The person who first introduced the Poppy to Canada and the Commonwealth was Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae of Guelph, Ontario, a Canadian Medical Officer during the First World War. John McCrae penned the Poem "In Flanders Fields" on a scrap of paper in May 1915 on the day following the death of a fellow soldier. Little did he know then that those 13 lines would become enshrined in the hearts and minds of all who would wear them. McCrae's poem was published in Punch Magazine in December of that same year.

The idea for the Remembrance Poppy was imagined by Madame Anna Guérin of France. She was inspired by John McCrae's poem "In Flanders Fields." Anna had originally founded a charity to help rebuild regions of France after the First World War, and created poppies made of fabric to raise funds. Later, Anna presented her concept to France's allies, including the precursor to The Royal Canadian Legion, The Great War Veterans Association. The idea was considered at a meeting in Port Arthur, Ontario (now Thunder Bay) and was adopted on July 6, 1921. The sale of poppies raisies funds to support Veterans and their families in need.

Stand-Up Paddleboard World Championships

"Tim Oliver, of Thornbury, is continuing his preparations for competing in the upcoming International Canoe Federation (ICF) Standup Paddleboard (SUP) Championships in Thailand Nov.15-19.

Tim competed in the "Chattajack 31" race on the Tennessee River in Chattanooga on October 28, and won the 52 km race in a time of 4 hours, 59 minutes, which along with his training paddles at home on Georgian Bay should help him be in race-ready condition by mid-November."

Municipal Accommodations Tax (MAT) **Research Project & Public Survey**

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to announce the launch of the Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT) research and evaluation

project, including the launch of a public survey to gain feedback from residents and tourism industry members.

As directed by Council, the research and evaluation project includes a comprehensive review of the considerations and feasibility of implementing a Municipal Accommodation Tax in the Town. To learn more, visit the project webpage: www.thebluemountains.ca/MAT

A Municipal Accommodation Tax is a tax that is collected on overnight accommodations booked for less than 30 days, which includes but is not limited to hotels, motels, bed and breakfasts and other short-term rentals. The tax is paid for by the guest and is collected by the accommodation provider through the booking or check-in/check-out process. The funds collected through the tax are used to promote tourism and to support tourism-related activities and projects accessed by visitors and residents, such as roads, transit, beaches, parks and natural areas.

To support the project, the Town has engaged Bannikin, a professional tourism services firm, to lead and facilitate the research and evaluation project, which includes the development of a Municipal Accommodation Tax Strategy. In addition, the Town has engaged CBRE Tourism Consulting to conduct a community-focused Economic Impact Assessment related to the implementation of MAT.

About the Project

The primary goal of the project is to develop a comprehensive report and strategy that reviews and evaluates the feasibility and considerations of a Municipal Accommodations Tax. The report will be informed by feedback from residents, tourism businesses/operators and accommodation providers. The report will also establish a strong understanding of the context, challenges, opportunities, and social and economic implications of implementing and administering a MAT.

The project will follow a community-based research approach using several methods to engage stakeholders, including a visitorfacing business and resident survey, an accommodation provider survey, key stakeholder interviews and accommodation industry table talks.

Additionally, secondary research methods are being used to explore and establish a strong understanding of the background and context for MAT in Ontario and across Canada to inform potential innovations and creative approaches to adopt in implementation.

This fund has an allocation of \$5,000 that will be split between the successful applications which demonstrate a clear goal of advancing environmental sustainability within the Town.

This year's fund builds on previous successful recipients. The most recent recipient has been Georgian Bay Forever, which hired two summer students to promote waste diversion and has been leading community shoreline cleanups across the Town. Treetrust TBM received funding for community tree planting initiatives in 2021 and for a local tree nursery project in 2020, and Thornbury Community Gardens and Beaver River Watershed Initiative projects both received funding in 2019. These projects exemplify how the Town and community organizations can work alongside one another and foster social vibrancy and environmental sustainability.


Celebrating the Magic of Children in the Arts

Ontario Unveils New Statue to Honour Queen Elizabeth II

The Ontario government has installed a commemorative statue to pay tribute to Queen Elizabeth II and Her Late Majesty's Platinum Jubilee, marking 70 years of service to the people of Canada, the United Kingdom, and the Commonwealth. The statue is located next to the Visitors' entrance at the Legislative Building at Queen's Park.

The statue is a commemoration of Queen Elizabeth II's lifetime of personal service as Queen and is an important contribution to Ontario's history and heritage. It also provides learning opportunities for Ontarians and visitors of the Legislative Building, today and for

"For more than 70 years, Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II made significant contributions to the quality of our national character and the complexion of civic life in Canada, putting duty before desire and service above self. Throughout times of great change and uncertainty, she was always a source of strength and stability," said the Honourable Elizabeth Dowdeswell, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. "I hope this statue will encourage everyone who passes by to think about Her Late Majesty's remarkable life of service, and



about how the values she upheld can help us bring forth the future we wish to see."

"Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was a strong leader who advocated for basic human rights, freedom and self-governance," said Paul Calandra, Minister of Legislative Affairs. "As the longestserving head of state, we are recognizing and paying tribute to Her Late Majesty's service and what it represents in Canadian history."

