Art Installation Unveiled on Indigenous People's Day at Blue Mountain Resort

Blue Mountain Resort is honoured to officially unveil Blue's new mountaintop art installation entitled Elevate (Mbin'ge) by Anishinaabe artist Kathryn Corbiere One KWE in celebration of National Indigenous Peoples Day.

Everyone is invited to reflect on the meanings of the seven teachings of the Anishinaabeg, represented by the seven pillars in this piece, who are the original inhabitants and stewards of the territory where Blue Mountain is situated. The piece is installed just south of the Silver Bullet chairlift (the Open-Air Gondola in the summer). At about 20 feet high, it will be the biggest work Corbiere has completed to date.



Viewers can pause at each pillar and let their eyes be drawn to the seven teachings (values) of wisdom, respect, truth, humility, honesty, bravery and love. At the apex of the pillars is a two-toned mountain peak that represents the beloved Niagara Escarpment. The cut-outs within each pillar provide texture, visual interest and positive and negative space allowing light to move through the metal and take up the inner and outer spaces.



Rosemary Gosselin Named Senior of the Year

The Town is pleased to announce that local resident Rosemary Gosselin has been selected as the recipient of the 2023 Province of Ontario Senior of the Year Award for the Town of The Blue Mountains.

Established in 1994, the Senior of the Year Award honours one outstanding local senior in each municipality in Ontario. The nominee must be over the age of 65 and have enriched the social, cultural or civic life of the community.

Rosemary was presented with the award by Mayor Matrosovs and Councillors at the June 19 Council Meeting. "Rosemary is a deserving winner of the Senior of the Year Award. She is a founding member of the Climate Action Now Network, she has previously served on the board of the Blue Mountain Watershed Trust, and for years has championed sustainability initiatives within the Town, from our landfills to our cemeteries," explained Mayor Andrea Matrosovs. "Her compassion for our environment and community is always a balance of advocacy and a spirit of collaboration to find solutions to challenges together. On behalf of Town Council and the community, I'd like to thank Rosemary for her contributions and congratulate her on this award."

Important Information From Smart Serve Ontario

On November 29, 2021, Ontario's new liquor legislation, the new Liquor Licence and Control Act, 2019 (LLCA), came into effect. At the same time, the Registrar's Interim Standards and Requirements (Interim Standards) will also come into effect and will apply to all licence and permit holders in the liquor sector.



The Interim Standards will include a requirement that anyone involved in the sale, service, delivery or sampling of liquor, or who takes liquor orders from customers, must hold a valid (non-expired) certificate from a liquor training program approved by the Board of the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO). Smart Serve is Ontario's only approved liquor training program.

Building off this requirement in the Interim Standards, the AGCO is introducing a five-year term for all new and existing liquor training certifications. This means that anyone involved in the sale, service, delivery, or sampling of liquor, or who takes liquor orders from customers must complete the Smart Serve training program every five years.

AGCO has adopted the industry best practice of recertification in recognition of the significant recent modernization to Ontario's liquor sector. The Smart Serve program has continually evolved, including by introducing content on the new LLCA, cannabis consumption, grocery sales, tailgating, alcohol delivery and sexual violence and harassment in licensed establishments. As the liquor sector continues to evolve, recertification will help ensure that servers, delivery and sales staff remain well-informed and up-to-date on current liquor laws and that they maintain the necessary skills and behaviors to sell, serve and deliver alcohol responsibly.

Recertification will begin starting on July 1, 2022, but no certificates will expire until one year later, on June 30, 2023:

- Liquor training certificates issued before July 1, 2018, will expire on June 30, 2023, at 11:59pm. This includes Smart Serve certificates and certificates issued prior to 1995 from the Server Intervention Program (SIP).
- Smart Serve certificates issued on or after July 1, 2018, will expire 5 years from the date of issuance (e.g., if you were certified on July 2, 2018, your certificate will expire on July 1, 2023 at 11:59pm).
- Certificate holders must recertify before their certificate expires in order to maintain a valid certificate. As of July 1, 2022, all Smart Serve certificates (new and existing) will include expiry dates. Existing certificate holders can check their certificate expiry date by logging into their Smart Serve account.

Agenda Item for June 26th Committee of the Whole

The support of Staff Report FAF.23.092, entitled "Municipal Accommodation Tax Review and Stakeholder Engagement Plan"; would direct staff to further investigate the implementation of Municipal Accommodation Tax, including community and industry stakeholder consultation sessions and report back by November 2023 with a summary of the findings including an economic impact analysis and a feasibility review of structure and governance options; and that Council supports funding to an upset limit of \$40,000 from the 2023 Operating Budget to review and evaluate Municipal Accommodation Tax.

The purpose of the staff report would be to provide Council with an outline of the proposed project work plan that will be used to review and gather information regarding Municipal Accommodation Tax. The report also seeks input and direction from Council to proceed with further investigation to review Municipal Accommodation Tax, including community and industry stakeholder consultation and engagement.

Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT) is a tax levied on the purchase of transient accommodations within a municipality. The funds collected through the tax are used to promote tourism and to support tourism-related activities and projects. MAT came into effect on December 1, 2017 and is governed by O. Reg. 435/17: Transient Accommodation Tax. The regulation provides municipalities with discretion to determine the types of short-term accommodation the tax would apply to, such as short-term accommodations, hotels/motels, campgrounds, overnight mooring, etc.

