a rain garden, which captures runoff, filters out pollutants, and provides food and shelter for butterflies, songbirds, and other wildlife.

### 9. Think About Your Diet!

About one-third of the food that we produce every year goes to waste annually! Usually, this happens after we buy the food. How do we avoid waste in our own lives (and save money)?

#### 10. Get Kids Involved!

Pass down a love of nature and plants to kids. There are lots of opportunities for hands-on learning experiences outside.

After a rapid decline in health, Anthony "Tony" Bauer passed away peacefully in the early hours of March 22, 2024, to the sound of music he loved with caring people by his side in his 99th year.

Tony was born in Vienna, Austria in 1926, where he met his first wife Ilona (née Harrer) after he returned from being interned for several months in a Soviet Prisoner of War Camp in 1945. They spent 3 years in Switzerland and soon after returning to Vienna they emigrated to Canada – the land of opportunities - landing

in Halifax in 1952. From there, with \$80 in their pockets, some luggage, and a baby they made their way to Toronto where they settled to begin their new life. Tony quickly learned English and after several jobs from working in a car wash to serving tables, he opened Bauer Custom Shirts in downtown Toronto. He discovered the Blue Mountains in the late 50's and built the family cottage in the early 60's. Tony loved the area – the clean air, mountains, and everything that Georgian Bay had to offer. He was hooked.

He spent his winters skiing in the early days of Blue Mountains and in the late 60's Tony was one of the sailing enthusiasts who formed the Reef Boat Club as part of the 1967 Centennial celebrations. In the late 70's, Tony made Thornbury his home where he became a tireless volunteer and an integral part of the community.

Tony kept busy over the years; he opened Bauer Realty, co-founded the Thornbury BIA, was President of the Chamber of Commerce for 2 terms, co-founded the Georgian Triangle Development Institute, was a Rotarian for 30 years, co-founded the Georgian Sound Big Band Festival which later became Jazzmania and eventually morphed into Thornbury Jazzworks. The proceeds of the many concerts he arranged put close to \$30,000 into student music initiatives like the BVCS Music Department. He started the Lois F. Legge Music Scholarship Award in the early 2000's and most recently established the Doreen Norris Music Fund both of which benefit music students. In 2022 he was named Senior of the Year.

Tony was predeceased by his son Anthony "Tony" Charles (2012) and is survived by his son Peter and his daughter Sylvia, his 7 grandchildren: Anna (Paul), Lauren (Arlene), Nick (Vanessa), Tony (Erika), Fabian, Peter, Elektra and 7 great grandchildren: Liam, Dylan, Mia, Devon, Zekhari, Vera and August.







### Notice of Public Information Centre Bay Street East Reconstruction

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public of an upcoming virtual Public Information Centre (PIC) that has been scheduled regarding the Bay Street East Reconstruction project. This PIC is being held to gather initial input on the project from stakeholders and residents. The meeting will include a public comment and question period. ### What is being proposed?

The Town of The Blue Mountains needs to install a secondary sanitary forcemain from the Mill Street Pumping Station to the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant (TWWTP) to service growth in the west portion of the municipality. The secondary forcemain will begin at the Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station and follow Bay Street East to Grey Street, and then proceed south on Grey Street to the treatment plant.

The Town's Asset Management Plan indicates that the sanitary sewer and watermain on Bay Street is in poor to very poor condition and is approaching the end of its useful life. Considering that Bay Street will be significantly disturbed from Mill Street to Grey Street for the installation of the secondary forcemain, this provides a good opportunity to reconstruct the entire road to ensure that the watermain, sewers and stormwater systems are updated and adequate for the next 50-75 years. The project will also see the installation of a new outfall pipe on Grey Street from the TWWTP to Georgian Bay.

The Town hosted a Neighbourhood Meeting on Saturday, December 2 at Bayview Park. The Town's project team was able to illustrate some of the challenges they face based on existing conditions, and residents were able to share their concerns and thoughts on different elements of the project including active transportation options, impacts to trees, traffic calming measures, road alignments and drainage and stormwater management.

