Public Information Centre #1 for Bay Street East Reconstruction-Thursday, April 18, 5pm to 7pm

The Town of The Blue Mountains needs to install a secondary sanitary forcemain from the Mill Street Pumping Station to the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant (TWWTP) to service growth in the west portion of the municipality. The secondary forcemain will begin at the Mill Street Sewage Pumping Station and follow Bay Street East to Grey Street, and then proceed south on Grey Street to the treatment plant.

The Town's Asset Management Plan indicates that the sanitary sewer and watermain on Bay Street is in poor to very poor condition and is approaching the end of its useful life. Considering that Bay Street will be significantly disturbed from Mill Street to Grey Street for the installation of the secondary forcemain, this provides a good opportunity to reconstruct the entire road to ensure that the watermain, sewers and stormwater systems are updated and adequate for the next 50-75 years. The project will also see the installation of a new outfall pipe on Grey Street from the TWWTP to Georgian Bay.

The Town hosted Neighbourhood Meeting on Saturday, December 2 at Bayview Park. The Town's project team was able to illustrate some of challenges they face based on existing conditions, and residents were able to share their concerns



and thoughts on different elements of the project including active transportation options, impacts to trees, traffic calming measures, road alignments and drainage and stormwater management. The feedback gathered from the Neighbourhood Meeting, along with regulatory requirements, the Town's Official Plan, Transportation Master Plan and Engineering Standards has been used to inform the preliminary design alternatives and prepare for this first Public Information Centre .

Eclipse



Grey Bruce Public Health is urging residents to resist the temptation to look directly at the sun during the upcoming solar eclipse and take steps to safeguard their visual health during this relatively rare celestial event.

On April 8, 2024, parts of southern and eastern Ontario will experience a total solar eclipse for the first time since 1925. Grey-Bruce will be outside of the so-called Path of Totality – a narrow area where the moon will completely block out the sun – but will still experience a partial eclipse.

The eclipse is expected to begin at about 2 p.m. and continue until 4:30 p.m. The eclipse will peak around 3:20 p.m.

It is never safe to stare directly at the sun, but it may be tempting to do so during a solar eclipse.

Looking directly at the sun during an eclipse can cause retinal burns, blurred vision, and/or temporary or permanent loss of visual function, according to the Ontario Association of Optometrists. Damage to the eyes can occur without any sensation of pain.

Grey Bruce Public Health advises the following:

- Do not look directly at the sun without proper eye protection during the solar eclipse. Looking at even a small sliver of the sun before or after the eclipse without proper eye protection can harm vision.
- Keep a close eye on children and other vulnerable family members during the eclipse to ensure they do not inadvertently look up at the sun without proper eye protection.
- To safely view the eclipse, ISO-certified eclipse glasses that meet the ISO 12312-2 international safety standard must be worn. Ensure these glasses are in good condition, without any wrinkles or scratches, and that they fully cover the entire field of vision. Put on the glasses when looking away from the sun, then look at the eclipse. Look away from the sun before taking the glasses off.
- Regular sunglasses or homemade filters will not protect the eyes.
- It is not safe to view the eclipse through a camera/phone lens, telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device.
- Other ways to safely experience the solar eclipse include watching a livestream of the event or creating and using an eclipse box or pinhole projector.
- Anyone experiencing temporary vision loss or blurred vision during or after the eclipse should speak with their eye care professional or healthcare provider as soon as possible.
- Anyone experiencing blindness (immediate or delayed) after viewing the eclipse must seek emergency care immediately.

Everyone needs a home

According to the 2021 Canada census 38.7 percent of tenants in The Blue Mountains and 35.9 percent of tenants in Meaford are spending 30 percent or more on shelter costs. Many restaurants and other businesses in the area are seeking employees, but often potential employees cannot find affordable housing.

Georgian Bay Home Share (GBHS) is a non-profit organization that assists employed young people to find safe, comfortable and affordable housing in a shared living arrangement with an older adult. Assistance with designated chores that may include one or more of grass cutting, companionship, tech help, shopping is offered in lieu of some rent. The home provider receives some assistance and the young person receives a safe, comfortable and affordable place to call home.

GBHS is currently interviewing home seekers and home providers. There is a particular need for home providers. The interview process, which can involve several conversations with the GBHS team includes reference and police checks for both home seekers and home providers.

