Grey County Council Gives First Approval To 2025 Budget

Grey County Council has given first approval to the 2025 budget. Grey County Council discussed the budget a special Committee of the Whole meeting on December 13. The total operating and capital budget to deliver programs and services and maintain infrastructure in 2025 is \$302.4 million. A total of \$78.4 million will be collected through the County property levy. This results in an increase to the levy of 3.33%.

The 2025 budget will maintain service levels and take action to prepare for the growth of our communities and demands on County services. Significant projects within the budget include the ongoing redevelopment and expansion of Rockwood Terrace, the construction of a paramedic base in Durham and a new paramedic base in Feversham, a new patrol depot for transportation services in southern Grey County, and other projects.


The budget also maintains Grey County's commitment to asset management and investing an additional 2.55% towards infrastructure each year for 15 years beginning in 2025. This is an increase of nearly 1% over the County's previous asset management plan.

Other factors outside of Grey County's control also have an impact on service levels and the budget. Changes to provincial funding, general inflation, utility costs and insurance costs are all factors.

"Setting the annual budget is often the most difficult task of the year for a council. It takes months of preparation before a draft comes together and staff and council take great care in setting appropriate service levels," said Grey County Warden Andrea Matrosovs. "The 2025 budge keeps Grey County on target for several strategic initiatives while keeping the necessary levy increase at a manageable level."

The 2025 Grey County budget benefited from additional investment in long-term care from the Government of Ontario as well as strong assessment growth.

The Grey County budget supports the delivery of community services including three long-term care homes, administering Ontario Works, early learning and childcare, 1,003 units of County-owned housing, supporting 550 units of non-profit housing, and providing approximately 10,500 nights of emergency shelter. Grey County Paramedics provide emergency response and ambulance service and community paramedicine. Grey County supports businesses and entrepreneurs with economic development programs and services like the Business Enterprise Centre and the Sydenham Campus. Grey Roots Museum and Archives welcomes thousands of visitors each year and helps preserve local history and tell the stories of the community. Transportation services maintain more than 887 kilometers of roads and hundreds of bridges and large culverts, keeping our roadways safe for residents and visitors.

The draft 2025 budget details are available at www.grey.ca/budget. A final version will be prepared based on Council's revisions and presented at the January 9 meeting of Grey County Council.



VON Community Support Programs

Assisted Living

The VON Assisted Living Program offers a variety of services tailored for high-risk seniors with complex needs, enabling them to stay in their own homes. Clients are referred through Ontario Health at Home to receive both scheduled and unscheduled (urgent on-call) visits, available 24/7, with the possibility of multiple visits throughout the day if necessary. Services encompass care coordination, safety checks, and support with personal hygiene, daily living activities, and essential homemaking tasks.

In the Grey Bruce region, this service is available in several supportive housing facilities, as well as anywhere within the town limits in Meaford and Thornbury, Owen Sound, Wiarton, Kincardine, and Saugeen Shores. Eligible residents benefit from personal support worker visits throughout the day, helping them maintain their independence.

Premier Doug Ford Launches Ontario Corps

Ontario makes history as one of first provinces in Canada to mobilize volunteer corps for emergencies

Premier Doug Ford announced the creation of Ontario Corps, a group of skilled professionals and volunteers that the province can deploy to help communities respond to natural disasters and other emergencies, while promoting civic engagement and community participation.

"I've seen firsthand the incredible community spirit and dedication to volunteerism that we share throughout Ontario," said Premier Doug Ford. "With the launch of Ontario Corps, we're harnessing the

Ontario spirit to help communities and neighbours in need deal with natural disasters and other emergencies, while providing additional resources to keep our communities safe. I encourage everyone across Ontario who is interested and able to consider volunteering by signing up for Ontario Corps today!"

Inspired by successful models like AmeriCorps, Ontario Corps will work with non-governmental organizations and First Nations partners to help coordinate specialized personnel and volunteers to respond to emergencies. Ontario Corps can mobilize to provide on-the-ground assistance such as emergency shelter, debris management, food services and flood protection. Ontario Corps partner organizations include groups such as Feed Ontario, Ontario Search and Rescue Volunteer Association, Salvation Army, GlobalMedic and Team Rubicon Canada.

To support Ontario Corps emergency response efforts, the province has procured flood mitigation barriers, drones, water pumps, chain saws, air purifiers and other supplies to support communities impacted by emergencies. All equipment and volunteers can be deployed anywhere across Ontario within 24 to 72 hours to help support community response efforts. Partner organizations could also help prepare the province by training volunteers and educating the public on how they can plan for and respond to emergencies.

People of all skill levels and professional backgrounds are encouraged to volunteer for Ontario Corps to help their communities during emergencies. Volunteers from all backgrounds and experience levels are welcome to apply. They will be provided with initial training and matched with partner organizations based on their skill levels, interests and availability.

