LAUNCH OF PRE-BUDGET CONSULTATIONS



The House of Commons Finance Committee begins pre-budget consultations by asking Canadians and organizations to submit written briefs outlining what they would like to see in the upcoming budget.

The Finance Committee holds public hearings across the country to hear more from Canadians about their priorities

PRE-BUDGET **CONSULTATION REPORT**



The Finance committee presents a report based on the pre-budget consultations to the House of Commons. The report reflects the opinions of a majority of the committee members, and makes recommendations to the Government for the upcoming budget.

GOVERNMENT CONSIDERS THE REPORT



As part of its budget writing process, the Government will consider the committee's report and recommendations. Although the government is not obligated to act on the committee's recommendations, the pre-budget consultations provide an opportunity for parliamentary input into the budget planning process, as well as public discussion and debate regarding the government's spending and taxation priorities.



PRESENTATION OF THE BUDGET



The Minister of Finance presents the government's budget, which outlines the government's taxation and spending priorities for the coming fiscal year.

TABLING OF DOCUMENTS, REVIEW AND VOTES



The government tables its main estimates for the coming fiscal year (the government's spending plans) and its departmental plans (which set out the results that departments intend to achieve). The House of Commons votes and approves the Appropriation Bill (spending funds). The Bill is then sent to the Senate for review and approval.

GOVERNMENT PROVIDES UPDATES

The Minister of Finance presents an economic and fiscal update, which provides mid-year information on the country's economic growth and the state of the government's finances.

The government presents its public accounts, which outline the government's actual spending during the year

Canadians are Invited to Share Their Priorities for the 2024 Federal Budget

The House of Commons Standing Committee on Finance is inviting Canadians to participate in its annual pre-budget consultations process. The Committee intends to table a report on these consultations in the House of Commons prior its adjournment in December 2023.

"The House Finance Committee's pre-budget consultations provide Canadians with a great opportunity to convey their priorities for the government's forthcoming budget," said Mr. Peter Fonseca, M.P. for Mississauga East—Cooksville. "I am sure that Canadians will once again share their views in large numbers this year. I am always impressed by the breadth and quality of proposals that are brought to our attention and I look forward to learning about them."

The deadline for submitting written briefs through the Committee's website is no later than Friday, August 4, 2023 at 11:59 p.m. Eastern Standard Time.

Written briefs must be no longer than 2,000 words and should adhere to the following template. All text contained in the written brief, including - but not limited to - graphs, quotes, images and footnotes will count towards the limit of 2,000 words. Only one written brief per organization or individual will be accepted. Written briefs that do not meet these requirements may not be considered by the Committee. Following translation, the written briefs will be posted on the Committee's website.

Committee Clerks will extend invitations to selected individuals and organizations to appear in the fall. All those who submit a written brief will be considered as having made a request to appear. The Committee intends to hold hearings in Ottawa as well as in the following cities: Charlottetown, Halifax, Fredericton, St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador, Québec, Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver.

The federal government has launched its pre-budget consultations process and is inviting Canadians to participate by submitting a brief. A brief is a simple, direct document that includes your few recommendations for the upcoming budget.

These consultations will be considered by the Standing Committee on Finance. From there, the Committee will make recommendations for the Minister of Finance in preparation of the 2024 federal budget. It's a great opportunity for all Canadians to participate in the democratic process!

The format: Submissions must be no longer than 2,000 words. Brief should follow this template.

The deadline: Friday, August 4, 2023 at 11:59 p.m. EST.

The process:						
STEP 1	Draft your brief. To do so, we encourage you to review the <u>briefs submitted in advance of the 2023 Federal Budget</u> .					
STEP 2	Format your brief using the federal government template (included in our toolkit).					
STEP 3	Review your brief. Ensure it: A Provides context. Who are you, what do you do, and why? See this submission as a way to introduce the government to your organization and cause. Tell the government why they should be concerned about the issue, and convince them to apply your solutions. A Is clear and concise. Brevity is important. The committee has to read hundreds, make your brief stand out. Formulate clear and direct policy recommendations. Puts yourself in the government's shoes. Understand what they want to accomplish and pitch your request in a way that will help them achieve their goals. Is backed by data (quantitative & qualitative). The government likes evidence-based policy, so support your recommendations as much as you're able to. Include examples and data to illustrate the problems and how your recommendations will lend solutions.

Ontario Reducing Wait Times in Emergency Departments

\$44 million investment helping people get faster access to care in EDs across the province

OTTAWA — The Ontario government is investing an additional \$44 million this year in 165 high volume and smaller emergency departments to reduce wait times and provide people with faster and easier access to timely care close to home.

This funding is in addition to the \$90 million Ontario invests each year to reward emergency departments that put in place innovative solutions to reduce ED wait times including hiring additional health care staff, accessing more transportation to help transfer medically stable patients out of emergency departments, and creating new heads

"When someone experiences a medical emergency, it is vital that they get the urgent attention they need quickly," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "By offering more funding for hospitals who show the greatest success in reducing wait times in their emergency departments, we are providing more support for them to deliver faster emergency care to the communities they serve."

Hospitals have the flexibility to decide how to spend this funding on local solutions that will help people receive care faster and reduce their length of stay in an emergency department. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, this annual funding helped emergency departments connect people to care sooner by decreasing the average time spent in emergency departments by 12.2 per cent.

To continue building on this success, Ontario is investing an additional \$29 million this year to 75 high volume emergency departments across the province to increase their capacity to help more patients and reduce the amount of time people have to wait to access care.

An additional \$15 million will also expand the number of smaller hospitals now eligible to receive this funding. This will help support up to 90 hospitals across the province that provide emergency care to fewer than 30,000 patients a year, so they can hire and retain the staff they need to keep their emergency departments open.