Fighting Food Waste

We all have a role to play in limiting food waste.

By Laura Needham, Public Health Dietitian How often do you toss wilted vegetables, sketchy leftovers, or edible scraps in the trash?

Throwing away food may seem like a small thing, but food loss and waste is

a big issue in Canada – one requiring the attention of consumers, businesses, and governments.

A 2021 report estimates that 58% of all food in Canada is being lost or wasted. That equates to about 35.5 million tonnes every year - of this \$49.46 billion worth is rescuable.

Every year, each Canadian household throws away an average of \$1,766 in food that could have been eaten.

Food in our landfills is costly for us and the environment. When food is thrown away, the resources used to produce, transport, and prepare it are also wasted; everything from water and dedicated land to fuel and human resources.

As food decomposes in a landfill, it produces greenhouse gases, including methane, which has 86 times the global warming potential of carbon dioxide over 20 years.

We all have a role to play in limiting our waste.

We must avoid a two-tiered food system that demands food charity and food insecure households to absorb our waste. Efforts to reduce food loss and waste require changes to how we think about and use our food - on both the individual and industry levels. At each step of the food supply chain – from production to consumption – there are opportunities to avoid or recover food loss and waste.

What can we do?

- Buying only the food you need is the first step to reducing food waste.
- Make a meal plan and shopping list before going to the grocery store. Include leftovers in your plans for meals the next day.
- Use the trimmings and scraps of the foods you prepare to make broths or sauces.
- Compost food materials that cannot be used.
- Stock up on foods that will last, like inexpensive and easily stored legumes (dried or canned beans, peas, lentils, or chickpeas).
- Think F.I.F.O. when storing your food First In, First Out bring older items forward so you won't forget them in the back corner of your pantry or freezer.
- Remember that Best Before Dates are set by manufacturers; they

- estimate when food will be at peak quality for taste, nutrition, or quality not when they are safe to eat.
- The best solutions seek to avoid food loss and waste in the first
- Do what you can to support food businesses that are working to reduce their waste. They may stock less-than-perfect-looking food, or find uses for food bi-products, like new food products or textiles.
- We can all take part in recovering edible food by sharing recipes, hosting dinner parties or potlucks that prioritize leftovers, and sharing what we know when we talk about food with family and friends.

For the second consecutive year and third time since 2017, Grey County has been named one of the world's Smart21 communities of the year by the Intelligent Community Forum (ICF). The announcement came on March 20 at the Smart Cities and Intelligent Communities conference in Taipei, Taiwan.

The ICF's annual Intelligent Community of the Year competition recognizes communities that embrace technology to realize economic, social, and cultural growth. Intelligent Community nominees are evaluated on six indicators: broadband, knowledge workforce, innovation, digital equality, sustainability, and advocacy.

Grey County was first named to the Top21 intelligent communities in 2016 and went on to achieve a Top7 designation in February 2017. Grey County reapplied to the forum in 2023 and was again named to the Top21 communities for that year.

Grey County's submission to the ICF featured a combination of County-led projects and partner initiatives, including the Sydenham Campus and partnerships with Georgian College. Sydenham Campus is an entrepreneurial and innovation hub supporting workforce development. Georgian College offers a broad and expanding number of programs. Many of the programs have been developed to target the specific needs in our region, such as growing apprenticeship programs, the expanded nursing wing and newly offered RPN-to-RN nursing degree program.

Other organizations and programs supporting Grev County as an intelligent community include the Grey Bruce Local Immigration Partnership, the YMCA, Nuclear Innovation Institute, Supportive Outreach Services and more.

"Becoming an intelligent community can't happen in a vacuum.

It takes collaboration. Grey County can show leadership and make investments, but we need partners coming together with shared goals if we are to be successful in moving our region forward, creating more opportunities without leaving people behind," explains Grey County's director of economic development, Savanna Myers. "Being named to the Top21 isn't just an achievement for Grey County, it's an achievement for all the people, businesses, institutions and volunteers who are committed to making our region a more prosperous place."

The selection of the Smart21 Communities marks the semi-finalist phase in ICF's annual program. For the next step, Grey County will work with the ICF to provide more detailed information about the community.

From this data, ICF will select seven communities to be named in June to the Top7 Intelligent Communities of 2024. Top7 communities will welcome the ICF for a tour and compete for the title of Intelligent Community of the Year at the 2024 ICF Global Summit in November.