Earlier this month, after a significant amount of snow accumulated over a short period of time, the province piloted Ontario Corps in **Gravenhurst**. Ontario Corps partners the Salvation Army, GlobalMedic, Feed Ontario and the Ontario Search and Rescue Volunteer Association were deployed to help Gravenhurst conduct wellness checks on residents, provide food hampers and serve meals to the community, and support a municipal warming centre for community members who lost power or were stranded on motorways. In April, Team Rubicon Canada, an Ontario Corps partner, was deployed to **French River** after they requested support for flood mitigation, assisting locals with sandbagging efforts to avoid a flood of the area.

As a part of the plan to modernize emergency management across Ontario, the province is also establishing an Ontario Emergency Preparedness and Response Headquarters that will support a quicker and more coordinated response. Located on surplus government property on Disco Road in Etobicoke near Toronto Pearson International Airport, this state-of-the-art complex would be a multifaceted centre for coordinated and enhanced responses to emergencies. A secure facility with dedicated training rooms, storage, warehousing and aviation infrastructure, the new headquarters would be built to withstand all types of disasters including earthquakes, tornadoes and floods, capable of serving Ontario 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year.

The government is also partnering with Northern College on a regional emergency hub in Timmins to bolster local on-the-ground response and enhance emergency readiness in northern Ontario. The hub, located at the college, could be set up to serve as an emergency operations centre, a meeting point for emergency partners to coordinate responses or a training centre for partners and volunteers in the north. Four additional emergency hubs will be established at strategic locations in northeast, northwest, southwest and southeast Ontario. These new hubs will store equipment to help support local efforts, providing timelier support to areas affected by emergencies.

Quick Facts

- Ontario Corps is part of the government's \$110 million investment over three years to strengthen emergency preparedness and response in Ontario.
- Communities in need of provincial assistance during an emergency are encouraged to contact Emergency Management Ontario by way of the Provincial Emergency Operations Centre. Staff will assess the situation and determine the best support to provide to the community—Ontario Corps partners, equipment, regional field services staff and/or more.
- Ontario Corps is a key accomplishment of the Provincial Emergency Management Strategy and Action Plan, which highlights actions the province is taking to ensure that every community in Ontario is safe, practiced and prepared before, during and after emergencies.

Ontario Connecting Northern and Rural Communities to Critical Care

The Ontario government is investing \$93 million to expand Ornge Air Ambulance's fleet by adding two larger, high speed fixed wing aircraft, constructing a new hangar in Simcoe County, and improving pre-hospital care. This investment will ensure Ornge Air Ambulance service can better connect people in northern and rural communities to the care they need when they need it.

The two new, high speed, Special Mission Aircraft can travel longer distances without the need to refuel, enabling Ornge to complete four long-distance transports per day, double the amount completed by Ornge's smaller planes. These aircraft are also able to transport patients with specialized care needs such as neonatal, paediatric, and bariatric patients.

The new aircraft will be housed in a newly constructed hangar at the Lake Simcoe Regional Airport in Simcoe County. This new hangar will help better coordinate emergency care to ensure Ontarians receive the high-quality care they deserve across the province.

These new aircraft and hangar are in addition to the \$118 million investment announced in 2023 to expand Ornge's fixed wing fleet to 12 aircraft, including the replacement of the existing eight fixed wing fleet, and purchase of a larger hangar in Sudbury to house the new aircraft.

In addition to expanding Ornge's fleet of aircraft, as part of this investment, Ontario is providing Ornge with a further \$25 million to hire more frontline staff to improve pre-hospital care and better serve Indigenous communities. This includes:

- Hiring 102 additional frontline staff by 2029, including paramedics, pilots, and aviation mechanics to ensure aircraft are available whenever a call comes
- Expanding Ornge's dedicated mental health patient transport team to reduce the response time for patients in need of emergency mental health care. This team provides specialized mental health care for patients during transport and in the first year of implementation, provided in-flight mental health care to 741 patients
- Enhancing the Emergency First Response Teams Program for First Nation communities by adding stretcher transport vehicles, specialized first aid training for community volunteers and additional supplies to ensure the delivery of comprehensive, culturally appropriate care

Quick Facts

- Ornge is Ontario's provincial air ambulance and critical care land ambulance (CCLA) service provider and provides a range of air paramedical services including moving patients between health care facilities, responding to emergency on-scene incidents, and supporting health care in northern and rural communities.
- Ornge plays a key role in access to care for the province's northern and rural communities with approximately 98 per cent of Ornge's fixed-wing patient transports originating in northern Ontario.
- Ornge conducts approximately 22,000 air ambulance and critical care land ambulance patient transports per year, from nine air bases and six land bases across the province.
- Ornge's fleet currently consists of 12 helicopters and eight fixed wing planes, with planes being used for long-distance transports and helicopters for shorter distances and emergency on-scene response.
- The Ornge Air Ambulance fleet will expand to 14 fixed wing aircraft by 2030.
- To help increase the number of paramedics in the province, the newly expanded Ontario Learn and Stay Grant will provide students studying in the first year of a paramedic program in 2023-2024 at select postsecondary institutions with funding for free tuition, books, compulsory fees and other direct educational costs. After graduating, students will be required to work in the same region they studied in, for a minimum of six months for every full year of study funded by the grant.







EMERGENCY FIRST AID TRAINING
