New Resident Parking Pass Registration System Launched

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise residents that the resident parking pass program will be transitioned to a **new** online registration system for 2024.

The new system will allow residents to register vehicles directly through the Town website. Vehicle registration can also be completed in person at Town Hall Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.. The traditional rearview mirror parking passes are no longer available and will not be mailed to residents.

All residential property owners and residential tenants in the Town can register vehicles for free. Multiple vehicles, subject to proof of ownership, can be registered per resident. Registered vehicles can park for free at all Town-owned paid parking locations.

Photo identification, proof of residency and vehicle registration are required to register a vehicle, whether online or in person. Existing 2023 resident parking passes and vehicle registrations will remain valid until March 15, 2024. Vehicles not registered as of March 15, 2024, will be subject to a fine when parking in a paid parking lot location without paying. Residents must register their vehicles for parking on an annual basis.

Non-resident parking passes are available to residents of the Municipality of Meaford, Grey Highlands, Clearview Township and the Town of Collingwood for \$100.00 + HST.

Action Tables Launched to Address Community Concerns in Grey and Bruce Counties

The Community Safety and Well-Being Plan (CSWBP) is proud to announce the development of two new action tables to serve the Grey and Bruce communities. The Crime Prevention Action Table and the Mental Health Action Table both launched in December 2023 as collaborative efforts to address priority risk areas. The Action Tables are led by invested community partners who use local data and evidence-informed best practices to implement upstream interventions to address concerns in the community.

The Community Safety and Well-Being Plan, through community feedback, consultation, and local data, developed a total of five priority risk areas inclusive of: Crime Prevention, Mental Health, Addictions/Substance Use, Housing and Homelessness and Poverty and Income. Each of the five priority risk areas has a dedicated action table that is focused on collaboration, information sharing,

and performance measurement in-line with the Ontario CSWBP Framework. The Action Tables work with multiple stakeholders in the community to address root causes of complex social problems and implement collaborative strategies to accomplish shared goals.

What is the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan (CSWBP) Grey-Bruce?

Building on a long history of cross-sector collaboration, the process of Community Safety and Well-Being Planning has allowed over 70 community partners in Bruce and Grey – from Municipalities, police services, police service boards, education, health, community and social services – to come together to discuss resident perceptions and begin to explore local data related to safety and well-being, with the goal of identifying and reducing risk factors that contribute to safety and well-being issues, using cross-sector strategies and focusing on the social determinants of health.

One of the goals of CSWBP is ensuring a coordinated approach that leverages existing work and expertise, avoids duplication, and identifies opportunities for further action. As we work together to ensure our communities meet the needs of safety and belonging, we always welcome ideas, suggestions, and feedback from members of the community.

Homelessness Response Table

Concerns / Indicators

Below are some of the key Housing and Homelessness indicators and concerns highlighted in local data. Action Tables will explore these in order to inform the creation of specific CSWBP Action Plans, as well as to monitor progress and improvements.

- Compared to Ontario and Canada, this region has more owned dwellings and fewer rental dwellings.
- Some areas have more subsidized housing (Owen Sound, Meaford, Kincardine, Southgate).
- Over 15% of homeowners and almost 50% or renters in Bruce and Grey spend more than 30% of their monthly income on shelter costs, a situation that leaves them only 1-2 paychecks away from not paying their mortgage/rent.
- Average housing prices are increasing but are lower than Ontario.
- Seasonal housing numbers are high in North Bruce Peninsula, Town of The Blue Mountains and South Bruce Peninsula.
- Very low rental vacancy rates in our region are similar to Ontario.
- Housing Wait Lists are increasing as are calls to 211 for housing issues.

Community Perceptions

This category ranked fourth highest (#4) overall in the Bruce and Grey CSWBP Community Engagement Survey (overall, by Bruce County, by Grey County). It was ranked in the top 3 areas of importance by 29% of respondents overall but especially in Owen Sound, North Bruce Peninsula and Kincardine. When asked which areas were of particular concern in this category, affordability of housing, availability of housing, and access to housing were noted, followed by homelessness. Several comments in the survey mentioned concern about the lack of affordable housing in communities, the lack of variety (e.g., smaller, more affordable homes), need for more education of tenants and landlords on rights, and the concern that many individuals or families stay in unfit, unsafe housing because there are no other options available to them (3).

