The Town of The Blue Mountains hosted its first annual Sustainability Summit on April 25, 2024. The morning consisted of presentations from keynote speakers, including discussions on the Future Story, Single Use Fibre Products + Organic Farming, and the Circular Economy. The afternoon included with a presentation and workshop from Green Economy Canada. This model is a proven community-based model of engaging businesses in climate action and sustainability.

Nipissing Ridge Park Reforestation Project

Late last fall, with funding support from Tree Canada, the Town of The Blue Mountains and Tree Trust collaborated to plant 26 large deciduous and conifer trees on the long, all-grass berm that surrounds Nipissing Ridge Park. Shortly after, on a chilly October day, volunteers applied compost and mulch at the base of each new tree and helped plant shrubs between the larger trees.

Thanks to the TBM-Tree Trust partnership, Tree Canada support, and the hard work of our growing volunteer network, approximately 1/3 of the long, 700+ meter berm has been planted.



This year, we hope to continue this new canopy project with two efforts:

Volunteers wanted for watering:

Regular watering of these newly planted trees and shrubs will be critical to their vitality and health. TBM Staff have installed a water line, and Tree Trust is now looking for volunteers to be part of the watering crew. Funding to plant more trees:

We are also looking for donors and funding sources for the next phase of berm reforestation at Nipissing Ridge Park. A successful application to TD FEF Fund will get us off to a great start, but more work is needed to green this important public park and contribute to our Town's tree canopy. On April 7th we had a fire that started in the basement due to a faulty appliance, it spread quickly into the rafters and upwards. The insurance company estimates that we will be closed for 2 to 3 months for repairs and clean up.



I'm fundraising for my staff of 10 to help supplement their missed payroll and gratuities that they count on to live and support their families. My son and I lived above the restaurant and will have to relocate during this time. A special thank you to Heather at The Loft Gallery for offering us a place to stay.

Our alarm system went off just as we were sitting down to dinner. After determining the fire was in the basement my son called 911 while I grabbed an extinguisher, I was able to put out part of the fire but it spread so quickly, we all had to evacuate immediately. (myself, my son, his girlfriend and our two dogs)

The fire department arrived quickly and put out the fire but there is concern that structural damage was done. A few walls had to be torn apart and the whole building has smoke and water damage. The main water line burst (which helped put the fire out)

All water and hydro had to be shut off to the building so we were going to lose all our fridge and freezer inventory. I decided to give away all the food rather than have it go to waste. I invited the staff to come fill their fridges and freezers with all they could and then contacted our neighbouring restaurants to take the rest so that very little was wasted.

Thank you to the local Fire Department for their quick response and to our neighbours for bringing blankets and drinks.

Council Updates

171 King Street: Council will be directing staff to initiate the formal process as required through the "Sale and Other Disposition of Land Policy POL.COR.07.02" to consider declaring Town owned lands as surplus with a Public Meeting on June 25, 2024 to receive comments from the public. Council has the opportunity to consider the potential uses of the 171 King Street property at a later date with the benefit of hearing from the public through this process. Staff will then initiate a Request for Proposal (RFP) regarding the potential disposition, sale or lease of 171 King Street East through a formal, transparent, and accountable selection process.

Update to Resident Parking Pass:

Staff presented 4 Options regarding the resident parking pass.

OPTION #1 was the perferred choice and will move forward at the next Council Meeting

"Hybrid Parking Pass System" will Include a hybrid option in relation to the parking pass system which would provide residents the option to purchase a maximum of two parking passes for their exclusive use for the balance of 2024. These passes would be available to purchase at a cost of \$5.00 which represents the costs associated with the administration only. Ontario Cracking Down on Cellphone Use and Banning Vaping in Schools

Ontario is introducing the most comprehensive plan in Canada to reduce distractions in classrooms and improve the health of children by standardizing and strengthening provincewide measures and mandatory learning to directly counter the alarming rise of vaping and cellphone distractions within classrooms.

Students in kindergarten to Grade 6 will be required to keep phones on silent and out of sight for the entire school day, unless explicitly permitted by an educator. For students in Grades 7 to 12, cellphones will not be permitted during class time unless explicitly directed by the educator. Moreover, social media websites will be removed from all school networks and devices, and report cards will include comment on students' distraction levels in class. The government will provide mandatory training for teachers and new supports for students and parents.