With Your Health: A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care, the province is continuing to find innovative ways to reduce wait times and make it faster and easier for Ontarians to access timely emergency care, closer to home.

On July 27th, Cross Atlantic Communication Day commemorates the invention of transatlantic communication telegraph cables. In 1866, a telegraph cable was erected across the Atlantic Ocean to connect Europe and North



America, a watershed moment in history. It took a total of 12 years to finish the project. It began in 1854 and was completed on July 27, 1866. The project necessitated many ships, trials, failures, and a large sum of money to lay the cables. It was first attempted to establish a 1,700-mile line between Newfoundland and Ireland in 1857. The project was shelved after the cable repeatedly broke. The project's success was a big win for many individuals.

The Cross Atlantic communication telegraph wires were built by many brilliant brains, making life easier for everyone. With faster communication came new opportunities for people around the world. Communication has continued to develop and improve over time. The internet has made messaging, phone calls, and video calls an instant commodity. Communication across the Atlantic is now swift and easy. Without giving it much thought, people can communicate with other people in different parts of the world. Ontario Launching Mobile Skilled Trades Classrooms

TORONTO — The Ontario government is investing \$5.4 million to design and build three mobile tech classrooms that will travel across the province and teach students and young people about the skilled trades. The classrooms, built and operated by Skills Ontario, will feature hands-on learning stations and simulators for electrical systems, welding, crane operation, auto-painting, tire and brake work, heavy machinery and more. Over three years, they will let nearly half a million people explore the skilled trades and will help tackle the labour shortage the province faces in a critical industry.

"By 2025, one in five jobs in Ontario will be in the skilled trades. These are rewarding, well-paying careers that you can build a family and a life around," said Monte McNaughton, Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development. "That's why our government will continue to invest in cutting-edge programs that give students the chance to experience the 144 trades and life-changing opportunities available to them."

"Since rolling out our first Trades & Tech truck last year, our mobile classroom has provided thousands of students with hands-on learning experiences," said Ian Howcroft, CEO of Skills Ontario. "This program ignites an awareness of opportunities in the skilled trades and tech field that inspires more young people to pursue these careers. We want to thank and recognize Minister McNaughton and Premier Ford for the leadership and investments they have provided to build the skilled workforce of tomorrow."

Last month, the government announced apprenticeship registrations increased by 24 per cent in the last year – from 21,971 to 27,319 – as more people decide to pursue rewarding, well-paying careers in the industry. This increase, including a 28 per cent jump among women, follows more than \$1 billion in investment in the skilled trades over three years, along with the launch of the new government agency, Skilled Trades Ontario.

"I recently announced that starting in September of 2024, all high school students will take at least one technology education course to create pathways to exciting jobs of the future," said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "Ontario's new mobile tech classroom will support 150,000 students every year in learning those critical skills that will set them up for success in a good-paying job."

The province helped launch the Trades & Tech Truck pilot program in 2022. The first truck reached over 40,000 students and young people, visiting more than 50 events across the province.

This project is funded through the government's Skills Development Fund, an over \$700 million initiative, which supports ground-breaking programs that connect jobseekers with the skills and training they need to find well-paying careers close to home.

Quick Facts

- The new mobile classrooms will be fully operational by the summer of 2024 and will accommodate 150,000 visitors a year.
- 1.3 million people are working in skilled trades-related occupations in Ontario.
- In 2021, about one in three workers in Ontario with an apprenticeship or trade certificate were aged 55 or over and nearing retirement.
- In total, there were 93,866 apprentices active in Ontario as of July 2023.
- Through its first three funding rounds, the Skills Development Fund has supported 596 projects, to help over half a million people around the province take the next step in their careers.
- The Ontario government launched the new \$224 million capital stream for the Skills Development Fund on June 30 to support the building of new training centres and the renovation or expansion of existing ones.
- Ontario's Skills Development Fund is supported through labour market transfer agreements between the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario.

A Dream Fulfilled at the Inglis Falls Arboretum:

The Inglis Falls Arboretum Alliance (IFAA), a volunteer committee of Grey Sauble Conservation Authority (GSCA) who help enhance and maintain the Inglis Falls Arboretum, welcomed guests and the public to a special event on Tuesday to celebrate the completion of the "Fulfilling the Dream" sign project. This project was made possible through funding from the Toronto Dominion Friends of the Environment Foundation and fulfilled a 60-year-old dream of having a fully labelled arboretum that showcases the identification of trees found locally and from around the world. Visitors to the Arboretum can now identify and learn about the species of trees and shrubs from their labels while enjoying the 2.5 kilometres of trails that traverse this beautiful property!

Nancy Brown, Chair of the IFAA, shared historical milestones with event attendees and acknowledged the development of "great ideas" and collaboration that contributed to the extensive Arboretum that exists today. When asked what this special day meant to her, Brown shared: "It was an honour for me to stand and speak among my peers of like-minded individuals who love trees, respect the environment and care about the future. The Inglis Falls Arboretum Alliance is proud to showcase the new educational portion of the collection of woody plants in the arboretum. Each one of 165 different species is identified on 280 informational mounted signs throughout the 27 acres and trails around the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority Administration Centre. The funding through Toronto Dominion Friends of the Environment and the Grey Sauble Conservation Foundation along with the support of GSCA staff and many other local community groups has made this dream come true for the Inglis Falls Arboretum Alliance."

The Inglis Falls Arboretum, located at 237897 Inglis Falls Road in Owen Sound, is a popular destination for nature appreciation, dog walking, and those looking for a leisurely hike. 


