The Blue Mountains Fire Department Reminds Public to be Prepared this Winter

The Town of The Blue Mountains Fire Department would like to remind the public to be prepared for a winter emergency with a plan and supplies available to keep themselves safe during the winter months. Steps you can take to ensure you are prepared this winter season include:

Keep an Emergency Preparedness Kit

Households are encouraged to build an emergency preparedness kit in case of a power outage or winter conditions that prevent people from being able to leave their homes. Kits should include items like a flashlight, water and non-perishable food to last for at least three days.

Visit Ontario.ca/BePrepared for a comprehensive list of what can be part of your household's kit.



Get Ready for Winter Driving

Be prepared for winter driving and always keep a winter survival kit in your car. Kits should include a blanket, warm clothing like gloves, hats and sweaters, a phone charger, candles, a shovel, jumper cables and water. Additionally, it is recommended to keep your fuel tank at least half full to help reduce moisture in the fuel system and add weight to the vehicle. Make sure you have an ice-scraper and washer fluid that works at temperatures as low as -40oC.

Road Safety

The Blue Mountains Fire Department encourages all travellers to drive according to road conditions and to avoid unnecessary travel if conditions deteriorate. If you are travelling, leave early to give yourself extra time, and plan your travel by using Ontario 511 to check road status, cameras, weather, and <u>Track My Plow</u> to find out where plows are on provincial highways.

Charity Funding

Applications are now being accepted for The Blue Mountain Village Foundation (BMVF)

Winter 2023/24 Grant Funding Program. Non-profit organizations and community groups are encouraged to apply for funding before the application deadline on January 26, 2024.

The BMVF awards grants to charitable organizations in the South Georgian Bay Region (including Collingwood, Wasaga Beach, Stayner, The Blue Mountains, Meaford, Duntroon, Singhampton, Kimberley & Creemore) whose programs & activities address social gaps in our community. Through community engagement & advocacy, program delivery, and fundraising, the BMVF supports areas of health, education, the arts, the environment, family support, recreation and more. Support is given through cash grants to provide funding for specific projects that meet the Foundation's mandate and criteria. Operational costs or salaries are not considered. Once the application review is complete, the Selection Committee will make recommendations to the Foundation's Board of Directors for final approval.

Winter 2023/24 Grant Funding Let's Bring Our Communities Together!

Criteria and guidelines for submissions have been developed to reflect the most pressing needs identified in our community. The guidelines include the following:

Program Criteria:

- Programs must address gaps and provide solutions to the South Georgian Bay Community.
- \$15K available in funding and individual requests are not to exceed \$5000.
- Programs should be delivered between March 2024 & February 2025.
- Social gaps & solutions include:
 - **Senior Support:** To ensure our seniors receive the services they need for a fulfilling and comfortable life.
 - **Fight Against Hunger:** To help eradicate food insecurity and ensure that no one in our community goes hungry.
 - **Mental Health:** To bring increased awareness and resources to this critical issue of heightened mental health challenges.
 - **Domestic Abuse**: To address family problems such as domestic abuse, and programs which create safer and healthier environments. o Access to Healthcare: To ensure everyone has access to medical and healthcare support they need.
 - **Workforce Challenges:** To promote stable and sustainable livelihoods for all, tackling limited access to housing, skills development, and workforce challenges.
 - Youth Empowerment: To support youth in the community, providing opportunities for connection, growth, and development.
 - **Economic Empowerment:** To break down economic barriers for individuals and families, particularly in light of inflation and high cost of living in our community.
- All Basic Criteria outlined above (dates, programming timeline, one or more gaps/solutions identified) must be met for grant applications to be reviewed by the selection committee.




PAULINE JASTAK

Things to do in, or for your garden in - January 2024

- Inspect house plants for white flies, spider mites and aphids.
- · Apply insecticidal soap and spray with water.
- Inspect spring bulbs you may have stored or forgotten about.
 Discard soft or mouldy ones. Plant left over, not-yet-planted spring
 bulbs like daffs, tulips etc. in pots with good potting soil and a little
 bone meal. Water. Put the pots in an unheated garage or garden
 shed for 6 weeks. Take them inside in February or early March. You
 should get spring blooms in less than a month.
- The snow comes and goes. The January thaw will come again like clockwork. Before it comes mound any remaining snow over roses and tender perennials.
- DON'T THROW OUT YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE! Cut the branches off and place them over tender plants to catch the snow. It's the freeze/thaw cycle that kills the plants.
- Expand your personal knowledge through on-line courses, plus look online for seed and plant catalogues.
- Make several detailed lists; a) BIG Projects, b) Spring clean-up by bed, c) Regular maintenance, d) New plants to buy and c) Plants to divide and donate to the St. George's Plant Sale in early June (Date still to be set). Donate 15 or more perennials and get a Tax Receipts for the value your plants sell for! Call 519-599-5846 for more info.