The government is also strengthening the rules around students caught using or carrying vapes or cigarettes. Students will be required to surrender these products, along with parents being notified immediately of the situation. The government also officially announced \$30 million in the 2024 Budget to install vape detectors and other security upgrades in schools.

To support these initiatives, the government is investing \$17.5 million in new wrap-around supports for student mental health and parent engagement. This will include:

- \$15 million to provide supports for students at risk of addictive behaviours
- \$1 million to partner with School Mental Health Ontario to develop webinars and resources targeted to parents and students across the province to learn how to talk about the adverse effects of vaping and excessive cellphone usage
- \$1.5 million to Parent Involvement Committees and students to run local prevention campaigns to help deter vaping and cellphone distractions

These changes and investments are part of the government's plan to get students back to basics. By removing distractions in the classroom, students can focus on learning the skills they need to succeed after graduation.

Quick Facts


- A 2023 UNESCO report found a negative link between excessive cellphone use and student academic performance and that students can take up to 20 minutes to refocus on what they were learning after focusing on a distraction.
- A CAMH study on youth, smartphones and social media use showed that over a third (35%) of Ontario's secondary school students spend five hours or more daily on electronic devices (smartphones, tablets, laptops, computers, gaming consoles) in their free time.
- A 2022 Statistics Canada report found that vaping is more prevalent among younger rather than older Canadians, with more than onefifth of adolescents aged 15 to 17 years reporting vaping in the previous 30 days.

In addition to explicitly banning e-cigarettes in schools and schoolrelated settings, Ontario is responding to the popularity of vaping among students by:

- Strengthening existing mandatory learning on cannabis and vaping and digital citizenship, with emphasis on the elementary curriculum
- Providing \$500,000 (2023-24) to the following community partners:
 - Ontario Native Education Counselling Association for culturally relevant cannabis and vaping awareness and prevention initiatives for youth
 - Canadian Lung Association for the "Lungs are for Life" program to raise awareness about tobacco, vaping and nicotine addiction
 - 3. Springboard for its "Weed Out the Risk" program to raise awareness among youth and young adults about the risks of driving or being in a vehicle with a driver who is under the influence of cannabis
 - Lung Health Foundation to deliver the "Quash" program, which includes digital resources and a mobile app for students who are smoking and/or vaping

ROGER JOHN SHORT

To die proudly, when it is no longer possible to live proudly. Death of one's own, free choice, death at the proper time, with a clear head and with joyfulness consummated in the midst of children and witnesses, so that an actual leave-taking is possible while he who is leaving is still there.

Roger Short died peacefully, at home in Clarksburg, with his family beside him on Friday, April 26th, 2024.

He will be missed by his wife Sue, his beloved children

Tim (Ann) and Helen (Ken) and his four exceptional grandsons, Ben, Nicholas, Matthew and Alexander of whom he was so proud. Born in Birmingham but at only days old, he and his Mum were evacuated to a small village in Wales to escape the constant bombing threat. (His father stayed through the blitz). Mother and son lived there for the next 5 years and Wales remained in Roger's heart and soul for the rest of his life.

Roger and Sue grew up in the same village in Somerset, UK and married in 1962 whilst Roger was a postgraduate student at Oxford. His career began in industry where some aspects had a bearing in the Forestry and Pulp and Paper industries. Roger was recruited and brought the family to Vancouver, BC in January 1965. That move resulted in crossing Canada frequently, living in Prince Rupert, Vancouver Island, Montreal and New Brunswick and time spent in Brussels, Belgium and France before returning to Canada. Much of Roger's working life was spent overseas or in other provinces of Canada as his mission was to 'save' companies in a spectrum of industries which were in trouble. He was proud to be able to say that he did not 'bury' any of them.

In 1981 we took possession of a tree farm in the Beaver Valley which we owned and loved for over 37 years before moving to Clarksburg. Roger was one of the founders of the Bruce Grey Woodlands Association and, on his own property, pruned most of the trees over time. He learned from, and was associated with, Herman McConnell who owned the property next door. Roger was passionate about the environment, and along with a close friend, they turned their hands to wind farming and together they embraced solar energy and efficiency too.