The statue was designed and hand-sculpted by noted Canadian sculptor and artist, Ruth Abernethy, and cast by Mississauga art foundry MST Bronze Limited. It depicts Queen Elizabeth II in 1977 on the throne in the Canadian Senate, where she delivered a speech on Canadian unity.

Quick Facts

- The statue features Her Late Majesty holding maple leaves to represent the Canadian provinces and territories.
- The statue was first commissioned in 2016 by a group of private volunteers after receiving approval from Her Late Majesty to mark Queen Elizabeth II's Sapphire Jubilee and the 150th anniversary of Confederation.
- Treaties Recognition Week is recognized in Ontario from November 5-11. Queen Elizabeth II routinely made efforts to engage with First Nations communities and expressed her admiration of Indigenous culture and the importance of the long-standing treaty relationship with many First Nations in the country.

Grey County Council Discusses 2024 Budget

Grey County Council has taken a first look at 2024 budget projections and are weighing options to bring the tax levy down. Council asked staff to prepare details about programs and support that is currently funded from the levy but isn't required by legislation. This information was presented to Council at a special meeting on November 3. Council will now consider options leading up to two full-day budget workshops on December 8 and 15.

"The 2024 budget will be one of the most challenging we've faced as costs continue to rise in all service areas. Council have important and difficult discussions ahead as we work together to establish 2024 service levels that meet the needs of our community at a cost that is affordable to our ratepayers," said Grey County Warden Brian Milne.

In addition to accounting for service enhancements like the new cost of the new Rockwood Terrace long-term care home and investments in paramedic services to keep pace with population growth, pressures include continued inflation (particularly in construction), energy costs, insurance premiums and, necessary investments in infrastructure.

At the meeting on November 3, staff presented Council with several considerations to reduce the budget. These opportunities were categorized in three levels based on the estimated degree of impact on the community. Council also discussed matters relating to employee relations in closed session.

The 2024 budget details will be presented to council next on December 8. Information will be posted to the Grey County website approximately one week prior to the meeting.

Canadian Dentists to MPs: We need answers about the Canadian Dental Care Plan

Oct. 26, 2023 -- There are only two months left before the Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP) becomes available to many more Canadians. Yet more than 25,000 dentists nationwide are in the dark about how the Government of Canada will safeguard access to dental care.

In a letter sent to Members of Parliament (MPs) this week, the presidents of provincial and territorial dental associations across the country asked how the government will:

- Safeguard employer-provided dental plans that two-thirds of Canadians currently have access to?
- Ensure that a strong federal program can be coordinated with existing provincial programs?
- Protect patient choice and maintain the patient-provider relationship?
- Ensure minimal, efficient administration that promotes timely access to care?
- Respect the costs of delivering dental care to maximize provider participation?
- Increase the number of dental assistants and dental hygienists to meet the demands of the CDCP?

Dentists want to champion a CDCP that will respect patients, providers, and taxpayers. The provincial and territorial dental associations are concerned that the CDCP has been compromised by a lack of meaningful consultation with dentists – who will be expected to deliver on the government's promises.

The CDCP is currently in final planning stages, with a potential rollout in 2024 that will attempt to increase access to uninsured Canadians under 18, people with disabilities, and seniors who have an annual family income of less than \$90,000. Dentists believe all Canadians need access to dental care. If not done properly, two-thirds of Canadians who have great employer-provided dental plans could lose their coverage and be forced into a worse plan. Costs would then skyrocket, which means the \$13 billion over five years the government set aside would not be enough to sustain the plan.

Let's take the time to get it right. We can increase access to dental care right now through an expansion of the interim measure already in place – the Canada Dental Benefit. This establishes a fixed dollar amount that a patient can use to be reimbursed for dental-related expenses.

Safe 'N Sound Grey Bruce

Safe 'N Sound Grey Bruce is extending their hours for the upcoming winter months through an Overnight Warming Program. From November 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024, drop-in services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at the Safe 'N Sound building located at 310 8th Street East in Owen Sound.

The Overnight Warming Program is a pilot project for the 2023-2024 winter season to support households experiencing unsheltered homelessness. The program will provide a safe resting place and food and drink, as well as access to washrooms, laundry, showers, and more. By providing round the clock service, the warming program aims to reduce strain on paramedic, police, and other emergency services by providing safe options for those experiencing homelessness during the harsh winter months.

"Safe 'N Sound is excited that we, with the support of Grey County, will be keeping our doors open all winter," said Annette Pedlar, Executive Director at Safe 'N Sound. "It is our hope that through the coldest months we can provide access to our space, trained staff and resources to prevent the unnecessary harm associated with homelessness in rural winters. Safe 'N Sound is a proud member of the Owen Sound community and we are eager to support our most marginalized neighbours."

"The services provided by Safe 'N Sound are a great asset to our community," said Josh Gibson, Manager of Housing Programs at Grey County. "This expanded program will provide increased safety for vulnerable Grey County residents during the cold winter months."

Grey County has contributed \$150,000 through the Safe Restart Funding Reserve to support staff, security, and operating funds for the pilot project. Staff will be collecting data on the demographics of those using the centre and the services they use, as well as identifying any service gaps. This information will be used to inform recommendations for the project in future years.


Brad Mulligan, Project Coordinator BRWI, will present a review of BRWI projects, both current and future.