The regulation does not provide a definition of transient accommodation; however, it is generally accepted that transient accommodation is defined as overnight stays of 29 days or less. In addition, the regulation does not provide guidelines related to the amount or percentage of the levied tax rate, although through review, most municipalities have set the tax rate at 4%. It is important to note that the tax can only be applied to the purchase of accommodation and does not apply to incidental fees and charges unrelated to the purchase of accommodation, such as room service, laundry services, parking, etc.

New Canadian Rental Housing Index Highlights New National Data Showing Alarming Increase in Rental Costs and Housing Affordability Challenges Across the Country

The Canadian Rental Housing Index (the Index) has released its latest findings, revealing a staggering increase in rental costs and significant housing challenges faced by renter households across the country between 2016 – 2021, along with a number of other worrying affordability trends.

The Index is a critical tool for understanding the state of rental housing in the country, analyzing important data from the latest long-form census in 2021. It is unique in its comparison of rents, incomes, overcrowding, and housing quality across demographics – considerations not otherwise available when reviewing rent figures alone.

One of the most concerning trends identified by the Index is the substantial surge in rental costs, particularly in provinces and regions that were already expensive. Between 2016 and 2021, the largest increases in average rents were in British Columbia (30%) and Ontario (27%). Both provinces also lead the country in the highest proportion of renters spending unaffordable or crisis amounts on rent and utilities.

The impact of soaring rental costs in Canadian households remains dire, with one in three (33%) of renters paying an unaffordable amount of their income on housing costs. Within this group of renters, 13% are paying crisis-level amounts at over 50% of their income and placing them at an increased risk of homelessness. In terms of real people, this is as high as 262,300 renter households spending over 50% in Ontario and 128,800 households spending over 50% in Quebec.

"The Index data released today show us the results of collective failure on rental housing investments over the last quarter century," said Jill Atkey, CEO of the BC Non-Profit Housing Association. "The hundreds of thousands of renters struggling to get by in today's crushing rental markets expect all levels of government and industry stakeholders to work together to solve this crisis."

Also concerning is the deteriorating quality of rental housing stock in Canada with an alarming number of units in need of major repairs, as well as the fact 500,000 renter households are resorting to living in overcrowded conditions to keep a roof over their heads. Overcrowding exists across Canada in rural areas, northern communities, and urban environments.

"Behind each statistic in the index are thousands of renter families and households. This new data demonstrates they are not alone in their struggle to keep up with their housing costs, whether they live in the biggest centres in the country or the smallest communities," said Marlene Coffey, CEO of the Ontario Non-Profit Housing Association. "The data is a call to action that we need to do more to address rental costs, rental housing quality and in particular ways to support marginalized renters in Canada's housing market."

Unlike previous releases of the Index, this year's database also digs into who is most impacted by these affordability challenges. Examples of systemic oppression are evident across the Index data, with higher levels of representation from marginalized communities in several areas including overcrowding, homes in need of major repairs and affordability. As examples, women-led renter households faced higher rates of affordability challenges than households led by men; and 13% of Indigenous-led renter households were living in homes in need of major repairs compared to 7% of non-Indigenous households. In Quebec, racialized renter households were more likely to be living in overcrowded housing in the province.

"These conditions perpetuate a cycle of inequality and hardship, disproportionately affecting marginalized communities," said Margaret Pfoh, CEO of the Aboriginal Housing Management Association. "In addition to the unique challenges Indigenousled households face, these difficult renting conditions also impact women-led, racialized-led, and Immigrant-led households across Canada."

"This stark reality demands our attention and concerted efforts. We cannot ignore the significant proportion of renter households burdened with unaffordable housing expenses, putting them at an increased risk of homelessness if they are forced to leave their home," said Ray Sullivan, Executive Director of the Canadian Housing and Renewal Association. "We must work together to create a future where all Canadians can access quality housing."



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Ontario Attracts Historic Number of People to Skilled Trades

The Ontario government has increased apprenticeship registrations by 24 per cent in the last year – from 21,971 to 27,319 as more people decide to pursue rewarding, well-paying careers in the skilled trades. In addition, the second year of the province's highly popular skilled trades career fairs for students will be expanding to even more cities around the province.

The historic increase in apprenticeship registrations, including a 28 per cent jump among women, follows more than \$1 billion in investment in the skilled trades over three years, along with the launch of a new agency: Skilled Trades Ontario.

"We are taking action across the board by making it easier for students to have apprenticeships, skills and credentials recognized towards their Diploma," said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "This builds on Ontario's recent decision to require all students to take at least one technological education course -- opening up the horizons and opportunities of all students into good-paying STEM and skilled careers."

To reduce the stigma related to the trades and make more students, teachers and parents aware of these life-changing opportunities, Ontario's skilled trades career fairs for students will be returning for the second year in a row and in more cities. More information on the 2023 fairs, cities, and dates will be announced later this summer.

Students in grades 7 to 12 will have the chance to learn about the 144 different skilled trades through interactive exhibitions and hands-on activities while hearing directly from tradespeople and local employers about these lucrative careers.

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
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