He loved to bike, hike, XCountry ski – participated in the first Ottawa ski marathon in 1967 and continued doing so from time to time for years – and snowshoe and swim – braving the cold waters of Georgian Bay from March to early November.He was proud of his involvement with the Rotman School of Management (where he obtained his MBA in 1979) and also the Temerty Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto.

Roger made a difference in so many ways, and this is his legacy. A private celebration of Roger's life will be held at a later date.



October 1, 1928 - April 20, 2024

At 21, June (Hambly) Krueger and husband, Ralph, were hired to teach at the new Hyde Park School in London because the Board thought it would be "romantic" to hire newlyweds. June taught K to 3 and Ralph 4 and up.

Though June's grades were as good (or better!) than Ralph's, like women of her



June's pioneering work with autistic children was well in advance of the SCERTS (versus ABA) model used today and brought tears to the eyes of parents who had never heard their children speak before.

In retirement, the Kruegers moved to Victoria Corners to enjoy serious gardening and skiing. We met on the ski hill. When I was expecting our youngest in 1999 Ralph had been diagnosed with prostate cancer (metastasized) but June still brought me a handmade quilt for baby Risa. Ralph died, at home, 6 months later. I always assumed June would stay in her home because of her many community connections. She belonged to two book clubs and was an active member of Amnesty International Group 82 which meets twice per month. She loved the BVA Lifelong Learning lectures followed by lunch out with her friend, Rosemary Barnett. Wednesday was my evening—usually for a movie, always tea and chat—and every year we binge-watched BBC's 6-hour Pride and Prejudice.

The pandemic was not good for June. She went from the engaged and stimulating life described above to being in a bubble of one and we all know that loneliness "carries greater health risk than obesity or smoking and has been shown to increase mortality, mobility loss, functional decline, and clinical dementia." [Tramutofoundation.com]

Still, I was shocked when she was moved to the LTC facility near Ottawa as I could be at her house (by car) in 8 minutes. Our mutual friend, Nida McMurchy, lives on June's road as does her friend, Kerri Knott, who mowed her lawn and her nearest neighbours—the Dixons—could keep an eye on her from their front door. That said, Orchardview is a lovely facility with kind caregivers who were with June when she died. The Greening of the SCP Centre in Meaford

Most people in this region recall shopping at the Meaford Factory Outlet or buying clay pots at the Scott Clay Products store, 278 Cook Street, Meaford. These businesses, mainstays of the local economy the time. were located in a commercial building owned by the Scott family, long-time residents of the area.



While both of these businesses are now gone – the factory outlet moved to another location and the clay products business wound down – the family renamed the building The SCP Centre and has made major investments in a mission to go green.

The family began its sustainability journey in 2011 with the installation of 246 KW of solar panels on the main warehouse roof as part of Ontario's FIT 1 Solar Program. This installation was a risky and expensive investment at the time since it was among the first FIT solar arrays in Ontario.

Starting in 2019, the family began an extensive energy efficiency program that included installing a new roof membrane over the majority of the building, LED lighting, door seals, blowers and many new windows and doors. These recent upgrades augment a new heating and cooling system in the SCP Centre that includes six heat pumps and high-efficiency boilers.

All of these green initiatives were sound, strategic investments, and The SCP Centre is now home to more than a dozen businesses who use the space for manufacturing, retail, or storage. As tenants, they can take pride in knowing they are using clean energy while significantly lowering carbon emissions.

Now, the Scott family is turning its attention to a 40-year-old, three-storey office building beside the warehouse that is ideal for retail or office space. Plans for the 15,000-square-foot building include replacing the HVAC system with large commercial heat pumps. Next up, this building will be retrofitted with new LED lighting and low-flow water fixtures.

The family's aim with these office building investments is to completely modernize the space and make it close to achieving Net Zero in carbon emissions. This means the building's sustainable features will mostly offset any greenhouse gases produced by human activity. With these enhancements in its office building and warehouse, the Scott family is committed to offering quality space and places of employment to businesses while lowering their environmental footprint.



The Challenge of Getting the Right Diagnosis

- is it heart, is it cancer, is it the liver, is it long covid, what is long covid, etc.??

