Canada Emergency Business Account: Government extends repayment and partial loan forgiveness deadlines

On September 14, 2023, the Prime Minister announced extended deadlines for Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan repayments, providing an additional year for term loan repayment, and additional flexibilities for loan holders looking to benefit from partial loan forgiveness of up to 33 per cent.

The CEBA program was available from April 9, 2020, to June 30, 2021, and provided \$49 billion in interest-free, partially forgivable loans of up to \$60,000 to nearly 900,000 small businesses and not-for-profit organizations to help cover their operating costs during the pandemic.

The repayment deadline for CEBA loans to qualify for partial loan forgiveness of up to 33 per cent is being extended from December 31, 2023, to January 18, 2024, recognizing that the end of December is a busy time for many Canadian businesses. This builds on the government's previous one-year extension announced in January 2022.

For CEBA loan holders who make a refinancing application with the financial institution that provided their CEBA loan by January 18, 2024, the repayment deadline to qualify for partial loan forgiveness now includes a refinancing extension until March 28, 2024. This will allow more small businesses and not-for-profits to access relief and give them more time to hear back from their financial institutions on refinancing applications.

As of January 19, 2024, outstanding loans, including those that are captured by the refinancing extension, will convert to three-year term loans, subject to interest of five per cent per annum, with the term loan repayment date extended by an additional year from December 31, 2025, to December 31, 2026. Put simply, small businesses and not-for-profits will automatically have access to a three-year, low-interest loan of up to \$60,000 if they have not repaid or refinanced their loan. This will provide those who are unable to secure refinancing or generate enough cashflow to repay their loans by the forgiveness deadline an additional year to continue repayment at a low borrowing cost.

Repayment on or before the new deadline of January 18, 2024 (or March 28, 2024 if a refinancing application is submitted prior to January 18, 2024 at the financial institution that provided their CEBA loan), will result in loan forgiveness of \$10,000 for a \$40,000 loan and \$20,000 for a \$60,000 loan.

Here are examples of how CEBA loan holders can benefit from new repayment flexibility:

Sarah and Nick need to pay off their \$40,000 CEBA loan, but are unable to pay the full amount in time to benefit from \$10,000 in partial loan forgiveness. On January 19, 2024, their loan converts to a three-year term loan with five per cent interest per year. They will make monthly interest payments of around \$167 per month, and will only be required to pay their principal amount just before the term loan repayment deadline of December 31, 2026.

Doug applies for \$40,000 in financing from the bank that provided his CEBA loan to pay off his \$60,000 CEBA loan. He is unable to receive a response to his refinancing application by January 18, 2024. However, with the new refinancing extension, he has until March 28, 2024, to hear back from his bank and secure new financing to pay off his CEBA loan and benefit from \$20,000 in partial loan forgiveness.

Financial institutions will contact CEBA loan holders directly regarding their loans. The above changes also apply to CEBA-equivalent lending through the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund.

Call for Applications to the The Blue Mountains Environmental Sustainability Fund


The Town of The Blue Mountains invites community organizations to apply for the Town's Environmental Sustainability Fund.

This fund has an allocation of \$5,000 that will be split between the successful applications which demonstrate a clear goal of advancing environmental sustainability within the Town.

This year's fund builds on previous successful recipients. The most recent recipient has been Georgian Bay Forever, which hired two summer students to promote waste diversion and has been leading community shoreline cleanups across the Town. Treetrust TBM received funding for community tree planting initiatives in 2021 and for a local tree nursery project in 2020, and Thornbury Community Gardens and Beaver River Watershed Initiative projects both received funding in 2019. These projects exemplify how the Town and community organizations can work alongside one another and foster social vibrancy and environmental sustainability.

His ambitions for the next four years include participating in field courses, networking with new people, and continuing to volunteer. In addition to his passion for wildlife conservation, he also has an interest in medicine and aspires to reach his "ultimate goal" of becoming a wildlife veterinarian.