- Google "Seed Catalogue Websites" and see hundreds of seed sources.
- Order flower and vegetable seeds. Decide which seeds should be started inside.
- If you can find them, try forcing amaryllis and paperwhite narcissus now for indoor winter bloom that will cheer you up.
- At the end of the month, start the slowest germinating seeds like begonias and geranium, also seeds for early spring bloom e.g., pansy, verbena, alyssum and dianthus.

The Markdale CO-OP, 1-519-986-2031, has a good supply of Triple-19 fertilizer still available at \$29.40 a bag. This is strong agricultural fertilizer to only put on your flower garden beds as soon as the snow is gone, but before plant growth starts, like in late March. It will fertilize your gardens all summer long. It's worth the drive to Markdale!

Town 2024 Proposed Budget now available for Public Input

The notice regarding the 2024 Proposed Town Budget has been updated to include additional comments from Deputy Mayor Peter Bordignon.

The 2024 Proposed Budget plans to provide essential services relied upon by residents, businesses and visitors while maintaining property taxes and user fees at a level beneficial to fostering growth, prosperity and community investment. A main focus of the 2024 Proposed Budget is to ensure the long-term financial stability of the Town through adequate transfers to asset management reserve for capital funding.

The 2024 Proposed Tax Rate increase is 9.58%. This represents an increase of \$207 to an approximate total of \$2,366 for the Town portion of annual property taxes. These numbers are based on the assessed value of an average home in The Blue Mountains as set by MPAC at \$555,000.

Deputy Mayor Peter Bordignon, Chair of Finance, provided his outlook on the budget: "The operating side of the 2024 Budget reflects in its expenses and revenues, after growth, a tax rate impact of 2.38%, which comes in line with Council direction." He adds: "When factoring in the staff recommended transfers to the asset management reserve funds, the required tax rate increase sits at 9.58%. During the Special Budget meetings in January, we will be looking for opportunities to mitigate or offset the difference of 7.2% outlined in the draft budget."

Also included in the budget is a proposed increase in water and wastewater user fees. These fees are paid directly by the users that are connected to Municipal water and wastewater services. For the average home in the Town, the chart below outlines the impact of the **Water and Wastewater User-Fee increase.**

2024 Impact

Water (180 m3) \$23 Wastewater (180 m3) \$20 **Total Impact** \$43

The 2024 Proposed Budget also includes a \$80M capital budget to support key infrastructure projects throughout the Town. Projects include:

- Renovations of the Craigleith and Mill Street Sewage Pumping Stations and the Forcemain to the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant (\$30.6M)
- Replacement of the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant Outfall (\$16M)
- Replacement of the Craigleith Fire Hall and renovate the current building for Operations and Community Services (\$13.3M)

Completing these projects will help ensure that the services delivered by the Town can continue to be delivered efficiently and effectively without service interruptions.

Provide Your Input

The 2024 Proposed Town Budget is now available for public review and input. The proposed budget includes the 2024 operating budget, a five-year capital budget, and proposed Fees and Charges. The purpose of the proposed budget is to serve as a starting point for budget discussions with Council and members of the public.

The budget will be reviewed and deliberated by Council at a series of special budget meetings scheduled for the following dates:

Monday, January 8, 2024, at 9:30 a.m.
Tuesday, January 9, 2024, at 9:30 a.m.
Wednesday, January 10, 2024, at 9:30 a.m.
Thursday, January 11, 2024, at 9:30 a.m. (if necessary)

The special budget meetings will be conducted in person and will be live-streamed, with a recording posted to the Town website following the meeting. Following review and direction from Council through these meetings, revisions to the budget may be made, and the updated draft budget will be posted to the Town website on Wednesday, February 7, 2024.

Following the release of the updated budget, the Town will hold a Public Meeting on Tuesday, March 12, 2024. The public meeting provides the opportunity for residents to address Council directly or to submit an email or letter that will be read aloud by the Town Clerk.

Following the public meeting, Town Staff will then bring a report to the Committee of the Whole on Monday, March 18, 2024, outlining the public's comments from the Public Meeting. Following this meeting, any further changes will be incorporated into the 2024 Budget for Council approval, which is expected to occur on Tuesday, April 2, 2024.

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

Grey County Council

Grey County Council met on December 14, 2023, in the Council Chamber and virtually on Zoom. Recordings of the meetings can be found on Grey County's YouTube Channel.

Committee of the Whole

Grey County is partnering in a significant road improvement and expansion project in the Town of The Blue Mountains on Grey Road 19 including an intersection at Grey Road 21 and Highway 26. Council supported a notice of motion from Councillor Matrosovs to continue communicating and collaborating with project partners (The Town of The Blue Mountains, the Ministry of Transportation and Simcoe County) to ensure this project addresses the evolving needs of the area including newer developments and active transportation.