Between December 2019 and March 2023, I had cold like symptoms and fatigue on and off and once a definite Covid confirmation. Told to go on a BRAT diet (broth, rice, apple sauce and white toast) and that it must be in my head, stress related. It turned out the white toast was the worst thing I could have done!

By luck, a friend in the area connected me with her weekend neighbour, who is a Doctor of Nutrition in private practice. So, this time I had a stool sample sent to a Lab in the US for an in-depth analysis which apparently is not offered here in Ontario by our health care system. Finally, I got a definite answer.

I had a leaky gut with three bad bacteria, no acidity, and a very compromised immune system which was why I could not digest any food. I was keeping the bad bacteria alive, feeding it with the white toast and not nourishing my body.

THE SOLUTION:

- Starve the bad bacteria for the next 3 to 4 months
- No flour (not even gluten free bread at all), no sugar, no yeast, no raw salads.
- Three specific probiotics and oregano pills daily to build up my acidity and immune system
- A limited diet: cooked root vegetables, berries, protein from chicken and fish, peanut butter, a little goat cheese. No wine as wine has sugar.

IT WORKED.

By Christmas I was back to normal. I had regained 5 of my 10 pounds back along with my energy. Now in April, I have it all back and my appetite is good again and I am digesting normally. I have

continued to cut back on flour and sugar as this is not good for us anyway.

I feel I may have had long Covid, (a general term as doctors try to figure out how this virus attacks our bodies). The medical system is trying to understand how this manifests itself in many of us in a variety of ways attacking heart, brain or digestion.

I was lucky that I was able to get help outside the system as I would not have known how to tackle this without a clear diagnosis. And, that I financially could afford to pay for the GI Microbial stool analysis, the consultation, the various probiotics (around \$2000 to get better).

I am sharing what happened to me as a hope for any of you that may be dealing with long Covid symptoms in some way. We are each different in our bodies, but it may mean going outside our health care system to get answers. And yes, it was a very frightening 8 months when I did not know what was wrong with me.

Nonetheless I was impressed by our health care system in Grey Bruce Counties. Receiving these tests in a timely and kind way that did eliminate what it was not. Referrals from my family doctor and quick testing at the Emergency Meaford Hospital were appreciated. The challenge is widening how we look at things and increasing our resources for an ever increasing and ever aging local population.

THIS WAS MY ANSWER: It All Starts with the GI-MAP

Research overwhelmingly indicates that gut health impacts overall health. The gut microbiome, mediates the effects of diet and other factors on health, including digestive, immune, metabolic, and neuroendocrine functions. Discover the Magic of Naturalizing Your Yard!

Families in The Blue Mountains are already doing a lot to Go Green for Blue! And we can do more! This spring, why not start naturalizing your yard? Join your neighbours whose gardens are now attracting birds and butterflies. Together, we can create a community-wide



corridor for migratory pollinators! Small changes like replacing some of your lawn with clovers, native grasses and pollinator plants will attract many more creatures than just sod munching grubs and moles.

To get started:

- Rope out an area, and remove grass by sheet mulching or solarisation
- Plant native trees, shrubs and plants
- Add mulch around plants, water as needed and watch them grow!
 Native species are home-bodies well adapted to The Blue Mountains.
 They need less maintenance and water, and support local wildlife.
 Some great native pollinator plants include:
- Coneflower (Echinacea) is a hardy perennial with daisy-like blooms. Thrives in full-sun.
- Black-Eyed Susan is a low to zero maintenance with golen-yellow petals
- Great Blue Lobelia is a long-blooming perennial.
- Scarlet Beebalm is best grown in clumps to attract bees, butterflies and hummingbirds.
- Dense Blazing Star, Culver's Root, and Bulblet Bladder Fern are other lesser-known but great Ontario Natives.
- There are also many native ferns, ground covers, climbers and grasses depending on your soil and sun exposure.