Each year through an application process, students can apply for this valuable scholarship, which is awarded to a graduating student in the Grey Sauble Conservation Authority watershed who plans to enroll in a post-secondary environmental program. New Rain Garden Planted At County Administration Office

The second phase of Grey County's lawn naturalization project at the administration office in Owen Sound is now complete. On Wednesday, September 13, dozens of volunteers and community members joined County elected officials and staff at the second planting event which saw a rain garden added to the front of the property. Protecting and expanding natural assets is the first action of Going Green in Grey, the County's climate change action plan. Naturalization projects and planting events are a great education tool and a way to improve pollinator habits and involve the community in climate action.

"We're here today to continue our efforts to naturalize the County administration property by turning this outdated, traditional lawn into something much more eco-friendly, vibrant, and beautiful," said Grey County Warden Brian Milne to open the event.

The new rain garden is located at the corner of 9th Ave E and 6th St. East. Participants planted shrubs such as Buttonbush and Red Osier Dogwood and perennial plants such as Sweetgrass, Cardinal Flowers and Black Eyed Susans. This area is located at the base of the hill and receives high amounts of water and moisture run off from the area. The garden will help to naturally transport, filter, and recharge this stormwater runoff.

Next steps in the lawn transformation include planting more trees and creating new pollinator gardens.

The lawn naturalization project is being heavily supported by NeighbourWoods North, a local community volunteer group dedicated to educating the public about the benefits and challenges of urban forestry.

"We're incredibly thankful for the knowledge, skills and passion the folks at NeighbourWoods North are contributing to this project," said Warden Milne.

Transforming the lawn is a small but symbolic part of Going Green in Grey. Grey County is leading by example, setting ambitious goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions from County operations by 40% by 2030, and reaching net-zero emissions by 2045. Grey County Council approved Going Green in Grey in 2022. The plan was developed in consultation with stakeholders from a variety of sectors and hundreds of residents who shared their time, ideas and expertise. Implementing nature-based solutions, such as rain gardens, is a key part of this plan.

"We have a rare opportunity here to revitalize one of the Town's primary parks with the assistance of our community partners at the Thornbury-Clarksburg Rotary Club," said Ryan Gibbons, Director of Community Services. "We're looking forward to working with the public and all of our user groups to re-imagine Moreau Park in a way that makes it accessible for every member of our community."

About the Moreau Park Revitalization Project

The Thornbury-Clarksburg Rotary Club approached Town Council in September of 2022 with the concept of revitalizing Moreau Park in Thornbury under the theme, "Kindness at Play." The elements proposed included a new skate park for all ages and abilities, a year-round paved walking path, a sensory garden and an accessible playground. Council directed staff to include this project for consideration as an addition to the 2023 Town budget.

This project presents a larger opportunity for the Town to consider incorporating additional recreational elements that have been identified through the Town's Leisure Activity Plan and Resident Satisfaction Survey. Additionally, previously approved or proposed projects including construction of a permanent, covered pavilion with washroom facilities, and resurfacing of the baseball diamonds could be included in this project.

It's anticipated that the funding for construction will be presented in the 2025 Town Budget, with construction commencing in 2025.

Peel Street North Reconstruction





The Town of The Blue Mountains identified Peel Street North for reconstruction through the Development Charges Background Study. Preliminary engineering was completed on behalf of the Town by MTE Consultants Inc. MTE has now moved on to finalizing the design before tendering for construction.

The reconstruction project will include:

- Reconstruction of Peel Street and Bay Street With a unique cross-section selected by Council from multiple options proposed including a 7.0m road width, barrier curb and gutter, 2.7m wide multi-use trail on Peel Street and 1.5m wide sidewalk on Bay Street.
- Pedestrian bridge on Bay Street to expand the Town's Active Transportation Network.
- Improve the road's vertical alignment deficiency by cutting down the blind hill.
- Replace the watermain on Peel Street.
- Construct a storm sewer system on Peel Street and Bay Street.
- Install streetlights on existing poles.
- Remove trees as required to accommodate the new infrastructure, storm outlet ditches, and the cut and fill slopes to match existing lot grades.
- Extend watermain and sanitary sewer across Highway 26 towards the future Campus of Care at 125 Peel Street South.

FIRST ONSITE reflects on one-year anniversary of Hurricane Fiona

(GLOBE NEWSWIRE) -- One year ago, Atlantic Canadian residents and communities were shocked to see much of their community affected by a fierce storm. In September of 2022, after surging north from the Caribbean, Hurricane Fiona ripped through Atlantic Canada as a post-tropical storm battering Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island (PEI), and Newfoundland with hurricane-strength winds, heavy rains and huge waves.