Council heard a delegation from Tom Allwood on behalf of the Multi-Municipal Energy Working Group about battery energy storage systems. The Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) is looking to expand capacity and there are active battery storage proposals within Grey County. Mr. Allwood shared the group's concern about these facilities in rural areas, noting proposals would remove active farmland and municipal fire services are not prepared to deal with fires at battery storage facilities. The Working Group is advocating for municipalities to have a voice and the ability to decline or support projects proposed in their communities.

Grey County is forming a **budget subcommittee** of Council in 2024. This committee will work along staff through the year and make recommendations on the development of the County budget.

Council appointed members to subcommittees and task forces for the upcoming year.

Grey County developed a Land Acknowledgement Policy in 2021 to demonstrate respect for the history of Indigenous Peoples and their past and present contributions. Council voted to repeal this policy, which has become too prescriptive, and move forward with a less structured framework that will allows for more meaningful recognition and better reflects Grey County's commitment to Truth and Reconciliation.

Council heard a summary of the **Community Improvement Plan Program**. This program contributions \$20,000 per municipality per year in support of local municipal Community Improvement Plan incentives. These incentives vary by municipality and may include surplus land grants, façade and property improvement grants, heritage property tax relief and more. Council voted to consider extending the program in the 2024 budget. It will be discussed as part of budget deliberations.

Council heard an update on the surplus lands project and supported options to explore selling or granting surplus County land to third-party developers to create affordable housing. The County will also consider selling or leasing public lands for market-rate housing and reinvesting the income into other affordable housing projects.

Ontario Unveils Plan to Build Modern Schools Faster

The Ontario government is introducing new measures to build modern schools faster that will cut construction timelines by nearly 50 per cent to meet the unprecedented pace of growth across the province. In Ontario, the average school construction timeline is 4-7 years, which comes from an obsolete capital process that has not been meaningfully overhauled since 2010-11.

For the first time, Ontario will ensure school boards are building schools in nearly half the amount of time it before through a faster, transparent, accountable and clearer process that prioritizes shovel-ready projects.

School boards will follow a more stream-lined process to identify and dispose of unused property, generate more revenue to reinvest back in schools, create schools in mixed-use buildings like condominiums and use existing buildings in their communities. Key reforms include:

- Prioritizing shovel-ready projects and enhanced accountability requirements as school boards provide realistic project costs and timelines.
- Strengthened accountability framework to reduce approval timelines and stronger project oversight with the introduction of project agreements that lay out key milestones and delivery timelines.
- Standardizing designs of new schools to reduce school board planning time and mitigate scheduling delays.
- Greater collaboration between school boards and municipalities to ensure planning and construction of schools is targeted to ongoing and future growth.
- · Reducing red tape with streamlined approval and reporting requirements on new school builds.
- Effectively using space by supporting school boards in working together to operate schools in joint-use facilities between two or more boards within the same building, where appropriate, or as

- shared-use sites where a school is part of a larger building with multiple users, such as a school within a mixed-use condominium.
- Identifying and disposing of unused surplus school board property at fair market value, first considering local school board pupil accommodation needs and then provincial priorities such as long-term care and affordable housing before being sold by school boards on the open market. School boards will continue to reinvest proceeds of disposition back into their school facilities.

These measures have been incorporated into this (2023year's 24) Capital Priorities Program as well as through new regulation that takes effect December 31, 2023.

The reforms will address the changing needs of the province and ensure that Ontario building is schools faster and better utilizing taxpayer dollars effectively.

Closing the gap in primary care:

Cancer and Chronic Disease Screening Clinic

Gillian Elmes, nurse practitioner and **Christine Fenton**, RPN, launched a virtual and in-person Cancer and Chronic Disease Screening Clinic this month at the Blue Mountains Community Health Center, 78 King Steet East (Hwy. 26), Thornbury.

With thousands of local residents having limited access to preventative health care services, the clinic aims to increase access to routine cancer and chronic disease screening and treatment. Supporting Ontarians aged 21 and older who don't have a primary care provider, the clinic will facilitate timely, age-appropriate, evidence-based screening tests for:

- · Breast, colorectal, cervical, lung and prostate cancer
- Hypertension and atrial fibrillation
- Diabetes
- Dyslipidemia
- Osteoporosis
- Sexually transmitted infections

This kind of preventative care helps people live healthier, longer lives by screening for diseases before symptoms develop. With early detection, we can help prevent disease, intervene early and avoid complications that happen with advanced or untreated disease.

How to get screened

Contact the clinic to schedule a virtual intake assessment to determine your individual risks, discuss screening tests recommended for you, and facilitate referrals. When test results are received, a follow up appointment will be scheduled at the clinic. In-person appointments are available for adults requiring screening for hypertension, atrial fibrillation, prostate or cervical cancer.

Publicly funded and private fees

Diagnostic screening tests and specialist referrals are OHIP-funded when ordered by a nurse practitioner, at no cost to Ontarians with a valid health card. At this time there is a fee for intake assessments and follow up appointments. The province of Alberta recently approved public funding for nurse practitioners in private practice - a decision we hope Ontario will soon follow as nursing associations advocate for new funding models for nurse practitioners in the province.