A few more tips:

- Compost and mulch is available from the Town's landfill site 788090, Grey County Rd 13, Clarksburg
- Collect rainwater with a rain barrel
- · Go to a neighbourhood plant swap

My Climate Story by K. Schaltz

5 years ago, I asked a group of 30+ year old adults what kept them up at night. I fully expected climate change to be their number one worry. It was not mentioned once... not once! I was surprised but understood all too well. Despite having spent much of my childhood in the wilderness of Lake of the Woods and having the love of nature embedded in my DNA, I lost my tether to the earth for many years. I spent 40 years living in the corporate and consumerism bubble, raising a family, raising our lifestyle and fully feeling a case of undiagnosed imposter syndrome without fully connecting the dots back to my dis-connection to Mother Earth.

I retired, moved to a smaller town and joined a hiking and garden group. But something still nagged. When I heard about a local climate action group of volunteers, that jump-started the learning curve and activism back to

whe re my heart really lay.

At a recent Climate Café, I sat beside a number of young adults as they described their anxiety, fear with sobs of regret for their children's future. How things have changed in five years! Many of us are kept awake at night wondering at our changing world. The local apple growers, the recreational fisherman, the indigenous people, municipal representatives, and the majority of the citizens privileged to live in a natural area such as The Town of the Blue Mountains are all affected by climate change. People are increasingly expressing concern for the preservation of our natural assets in surveys, news articles and in the coffee shops.

What to do? For me it's always immediate ACTION that provides the HOPE for improving my state of mind. So, joining Climate Action Now Network (CANN) as a volunteer has been a balm to my mind.

CANN's goal is simple: reduce carbon pollution in our corner of the planet. This is a goal I can get behind. And it's actually fun! It's the Earth Day Clean ups, the 400 free tree giveaways at the Beaver Valley Fall Fair, the teaming up with Tree Trust to plant 500 trees in TBM, it's the engagement with town hall in updating the Official Plan which is the guiding policy for land use in the municipality. Seniors Matters Today

- 1. Income Tax filing was due on April 30.
- a. If you miss the deadline, you can still file. If you don't owe taxes, there won't be penalties.
- b. For several benefits such as the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) for Seniors and certain types of tax credits, filing on time is your automatic reapplication to continue to qualify for benefits.
 - i. You will receive a notice from Canada Revenue Agency telling you that your GIS payment will stop and that you will have to reapply to have this income restarted.
 - ii. Filing your tax return on time, is also necessary to qualify for the Canadian Dental Care Program (CDCP).
- 2. **CDCP** Most seniors have now received a letter inviting them to apply for this new dental program and giving them a phone number to call to apply.
 - a. If you did not receive a letter and want more information, there is a phone number to call for help. 1-833-537-4342 and select 'Option 2'.
 - b. A few weeks after you apply, you will receive a letter containing information about the Sun Life program and a personal membership card for the program
 - c. The next step is to find an oral health care provider who is participating in the program.
 - Oral care providers (Family Dentists, Denturists, and the various specialist dentists) can decide whether or not to be part of the program.
 - ii. Patients can check on this with their oral health care provider, OR use the search 'tool' provided by Sun Life. sunlife.ca/sl/cdcp/en/member/provider-search OR phone Sun Life at 1-888-888-8110
- 3. **Home Care** There are 2 main organizations for getting care at home. They are not the same and don't provide the same services. Their names are very similar. On May 9th, BVO's Seniors Centre Without Walls New Territory4Seniors Information program is hosting a Lunch & Learn at L.E. Shore Library with speakers from each organization: Home and Community Care Support Services and Home & Community Support Services Grey Bruce.



The Master Gardener's Corner

Things to do in your garden each month taken from the Ontario Master Gardener Calendar by John Hethrington, Past President, Master Gardeners of Ontario. There's lots to do in your garden In May, now that Spring is finally here!