Increased Influenza A Activity Prompts GBPH To Remind Residents To Get The Flu Shot

Elevated Influenza A activity has prompted Grey Bruce Public Health to underscore the importance of receiving the flu vaccine.

Surveillance data indicates a surge in Influenza A cases at both local and provincial levels, leading GBPH to remind residents that there is still time to protect themselves from the respiratory virus by getting this year's publicly funded flu vaccine.

Dr. Rim Zayed, GBPH's Physician Consultant, emphasizes that the influenza vaccine – which is readily available at numerous participating pharmacies and through primary care providers in Grey-Bruce – continues to be the most effective defense against severe complications associated with the flu.

Dr. Zayed encourages residents to proactively protect themselves and contribute to the overall well-being of the community by getting vaccinated.

In addition to influenza, COVID-19 and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) are actively circulating in the community.

Public Health Ontario (PHO) is currently reporting a "moderate" test positivity rate in the province for influenza, which is based on the most recent data from the week ending Dec. 30, 2023.

PHO anticipates that influenza activity will continue to increase over the short term, while COVID-19 activity – now considered high – is expected to remain stable, and RSV activity is projected to decrease.

The risk of severe illness due to respiratory viruses is currently high for people 18 years of age and under and very high for adults aged 18 to 64, according to PHO. The risk is expected to increase in the short term for both age groups.

In Grey-Bruce, surveillance data also shows an increase in influenza activity with over 130 confirmed cases since the start of the respiratory illness season in September. Nearly 70% of those cases were reported in the past two weeks, including 40 cases reported in the past week alone.

Given the heightened risk, flu testing is prioritized for those at highest risk of developing severe complications from the virus.

Two Influenza A outbreaks have also been declared at local longterm care and retirement homes in recent weeks. One of those outbreaks has been declared over.

Both the flu vaccine and latest XXB.1.5-containing COVID-19 vaccine are recommended for individuals aged six months and older.

Grey Bruce Public Health has developed an online map of pharmacies that are providing both vaccines. (Thornbury Pharmasave)

Public Health advises a multi-layered approach of protection to prevent the spread of respiratory illnesses, including vaccination, staying home when sick, cleaning hands and disinfecting high-touch surfaces frequently, and practicing coughing and sneezing etiquette.

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Ontario Launching New Long-Term Care Home Investigations Unit

New investigations team will strengthen oversight and resident safety

TORONTO — The Ontario government has created a new Investigations Unit to ensure every long-term care resident lives with dignity and experiences the quality of care they deserve. Supported by an investment of \$72.3 million, the new 10-person unit will be an effective deterrent and tool when escalated enforcement is needed to improve compliance and ensure resident safety.

The new unit is now active and will investigate allegations such as:

- · failing to protect a resident from abuse or neglect,
- · repeated and ongoing non-compliance,
- failing to comply with ministry inspector's orders,
- suppressing and/or falsifying mandatory reports, and
- negligence of corporate directors.

The newly appointed investigators completed comprehensive training over 19 weeks which consisted of in-class training, self-study modules and field experience. The training covered all aspects of the inspections program, the relevant legislation and regulation, investigative techniques such as interviewing, search warrant and report writing, as well as court procedures.

The new unit's investigators are designated as Provincial Offences Officers under the Provincial Offences Act and will investigate allegations of offenses under the Fixing Long-Term Care Act. While inspectors identify and address non-compliance under the Act, investigators determine if there are grounds that an offence under the Act has been committed, which if prosecuted could result in fines and/or imprisonment.

The work of the Investigations Unit will complement Ontario's existing robust inspections program and is in addition to a wider suite of changes the government introduced over the last two years to strengthen compliance and enforcement in the long-term care sector. These new measures include doubling the number of inspectors in the field, implementing a new and more efficient IT system for inspectors to track their work, and introducing new compliance and enforcement tools like administrative monetary penalties and re-inspection fees.

