Blue Mountains Public Library Board Update



New BMPL Committee: The Board struck an Ad Hoc committee to address

Council's request for usage data of library services. This Committee will be working with the CEO to build on the 2022 consultation completed with the community. The individual members of the Board are planning to meet with Councillors over the summer. This was very successful in previous years as conversations were able to open up new understandings and opportunities of cooperation.

Community Hubs: Needs Assessment for the Expansion of Library Services in Craigleith. At the June 14th Joint meeting between Council and the Board, a four-point resolution was made for more information pertaining to expansion of library services, specifically in the Craigleith area. The Board is working throughout the next two months to complete a Needs Assessment and gather other research needed to respond to Council. The focus of this work will be to consider the long-term delivery needs of comprehensive Library services to the community of Blue Mountains. A second Joint Meeting will be requested for the late fall where this information will be presented.

New CEO for the Library: With regret, the Board has received notice from Dr. Sabrina Saunders that she will be relocating due to health concerns, and therefore leaving BMPL in the Fall. She will be staying on throughout the search for a new CEO and will be onsite to ensure continuity of services, as well as assisting with the transition. Dr. Saunders will also focus this summer and fall on demonstrating the need for expansion of services, something which has been identified as a need since the 2010 Feasibility Study and Space Plan at BMPL.

the-home services in various locations including portions of: Sunset Boulevard, Christie Beach Road, The Blue Mountains - Meaford Townline, 6th Line, 10th Line, 12th Sideroad and The Blue Mountains - Euphrasia Townline. HDP will be hand-delivering Consent Forms to properties that will have the ability to connect to the new service.

Ontario is investing over \$184 billion in infrastructure projects to support schools, hospitals, public transit, roads, bridges and access to high-speed internet (\$4 billion).

Watering Restrictions Began June 1, 2023

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise residents that watering restrictions came into effect on June 1, 2023. The restrictions will remain in place until September 1, 2023.

Properties with odd-numbered addresses can water on oddnumbered calendar days between



7:00a.m. and 9:00a.m. and between 7:00p.m. and 9:00p.m. Properties with even-numbered addresses can water on even-numbered calendar days between 7:00a.m. and9:00 a.m. and between 7:00p.m. and 9:00p.m. The restrictions apply to outdoor use of water. If there is a discrepancy regarding your property address, please contact (519) 599-3131 ext. 285 for assistance.

The restrictions are a necessary measure during the summer months to ensure that water capacity remains sufficient to meet peak demand during busy weekends or in the event of an emergency. Under the Town's By-law, "Outdoor use of water" includes watering of existing lawns and gardens. At any time, you are permitted to water using a watering can and you may wash a vehicle if you use a handheld hose with a shut-off valve. Remember – Water In is Water Out. If you water your lawn and are connected to the Municipal sanitary sewer system, you will pay for the related sewer charges.

Irrigation System Requirements

A reminder to homeowners, designers and installers of lawn sprinkler or irrigation systems that backflow protection must be installed and tested as required under the current edition of B64.10 Standard and referenced in the Ontario Building Code. Additionally, all water supplied to a property within the Town shall pass through the water meter supplied by the Town for use upon such property. Any unmetered water use is prohibited under By-law 2008-02. Unauthorized use of water will be subject to fines and will be strictly enforced.

July 27 Meeting Highlights Grey County

Members of the Supportive Outreach Services (SOS) team updated Council on the impact mobile clinics are having on the outcomes of vulnerable community members who are experiencing mental health and addiction challenges. SOS brings care to people who have a difficult time accessing social and healthcare services in traditional ways. By meeting people where they're at, this innovative, multiagency team is helping improve outcomes for those at risk across Grey County. Presentation 1 Presentation 2 Promotional Video

Council received an update on Going Green in Grey initiatives. Council adopted the Climate Action Plan in 2023 and staff are working on projects that support two of the four foundational pillars and several other key next steps.

Council received a staff report about the Grey County Forest Management Plan. Council approved extending the harvest schedule for county-owned forests from 15 years to 25 years to allow for more regeneration. Harvesting will also be selective, focusing on appropriate forests while ceasing harvesting in forests where it is not feasible for ecological reasons or is hard to access. Staff will also explore carbon offset projects for County forests.

Grey County commits \$1 million to Wellness and Recovery Centre

Grey County Council has committed \$1 million over five years in support of the Grey Bruce Health Services Mental Health Wellness and Recovery Centre in Owen Sound. Council approved the motion at a meeting on July 27, directing staff to provide the first installment payment in 2023. Grey Bruce Health Services made the request to Grey County Council on April 23.