- If not done already, clean up winter debris in the garden as soon as the soil is dry enough to work. Cut off dead plant stocks. Dig in manure or compost around perennials and shrubs and weed well.
 An extra hour weeding now, will save 3 days later in the summer!!
- Use a line to cut sharp straight edges for your beds. For curved edges, run hot water through a hose to soften it up and lay out a smooth curve. Watch you don't chop the hose!
- Take coloured pictures of your spring bulbs in each of your gardens so you will know where there are any gaps and where the bulbs are when you order and plant more bulbs in the fall. Save the pictures in a safe place.
- Plan now to plant early blooming bulbs like snowdrops and crocus in the fall at places close to where you come in and out of the house. It's nice to be greeted by early signs of spring.
- Add 3" to 4" of mulch to flowerbeds and shrubs to conserve moisture and discourage weeds. Shredded cedar bark is best, but expensive. Try 13/Forty Landscape Supply who have 3 types of mulch: Cedar, Pine, Black and Utility, the cheaper kind that I use.
- Don't walk on or roll lawns that are still wet and full of water. If you can see your footprint, stay OFF the lawn. You will compact the soil.
- If your lawn is already compacted, rent an aerator which will dig out small plugs. Let the plugs dry and rake them back into the lawn as a top dressing. Add grass seed to bare patches.
- When dry, rake lawns vigorously to remove dead grass and thatch.
- Spread weed-free topsoil on thin patches in your lawn. Apply grass seed, roll and water with a mist setting. Keep seeded areas moist, but don't flood.
- If you find moss in your lawn, the soil is too acidic. Apply dolomite lime before a rain. You may need a second application.
- If you have pots or planters that are very big or deep, put some empty plastic water bottles with lids in the bottom of the pot to take up the space the roots will never get to. It makes the planter or pot lighter and easier to move.
- Prepare containers and pots for planting. Fill with a mixture of compost and potting soil. Add peat moss, or better still, coconut coir to retain moisture.
- Place pots with culinary herbs close to the kitchen door for easy access.
- Harden-off seedlings for at least a week before planting outside. Google the last frost date for your area (June 1 in the Blue Mountains) and allow at least 1 week more before planting tender transplants such as annuals and tomatoes.
- Walk around your garden and look for perennials that should be divided, are in the wrong place, or you don't like any more. Pot them up for spring plant sales at least 3 weeks before the sale. Add compost, not garden soil to the pots. To be really fancy, add a little bone meal to the pot before you put in the plant. Add plant labels with the name (Botanical and/or common), colour, sun exposure, height, bloom time, etc. Water well and keep in the shade.
- Dig, pot up and donate 15 or more perennials to the St. George's annual Plant Sale and get an Income Tax Receipt for the retail value your plants sell for. Bring them to the church Wed May 31 9am to 3pm. It's a win-win for everyone.
- The giant annual St. George's Plant Sale is Sat June 1st this year on the church grounds in Clarksburg. It starts at 8 am.
- Plant beans now directly into the garden as they germinate quickly and will grow as long as the soil is warm. Maybe mid-May this year.
- Install peony rings before the plants start to grow.

- Monitor for the presence of slugs, cutworms, earwigs and tent caterpillars. Pick them off.
- Control weeds in the lawn by hand pulling. Use nematodes to control grubs, which eat the grass roots, leading to brown patches in the lawn in summer.
- · Prune roses according to type.
- Deadhead (cut the blooms off) tulips, daffodils and other spring bulbs but do not cut or pull out the leaves until they are brown and decayed. They are needed to nourish the bulbs for next year's bloom.
- If you have any fritillaria or Asian lilies, now is the time to watch for the red lily beetle (adult, larva and eggs). It seems that removal by hand is the best and only way to reduce this problem. Day lilies are beetle free.

Grey County Council Committee of the Whole

Grey County Council has declared **conditional support for the TC Energy pump storage project** in the Municipality of Meaford, pending necessary environmental studies, approvals and the support of Saugeen Ojibway Nation. Council discussed the project, citing the importance of power storage in Ontario's energy future as well as the local economic benefits. The project aligns well with many of Grey County's strategies, such as the County's Climate Action Plan, Corporate Strategic Plan, and Economic Development, Tourism and Culture Plan. Councillor Boddy brought forward the motion. A letter will be sent to TC Energy, Saugeen Ojibway Nation and federal and provincial ministers advising them of the declaration.

Grey County Council recommended awarding the **Rockwood Terrace** general construction contract to Melloul-Blamey Construction Ltd. with a bid of \$59,230,000 (excluding HST). The project will be co-funded by the provincial government and requires approval from the Ministry of Long-Term Care before the tender can be formally awarded.