In one dramatic case, Port aux Basques, on the southwest tip of Newfoundland, powerful flooding saw some homes and office buildings washed out to sea.

The catastrophe mobilized the nation and according to the Insurance Bureau of Canada became the most costly extreme weather event ever recorded in Atlantic Canada and the tenth largest in Canada in terms of insured damages – surpassing the 2011 Slave Lake wildfire.

"Storms aren't acting like they used to, and disaster plans are typically based on what has happened in the past," said Jim Mandeville, SVP of Large Loss for First Onsite Property Restoration. "Hurricanes are escalating more quickly than ever, and disaster plans need to be thoroughly thought out and practiced regularly."

Remembering the storm

In September of 2022, First Onsite Property Restoration launched a command centre and deployed a team of specialists from across the country to support relief and cleanup in the aftermath of Hurricane Fiona. The company conducted hundreds of restoration projects in the residential and commercial sectors after the hurricane. Crews worked to ensure that critical community infrastructure including grocery stores, hardware stores and banks were able get up and running to serve residents quickly.

The failure of powerlines and telecoms made communications more difficult. The team operated off a mix of satellite and cell-based internet to ensure timely communications. On PEI, many employees and project managers were operating on generators, as most of the island had no power.

Case study: the way forward

First Onsite created a case study on Hurricane Fiona in Atlantic Canada focused on four pillars: what happened; the pre-crisis response; the post-crisis recovery; and the way forward.

Local concerns addressed in weather survey

In the wake of Hurricane Fiona, First Onsite also conducted a spring national survey asking Atlantic Canadians what weather events were keeping them up at night. The region, still reeling from Fiona was by far the country's most worried region regarding damage caused by hurricanes (76%). Other concerns in the region included severe rains and flooding (65%), mould (77%), a homeowner's level of insurance (55%) and concerns of having to leave their home or community (58%) in case of an extreme weather event.

Hurricane tips to minimize a storm's impact on homes or businesses:

- · Protect your facility / home against flooding
- Ensure you have adequate insurance coverage
- Backup data
- Create an inventory of your property contents
- Secure loose outdoor objects
- Board up windows
- Don't forget about pets
- Stay informed with local updates
- Determine employee responsibilities (who shuts off utilities, who barricades doors and window, etc.)
- Communicate an evacuation route for employees and customers
- · Develop procedures for keeping track of employees and customers Understand where emergency equipment and supplies are located
- "The unpredictability of climate and weather over the past several years highlights the importance of planning and preparation to ensure homes and businesses are resilient to these shocks and better prepared for tomorrow," said Mandeville.





Grey County Committee of the Whole September 14 Meeting Highlights

Grey County Council set the date for the annual inaugural meeting and election of the Warden. County Council will meet for the special session on Tuesday, December 5 at 5 p.m.

Grey County will implement a new human resources software to improve efficiencies and provide better data management and reporting. The new software replaces four different applications Grey County is currently using that do not integrate with each other.

Council received a presentation about the findings of a non-union staff compensation review and pay equity review. The compensation review helps Grey County Council understand how pay levels for positions compare to similar jobs at comparable municipalities. It also ensures jobs are fairly compensated in comparison with similar jobs within the County. The pay equity review ensures jobs which are largely held by female workers are paid at an equal rate to comparable jobs which are largely held by male workers. The compensation and pay equity reviews were completed by third-party consultants Gallagher and Associates. Following the presentation, Council voted to set the non-union pay structure at the 50th percentile. This will make salaries competitive with other municipalities. Council provided direction to include the updated compensation plan for consideration in the 2024 budget.

Council received an update on Emergency Housing services and options available for providing services. Staff shared current year statistics which estimate a program requirement of around 13,000 nights of shelter provided per year. Currently, the average cost of providing shelter through local motels is \$120 per night. The report compared the current hotel-based model of service to a potential system with other options including a Grey County owned and operated short-term emergency housing building. Staff estimated operating a County-owned facility would result in annual savings of over \$500,000.
