Blue Mountain Resort, Ontario's largest ski and snowboard destination, is thrilled to welcome winter lovers to opening day this Thursday, December 7, starting at 9AM. Skiers and snowboarders are invited to hit the slopes and kick off another great winter season at Blue.

Thanks to the hard work of the Resort operations team, the Silver Bullet high-speed six-pack chairlift, servicing Tranquility ski run, and the Easy Rider beginner carpet will be running from 9AM to 4:30PM. Village amenities are open to help enhance the start of ski season and complimentary hot chocolate will be offered in the lift plaza.

Guests looking for lift tickets can purchase in advance online and use Blue's new Ticket Pickup Kiosks, to quickly get to the lift and start their first ski day of the season. Guest Services will also be open as of 9AM.

Night skiing at Blue is scheduled to start Thursday, December 14 when runs will be open until 9PM daily (weather and conditions permitting). Ontario Invests in National and International Sport Events in The Blue Mountains - \$443,412

The Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport is providing \$433,412 through the 2023-24 Ontario Sport Hosting Program to support four events that are taking place in The Blue Mountains in 2024.

Local recipients of Ontario Sport Hosting Program funding include:

- Alpine Ontario Alpin: 2024 Women's Nor-Am Cup - \$20,000
- Alpine Ontario Alpin: 2024 U16 & U18 Canadian National Alpine Championships Eastern Division - \$15,000
- Association of Ontario Snowboarders: 2024 Canada Snowboard Junior National Championships - \$91,209
- Association of Ontario Snowboarders: 2024 Alpine Snow TKO FIS World - \$307,203

This funding is a part of the ministry's investment of up to \$2.2 million to support 24 amateur sport events in communities across the province.

These events will attract more than 9,000 athletes from across Canada and around the world to Ontario to compete and are expected to generate over \$31 million in economic activity.

"Hosting national and international amateur sport events enables Ontario athletes to gain elite competition experience while showcasing

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Town of The Blue Mountains and the Grace United Church "Green Team" Partner *by Jim Oliver*

Grace United Church and its congregation are trying to live out their responsibility to value and care for the natural environment around us all, consisting of the water, land, forests and wildlife, as well as valuing and caring for all people. As part of this goal and commitment, the Grace "Green Team" of volunteers has been undertaking small projects locally to demonstrate that we all can help with this effort.

The Green Team has realized that one way every single person can help to appreciate and protect our natural environment is by reducing our waste, including litter, and recycling when we cannot reduce. Composting and recycling at fund-raising dinners with neighbouring churches has been a good success to date in reducing waste and raising public awareness (and buy-in).

It was an easy opportunity to do so recently when the Grace Green Team was able to partner with the Town of The Blue Mountains to purchase and install two new waste/recycling receptacles in Thornbury, one downtown and one at Bayview Park by the Rotary pavilion. Funding had been provided through the United Church of Canada. The new receptacles will accept glass, metal and plastic bottles and cans, perhaps the most common litter items found in our communities.

It is hoped that these new receptacles, along with others to be sponsored by the Thornbury BIA will encourage both residents and visitors to do their part.

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Ontario Cracking Down on Puppy Mills

New legislation will help ensure safe and ethical treatment of dogs

The Ontario government introduced legislation to help stop unethical dog breeding operations, often known as puppy mills. The Preventing Unethical Puppy Sales Act (PUPS Act) if passed, will amend the Provincial Animal Welfare Services Act (PAWS Act) to stop harmful dog breeding practices, impose penalties, and make sure that dogs across Ontario receive the care they deserve.

"Ontario currently has the strongest penalties for animal welfare violations in the country and we will not stop until dogs, and other animals across the province, have a comprehensive and robust system to ensure their safety," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. "The Preventing Unethical Puppy Sales Act will help to ensure Ontario remains a leader in animal welfare by being the first province in the country to introduce minimum penalties specific to puppy mills."

The changes proposed in the PUPS Act will prohibit the harmful dog-breeding practices most often associated with puppy mills and the reckless sale of dogs, such as:

- Breeding a female dog more than three times in a two-year period, or breeding more than two litters from a female dog's consecutive heat cycles
- Breeding a female dog that is less than a year old
- Failing to keep a dog with a contagious disease away from other dogs or animals
- Failing to ensure a dog's environment is sanitary and free from accumulation of waste
- Separating a puppy from its mother before the age of eight weeks

Under the new legislation, the province will introduce minimum penalties of \$10,000 for bad actors operating a puppy mill and \$25,000 if these violations result in the death of a dog. Changes will also allow the province to help develop regulations to set conditions that must be met when selling or transferring a dog and establish regulations for record-keeping.