The feedback gathered from the Neighbourhood Meeting, along with regulatory requirements, the Town's Official Plan, Transportation Master Plan and Engineering Standards has been used to inform the preliminary design alternatives and prepare for this first Public Information Centre.

There are lots of things to do in your garden in – April 2024

Make sure you have done everything you were supposed to do on the March MG List, or ask for a new copy. See email above. Spring had already arrived on many days in March, but then the late snow and cold. Spring came in like a lamb and out like a lion.

Do stretch and bend exercises every time before you start in the garden. I find skiing muscles have nothing to do with gardening muscles. Take it easy. There are a lot of gardening days before the next ski season.

### A NEW PROGRAM FOR SPREADING TRIPLE-19 FERTILIZER.

I have learned from the Guelph educated Agronomist at the Huron Co-Op in Markdale that you should NOT spread 19-19-19 general purpose fertilizer over the snow on all your flower beds and shrub borders. You will lose the Nitrogen. So, after the snow has gone, you should spread it on the damp ground in your flower beds, but before plant leaves appear, so they will not be burned.

Triple-19 fertilizer is available now at the Mid-West Co-Op, south of Markdale on Hwy 10.







Don't SPRING into garden clean up too soon...
Wait until temperatures are consistently above 10°C

Many butterflies, bees & other pollinators are currently wintering in dead leaves & hollowed out stems of last years plants.

Let them bee!



- Organize your compost pile for the new season. Start a new one with the top foot of compost material from last year's pile as a base.
- As the weather warms and the ground dries, prune back perennials and ornamental grasses to 1" to 2" from the ground. Collect the dead material and put it on your new compost pile. Shred it, if you
- Push any plants that the frost has heaved, back into place.
- Prepare garden beds for planting. Dig in compost, and/or manure, and/or other organic material around each plant. Remove any weeds that have come through from last fall. When you have cleaned up the beds, ADD 3"TO 4" OF MULCH to control weeds this summer.
- Remove rose protection. For Hybrid Teas, prune back to 6" or 8" and apply dormant oil spray before the buds break.
- Apply dormant oil spray to shrubs like euonymus that may have suffered from scale last year. Do it before the buds break.
- Prepare your vegetable garden with a good digging. Add compost and manure, if you have it. Mid-month, plant the seeds of coolweather vegetables like peas, spinach, lettuce, onions, beets. Plant seeds of frost resistant annuals like larkspur, sweet peas and calendulas.
- When you can't see your foot prints in the lawn, it is dry enough to rake it vigorously to remove any thatch. Then repair damage with weed-free topsoil. Add grass seed to bare spots. Keep moist.
- Fertilize your lawn with slow-release high nitrogen fertilizer (the first of the 3 numbers on the bag). Slow-release urea costs more, but it's worth it, as it should last until the fall.
- Apply crabgrass pre-emergence herbicide to your lawn, if required.
- When spring finally comes, plant trees, shrubs, perennials and biennials in your garden. No need to wait until May 24th for perennials, that's for annuals. Up here, June 1st is a better date to start planting frost-tender annuals safely. If there is a late frost forecast, cover annuals with a bed sheet.
- Re-fill your pots and planters with compost. But first, put empty plastic bottles with tops on at the bottom of large pots. You will need less soil and they will be lighter and easier to move. Add slow-release plant food to the top 4 inches.
- You can plant frost-resistant pansies NOW for a little early spring colour.
- Start mowing your lawn only as needed. Keep it long to crowd out any weeds.



### **Sunshine List 2023**

The number of public sector workers in Ontario who earned over six figures surpassed 300,000 in 2023, and included at least 1,700 employed in Grey-Bruce.

The annual public salary disclosure document known as the Sunshine List has been released by the Ontario government, shining a light on the province's highest earners among workers paid with tax dollars.

The Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act was enacted by Mike Harris' Progressive Conservative government in 1996, and requires organizations that receive funding from the province to report the names, positions and earnings of those who make more than \$100,000.

The more than 300,000 names on the list for 2023 was up from 267,000 names in 2022.

Ontario Power Generation CEO Ken Hartwick topped the list, earning \$1.9 million last year.