"Across Grey County we continue to see the impact opioids and other drugs have on our communities, our healthcare services, and our families. The increase in overdoses in recent years is staggering," said Grey County Warden Brian Milne. "The Wellness and Recovery Centre will be an invaluable support for those seeking help."

The commitment from Council was made during a session of committee of the whole. The decision will be formalized with approval of the minutes at the next meeting of Grey County Council on August 10.

Grey Bruce Health Services is converting the former Bayview School in Owen Sound into a treatment centre for individuals recovering from addiction. The centre will provide clinical services, community programming, and accommodations for guest, all in one building. The facility will support up to 45 patients at a time.

The total cost to build the centre is estimated at \$25 million. Grey Bruce Health Services and the province are committing \$10 million towards construction of the centre and the province has committed necessary operating funds. The community fundraising target for the facility is \$15 million.

Grey County follows a Health Care Funding Policy. This policy outlines rationale for where municipal funding should be used and criteria for eligibility.

In Memoriam

NORMAN GOOD HUTCHEON HALDANE

Norm died at Meaford General Hospital with his family close by, July 18, 2023. He would insist we say he was 'in his 96th year'.

Norm was born September 18, 1927 in Dundee, Scotland and immigrated to Canada with his parents Agnes and John Haldane when he was three years old. He grew up in Toronto and Montreal,

with summers at Balm Beach. He began his working career in sales, first for Brook Bond Tea and then in pharmaceuticals, travelling around the country.

In Winnipeg Norm met Joan and they were married in 1961. They lived in different communities in Ontario with a brief stint in Indiana, but after the third of their three daughters was born, they moved steadily further north – Oakville, then Shelburne, Ravenna, til they landed in Clarksburg where they have lived for the past 40 years.

Earlier this year, even when Norm was too tired to read or write in his journal, he treated his family to classic poems from memory.

Norm loved to see new places and together he and Joan travelled when they could, and spent many summers in their trailer at Sauble Beach. The grandkids fondly remember visits there, including elaborate sandcastles and Grandpa's blazing campfires. Even once his horizons narrowed a bit, he still loved a road trip and would often say to Joan "let's go for a drive" or just "let's go somewhere". Trips were always an adventure with history to learn, fun facts or goofy signs to notice and photograph.

Norman was an active member of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. His faith was a quiet constant throughout his life. We imagine he's now back in the choir anchoring heaven's tenor section, and planning out some awesome signs to promote sights along the gold-paved streets.

Norm is loved and missed by his wife Joan, daughters Jennifer (Tom Bellington), Susan (Ray Ford) and Melanie (Rob Kearns) as well as grandchildren David, Cameron, Johnathan, Justin, Jonah, Elena and their partners, plus many nieces and nephews.

Ontario Establishes First New Conservation Reserve in Over 10 Years

Prince Edward County — The Ontario government has created the province's first new conservation reserve in over 10 years. The Monarch Point Conservation Reserve will



protect nearly 4,000 acres along the south shores of Prince Edward County – an area nearly five times the size of the Toronto Islands.

Ontario's newest conservation reserve is named for the monarch butterfly, which frequents the area as part of its annual migration. In recognition of the site as an International Monarch Butterfly Reserve, Monarch Point Conservation Reserve (formerly known as Ostrander Crown Land Block and Point Petre Provincial Wildlife Area) will continue providing critical habitat for a range of species, including the at-risk monarch butterfly, migratory birds, reptiles and plants.

Monarch Point Conservation Reserve will continue providing opportunities for the community to enjoy the area's natural beauty, including hiking and birdwatching making it an important destination for nature-based tourism, while strengthening the long-term protection and health of local ecosystems and wildlife.

This new conservation reserve is the result of extensive consultation and collaboration with local stakeholders, Indigenous communities, residents and conservation groups such as the South Shore Joint Initiative, the Schad Foundation and the Nature Conservancy of Canada towards a shared goal of protecting Ontario's biodiversity and creating a more sustainable future for all.

The Master Gardener's Corner

Things to do in your garden each month taken from the Ontario Master Gardener Calendar by John Hethrington, Past President, Master Gardeners of Ontario. August 2023:

WehavecertainlyhadtheHEAT, and the rain as well. The cornishigh and the weeds too! Your garden should be looking good. Congratulations! Now, what to do this month.