The government is fixing long-term care to ensure Ontario's seniors get the quality of care and quality of life they need and deserve. The plan is built on four pillars: staffing and care; quality and enforcement; building modern, safe and comfortable homes; and connecting seniors with faster, more convenient access to the services they need.

Quick Facts

- Ontario is now a leading province in terms of inspector per longterm care home ratio in Canada, with one inspector for every two homes in the province.
- The new Investigations Unit works apart from the inspections stream (however the two complement each other). Also, investigators will only look into allegations around the 11 provincial offences listed in the Fixing Long-Term Care Act, 2021.
- The Investigator and Senior Investigator positions will investigate allegations of offences under the Fixing Long-Term Care Act and make recommendations where appropriate for enforcement action, up to and including prosecution.
- The Ontario government is providing up to \$1.25 billion this year to long-term care homes to hire and retain thousands more longterm care staff. This is part of the government's historic four-year, \$4.9 billion commitment to increase the average direct care time

provided by registered nurses, registered practical nurses and personal support workers to four hours per resident, per day, by March 31, 2025.

 The government is investing \$1 billion over three years to expand and improve home care services across the province and \$100 million for community services. The 2023 Ontario Budget accelerated investments to bring home care funding in 2023-24

Ontario Taking Next Steps in Plan to Further Reduce Wait Times for Surgeries and Diagnostic Procedures

Community surgical and diagnostic centres connecting people to faster, more convenient care with your health card

MISSISSAUGA — As part of the next steps to implement Your Health, a plan for connected and convenient care, the Ontario government is proposing regulatory changes that, would name Accreditation Canada as the inspection body responsible for ensuring the highest quality standards and strong oversight of the 900+ current and all future community surgical and diagnostic centres, effective April 1, 2024.

"When it comes to reducing wait times for surgeries, we aren't accepting a status quo that leaves too many people waiting too long for care," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "Instead, our government is expanding community surgical and diagnostic centres so we can reduce wait times by doing more surgeries in state-of-the-art, convenient and safe facilities, always paid for by your OHIP card never your credit card."

Given its national leadership role in this type of work for over 65 years, Accreditation Canada has been chosen to develop an enhanced oversight and quality assurance program for current and future community surgical and diagnostic centres that will have the same strong requirements as public hospitals in order to improve quality standards at facilities and ensure consistent patient safety and quality health care. Over the coming weeks, the province will consult extensively with health care sector partners, regulatory colleges representing providers, and patients and families on the development of the new oversight and quality assurance program.

Beginning in Spring 2024, the government will also take the next step in expanding the number of community surgical and diagnostic centres licensed in the province to deliver additional OHIP insured services to people closer to home, including more MRI/CT scans, GI endoscopies, and orthopedic surgeries.

Through the actions taken to date as part of Your Health, Ontario is connecting more people to surgeries and diagnostics care and reducing wait times. Progress over the past year includes:

- Achieving the shortest surgical wait times of any province in Canada in 2023, with nearly 80 per cent of people receiving their procedure within clinically recommended target times;
- Reducing the surgical waitlist since its peak in March 2022, resulting in 16,000 fewer people waiting for the surgeries they need;
- Eliminating the backlog of cervical cancer screening tests at the end of August 2023. Testing turnaround times returned to the prepandemic standard of 10 to 14 days;
- Completion rates of pediatric surgeries are reaching 112 per cent of pre-pandemic levels, as of December 2023; and
- Increasing diagnostic imaging capacity by an additional 97,767 MRI and 116,443 CT operating hours.
- As Ontario continues to make progress implementing Your Health, the government will continue making bold, innovative and creative changes to make it faster and easier for people to conveniently connect to care closer to home.



2023 Tax Season Is Here!

Its the time of the year when we need to get compliant with tax laws. Its important to start collating information, documents and other tax information required for filing the statutory returns for this tax year.

We have put together for you, a checklist of all tax information you may need to get ready for the preparation of your tax return.

General Items

- 2022 notice of assessment
- T4 (employment); T4A (commissions and self-employed); T4E (employment insurance)