To keep animals across the province safe, Ontario also intends to consult on regulations relating to medically unnecessary procedures for dogs and cats, such as declawing, tail docking, ear cropping, and debarking, and establish a framework for administrative monetary penalties under the PAWS Act.

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Brian Milne returning as Grey County Warden in 2024

Brian Milne has been acclaimed to a second straight year in the Grey County Warden's seat. Milne was acclaimed by Grey County Council at the annual inaugural meeting on December 5. This will be Warden Milne's third term as Warden, first serving in 2014, then again in 2023.

In his inaugural address, Warden Milne looked forward to the year ahead and spoke about working with Council, community partners, and staff to build community in Grey County.

"I am honoured to continue as Grey County Warden. Everyone here is engaged and focused on the tasks at hand. I truly believe

are committed to building our communities to be the best they can be. Let's get to it," he stated in his inaugural address.

Warden Milne also spoke about the importance of delivering services and focusing on corporate strategic priorities during a challenging budget process, highlighting one of the four themes identified in the corporate strategic plan update.

"Grey Council will make decisions and take actions that consider the long-term social, natural and fiscal sustainability of our communities," said Warden Milne. "We as community builders need to seek out what our residents and visitors require and then set a plan to provide those requirements in a fiscal manner that is affordable."

Warden Milne represents the Township of Southgate on Grey County Council where he also serves as Mayor. He was first elected to Southgate Council in 2003. In addition to his municipal roles, Milne is a member of the Egremont Optimist Club and sits on the board of the North Wellington Health Care Alliance. Outside of municipal life, Milne is a fourth generation Grey County farmer. He enjoys spending time with his wife Debbie, their three children and four grandchildren.

The election of the Warden takes place each December at the inaugural session. Grey County Council elects one member to lead the County for the upcoming year. Warden Milne was nominated for the position by Grey County Councillors Andrea Matrosov and Peter Bordignon. Paul McQueen will continue to serve as Grey County's Deputy Warden in 2024.

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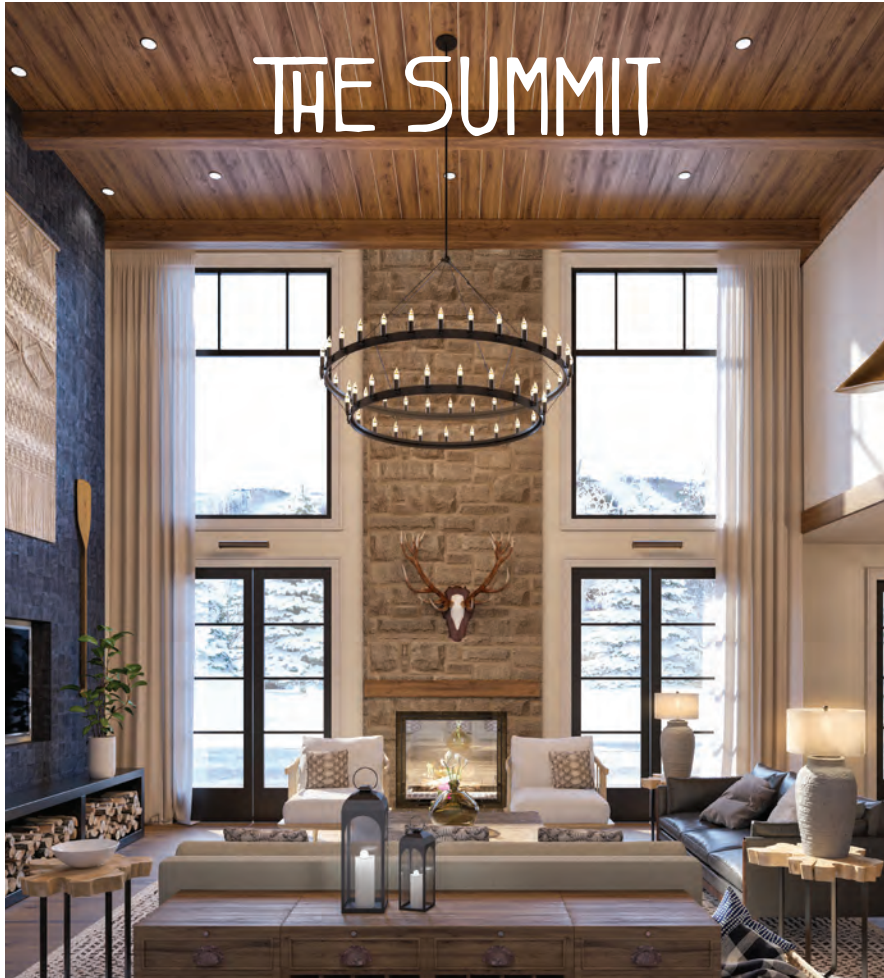