- Top up your mulch. Keep it at least 2 inches deep. It works to suppress weeds, keeps the soil cool and damp and retains the rain.
- Sow vegetable seeds again for a fall harvest of spinach, radishes and some varieties of leaf lettuce.
- Tidy up plants and shrubs with a little judicious pruning, but early in the month.
- Stake tall perennials like against the wind.
- Cut your grass at least 2" high to combat drying out. Water well when needed, or when it is allowed.
- Check out bulb catalogues and order spring flowering bulbs before they are sold out.
- Finally, pull or cut off the browned leaves of spring flowering bulbs. Trim back iris leaves. My mother would take her best kitchen scissors and cut up one side of each leaf fan and then down the other side to make a neat arrow. She was a picky gardener.
- Fill in any gaps in your flower garden with fall-flowering perennial plants, like mums and asters.
- Start drying flowers and herbs. Pick your lavender now for drying.
- Start to divide daylilies as they stop blooming.
- Collect seeds that have matured but not yet fallen from the seed head, plants like poppies. Once they have completely dried, store the seeds in air tight containers in a cool location or sprinkle them around your garden for colour next summer.
- Take a hard look at your garden and take pictures too, so you can decide where there are empty spaces for new plants this fall. Identify any plants that have not performed well, (or you can't stand) and plan to replace them with a fall planting program of shrubs and perennials.
- Early Fall is a great time to sow grass seed and plant perennials, trees and shrubs. You'll get a big jump on next Spring!

Look for the annual Grey County Master Gardener's fall plant sale, Saturday September 9th from 9am until noon. This year, it's in Meaford, at the Rotary Pavilion by the harbour. Choose from unique perennials and lots of native and pollinator plants at reasonable prices.





Eating Your Garden by Alice Otrysko

I just ate some of my garden: I made a pot of **spinach/carrot soup** and had a delicious bowl of it with croutons.

There is nothing like the taste of freshly picked veggies eaten almost immediately before they lose their vitamin and nutrient value.

You don't have to have a large piece of land to grow some nutritional food. As I stated in the last article, I have 1/5 of an acre and still manage

to pick and made a crispy salad daily and now eating string beans, making soups and very soon starting to enjoy the juicy tomatoes.

Beans a la Polonaise are boiled just enough to soften them, drained and then dressed with Panko bread crumbs which have been sauteed in butter.



Pasta Pesto is a regular dish with us. I use gluten free pasta which is readily



available and boil it according to directions. In the meantime I have prepared the pesto, usually a day or two beforehand as it keeps very well in the fridge.

Pesto from my garden: I gather basil, flat leaf parsley, a bit of other herbs including some garlic chives, a bit of thyme and add to this a

clove or two (depending on how much you're making) of garlic. My garlic is not from the garden as I totally forgot to plant it last Fall. Garlic is usually planted in November by putting individual cloves into the soil. It blooms in the Spring and by now it can be picked.

Put all ingredients into a food processor, add salt and pepper and olive oil and about 1/3 cup of walnuts or pine nuts. Blend well until you get a nice paste. This I keep in the fridge and use it in soups or stir it into scrambled eggs or omelets or in this case, make pasta pesto.

Another very popular and loved vegetable side dish is called "**miseria**". For this you need a long cucumber or two. Peel the cucumber and put it through the slicer on your food processor. (I usually use 2). Remove to a bowl and salt and pepper this and place in the fridge for over an hour. You will see much of the moisture come out. Drain this over a sieve and dress with a nice full fat thick sour cream. It should be very cold when served. We love it. My cucumbers are just babies at this point so I have to wait to make miseria.

The garden is constantly producing herbs. Eat these as much as you can in the summer months straight from the garden as they are full of nutrients, vitamins, mineral etc. and will fortify you for the winter when we are forced to eat veg which has travelled some distance and each day lose its nutritional value.

When tomatoes are ready we like to slice them and dress them with olive oil, salt and pepper, crumbled feta and diced basil or dill, parsley and thyme. Eaten with toasted sour dough bread they make a wonderful meal accompanied perhaps with a nice home made soup.

I am always sorry when the garden is finished and I have to buy what I am used to gathering right at my fingertips.

The consolation is that in the Fall we have a number of Farmers' Markets around us so we can still eat fall vegetables and of course, home grown potatoes. If you do not have any land to grow herbs and lettuce or tomatoes, maybe you can still do some of it on a balcony. In Europe you see balconies full of urns holding herbs and tomatoes and whatever else can be fitted in.

I hope you will try a garden next Spring if you haven't so far. It's very little work and when you see your seeds produce lovely results