Grey County will develop a memorandum of understanding with Grey Highlands, the Town of the Blue Mountains and Regional Tourism Organization 7 to outline commitments for achieving the goals of the **Beavery Valley Sustainable Tourism Strategy.** This strategy and three-year action plan aim to balance the economic, social, cultural and environmental needs and opportunities in the Beaver Valley Corridor.

Grey County will create a **new ecological offsetting policy** following consultation with member municipalities, conservation authorities, the Indigenous community, the building community and the Niagara Escarpment Commission. This new policy will preserve natural heritage in the area by balancing ecological impact during the development process. If development has an environmental impact and preservation options are not available, the policy will allow for compensation in equal or greater environmental value elsewhere.

What is being proposed?

The Town of The Blue Mountains is seeking to develop a Water and Wastewater Allocation Policy. This policy aims to provide a clear and cohesive set of guidelines that will govern the equitable allocation of water and wastewater resources to meet the evolving needs of the growing community in the most beneficial manner possible.

Currently, allocation is granted on a "first come, first serve" basis and the Town does not have a mechanism in place to grant allocation with a lens to community priorities. To do so, the Town is developing a policy that is inclusive of scoring criteria and an evaluation framework that can be applied when a development is positioned to execute an agreement to commence construction.

What is being proposed?

The proposal is seeking an amendment to Zoning By-law 2018-65 to update the Development 'D' Zone provisions. Currently, the zoning provisions of the former Town of Thornbury Zoning By-law 10-77 and Township of Collingwood Zoning By-law 83-40 continue to apply to lands zoned D within the Town. This has resulted in confusion regarding the permitted uses and standards associated with these lands.

In order to provide greater clarity for owners of D-zoned land, the Town is proposing to remove Section 1.5(g) of the Zoning By-law, which requires reference to the former Town of Thornbury and Township of Collingwood Zoning By-laws. In lieu of this provision, a list of permitted uses and standards will be developed for all D-zoned lands and incorporated into Zoning By-law 2018-65.

A draft of proposed provisions is included with this notice. Please note that these are subject to change following public consultation and a decision of Council. It is also noted that existing uses would be permitted to continue in accordance with Section 4.24 of the Zoning By-law

The effects of the draft provisions on D-zoned properties would include:

- 1. Additional residential units are added as a permitted use;
- 2. Existing uses are permitted to continue;
- Any modifications to main buildings must continue to meet the setbacks and height standards as established at the time of the By-law being passed;
- 4. Construction of new single detached dwellings on vacant properties are prohibited;
- 5. New accessory buildings and structures and additional residential units can be constructed in accordance with the relevant zoning provisions applicable to those uses.

MPP Saunderson at the event was Carol Bateman, an OTF volunteer. The Resilient Communities Fund grant program was created in 2020 to help non-profit groups and small communities rebuild from the impacts created by the pandemic.

"The much-needed funds will allow the hard-working team at Living Better with Parkinson's to better serve the community," says Simcoe-Grey MPP Brian Saunderson. "Most of us have a family member or friend who has lived or is living with Parkinson's and know firsthand about the support that's required."

Funds from the grant will be used over the coming year to hire additional staff with expertise in the areas of fund development, mentoring, volunteer recruitment, coaching, training, communications and public relations as well. The grant will also help with key administrative costs, purchasing some tech equipment, as well as helping with some workshop costs.

Securing charitable status in January 2021, Living Better with Parkinson's is committed to increasing the quality of life of people living with Parkinson's Disease and their caregivers in South Georgian Bay. Promoting daily physical activity, advocacy and education are the primary pillars ensuring that LBWP mission is achieved.



Over the next decade,1.5 per cent to 2 per cent of the population over 60 years will live with Parkinson's Disease in North America. That is more than Multiple Sclerosis, Muscular Dystrophy, and ALS combined. The South Georgian Bay (SGB) population is growing rapidly, and the demographics are aging as it attracts more residents to the area. In this decade, People with Parkinson's (PWP) in SGB are expected to double.

The Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) is an agency of the Ontario government with a mission to build healthy and vibrant communities across the province. Last year, OTF invested more than \$110M into 1,044 community projects and multi-sector partnerships. Projects aim to enhance economic well-being, foster more active lifestyles, support child and youth development, provide spaces for people to come together and connect, and create a more sustainable environment. 