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Campus of Care Project Update

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to provide an update about the Campus of Care. The project is expected to bring 160 long-term-care beds to the Town. It will also provide a range of retirement home living options, such as affordable housing and attainable housing units (e.g., townhouses and apartments), daycare facilities, and certain commercial uses.

The Town has entered into an agreement with Skyline Development Acquisitions Inc. and peopleCare Communities Inc. to develop the Campus of Care, which was finalized earlier this year. As such, contractors are expected to be on-site at 125 Peel Street between December 1 and 7 to complete borehole drilling and groundwater sampling work as part of the Phase 2 Environmental Site Assessment. More information can be found below.

Since early 2022, the Town, alongside a variety of partners, has been actively working towards the development of a Campus of Care. The project requires the disposition of municipal land, specifically portions of the 125 Peel Street property. This work has also been a collaboration with the Ministry of Long-Term Care and the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

At the May 17, 2023 Council meeting, Skyline Development Acquisitions Inc. and peopleCare Communities Inc. provided Council with a presentation outlining the Campus of Care Conceptual Proposal. The presentation provided an overview of the proposed site layout, which included the north portion of the property being retained by the Town for future use.

Following the meeting, the Town signed a Letter of Intent (LOI) with Skyline Development Acquisitions Inc. and peopleCare Communities Inc., including the negotiated purchase price of 18.7 contiguous acres of the 125 Peel Street property for \$15,000,000.

Council approved the execution of the required agreements to formalize the disposition and sale of municipally owned land for developing the Campus of Care on June 26, 2023. The final purchase agreements are expected to be executed by all parties by the end of 2023.

The Town will be responsible for severing the existing 125 Peel Street property to create three individual parcels, with the Town retaining the eleven-acre parcel of land on the northwest side of the property along the Highway 26 corridor. The Town will also be responsible for installing all offsite servicing and roadworks to the property line to service the Campus of Care. Skyline Development Acquisitions Inc. and peopleCare Communities Inc. will be responsible for obtaining site plan approval and all on-site works.

Upcoming Site Work

In July 2023, Cambium finalized a Phase One Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) for the property located at 125 Peel Street South, in Thornbury, under the guidance of Ontario Regulation (O. Reg) 153/04. The Phase One ESA included a review of the historical and current conditions of the site to determine the potential existence of contaminants that may cause an adverse effect in or to the natural environment.

The Phase One ESA is a non-intrusive investigation (i.e., it does not include the collection or analysis of samples nor taking environmental measurements) and cannot state with certainty whether contamination is present (except where contamination is directly observable). The Phase One ESA for the site identified ten areas of potential environmental concern (APECs). A Phase Two ESA was noted as required based on the observations and information obtained for the Site and Phase One Study Area.

Cambium and the subcontractor Strata Drilling Group will be on-site on December 5, 2023, to advance environmental boreholes and install groundwater monitoring wells at the Site to facilitate the completion of the Phase Two ESA under the guidance of O. Reg 153/04. The Phase Two ESA scope is based on the findings of the Phase One ESA and will investigate soil, sediment, and groundwater quality at the Site across the 10 APECs identified within the Phase One ESA.

3. Lift the Holding Provision 'h1' associated with the wetland feature from the subject lands.

The proposal recognizes two potential building lots in the southwest and northeast corners of the property. The subject lands are currently vacant.

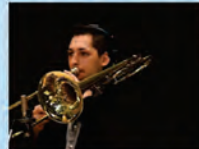
