New Fish Culvert Installed in Little Beaver River

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to invite residents to attend a celebration and ribbon-cutting ceremony for a new fish culvert that has been installed in the Little Beaver River by the Beaver River Watershed Initiative.

The Ribbon Cutting Ceremony is scheduled for **Saturday, April 22nd at 11am**, on the Georgian Trail west of Lansdowne Street N in Thornbury. The rain date for the event is Sunday, April 23, at 11am.

The fish culvert was funded and installed by the Beaver River Watershed Initiative to help increase the diversity of fish species in the Little Beaver River by allowing the movement of fish to access spawning beds and habitats throughout the watershed. The new culvert will allow fish movement through the area for the first time since 1872.

"I'd like to thank the Beaver River Watershed Initiative and their partners for their work on this project," said Mayor Andrea Matrosovs. "Proper stewardship of the environment is a priority for the Town,

and their work is essential in meeting that goal."

The Beaver River Watershed Initiative focuses on "handson" work in the Beaver River Watershed. Their mission statement is: "To work with the community, agencies and organizations that share our vision to develop, promote and facilitate projects which will conserve, protect and enhance the ecological health of the Beaver River Watershed."

Ontario Uses New Tool to Create Long-Term Care Beds and Affordable Housing in Blue Mountains

Province approves the first Community Infrastructure and Housing Accelerator order

The Ontario government is responding to a request from the Town of The Blue Mountains to streamline approvals to build 160 long-term care beds and housing for seniors in Grey County.

Once complete, the Community Campus of Care will be located on approximately 20 acres of town-owned surplus lands at 125 Peel Street South. The campus will also provide a range of retirement home living options, such as affordable housing and attainable housing units (e.g., townhouses and apartments), daycare facilities, and certain commercial uses.

Ontario is supporting this development through a new tool that helps municipalities fast-track their own planning process, the Community Infrastructure and Housing Accelerator. It helps municipalities speed up approvals for housing and community infrastructure, like hospitals and community centres, while increasing transparency and accountability. This is the first Community Infrastructure and Housing Accelerator order to be issued by the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

In Memoriam

WILLIAM "BILL" ASHALL FIRSTBROOK

July 18, 1928 - March 11, 2023

Bill was born in Toronto to Ruth (nee Sprott) and Roy Firstbrook. He grew up on Inglewood Drive with his brother, Peter, and sister, Jane. He attended Whitney, Deer Park, and UTS. Bill was a passionate sailor. He spent many summers sailing his International 14, Patoo, in Go Home Bay and Monument Channel. It was sailing in Lake Ontario, for RCYC flagship, The Patricia, that he first met the love of his life for 68 years, Lorna (Keene) Firstbrook. Lorna was with him to the end. Bill was a pioneering skier at mountains like Tuckerman's Ravine NH in the late 1940's, a ski instructor at Bromley VT in the 1960's, and an early Osler Bluff Ski Club member. He built two ski cabins at Osler Bluff Ski Club, including one of the first log cabins with his good friends Peter Newton and Munk McDonald.

Bill received a BS in Engineering from the University of Toronto and studied Metallurgical Engineering at the University of Glasgow. He also attended the London School of Economics and University of Western Ontario. He spent much of his career at Inco where he sold nickel ore to the Canadian Mint and other accounts. In New York City, he promoted the introduction of architectural stainless-steel paneling for the emerging glass skyscraper style buildings. Later in his career he was the Chief Executive Officer of the Canadian Steel Service Center Institute.

Bill was a wonderful father to Will (Lori), Don, Kary (Geordie), Brian (Stephanie), and Peter (Christine) as they grew up in the Keene family home on Second St. in Oakville, Ontario. He played squash and tennis and enjoyed cruising and racing his sailboats out of The Oakville Club. Bill and Lorna travelled and sailed throughout the world, and they spent many winters boating and painting in the warm waters of the Bahamas. Bill was charming and engaging. Famous for bringing people together to celebrate. He leaves behind his adoring wife, five children, ten grandchildren and nine great grandchildren, with two on the way, and many extended family and friends around the globe, who love him and wish him well on his next journey.

A memorial service celebrating Bill's life was conducted at Christ Church Anglican, Meaford, on Thursday, March 23rd. The Master Gardener's Corner

Things to do in your garden April 2023

- Make sure you have done everything you were supposed to do on the March MG List, or ask for a new one.
- Do stretch and bend exercises before you start in the garden. I find skiing muscles have nothing to do with gardening muscles. Take it easy. There are a lot of gardening days before the ski season comes again.
- A NEW PROGRAM FOR SPREADING TRIPPLE-19 FERTILIZER. I have learned from the Guelph educated Agronomist at the Huron Co-Op in Markdale that you should **NOT** spread 19-19-19 general purpose fertilizer over the snow on all your flower beds and shrub borders. You will lose the Nitrogen. **After the snow has gone**, you should spread it on the damp ground, but before plant leaves appear, so they will not be burned. Triple-19 fertilizer is available now at the Mid-West Co-Op just south of Markdale on Hwy 10.
- Organize your compost pile for the new season. Start a new one with the top foot of compost material from last year's pile as a base.
- As the weather warms and the ground dries, prune back perennials and ornamental grasses to 1" to 2" from the ground. Collect the dead material and put it on your new compost pile. Shred it, if you can.
- Push any plants that the frost has heaved back into place.
- Prepare garden beds for planting. Dig in compost, and/or manure, and/or other organic material around each plant. Remove any weeds that have come through from last fall. When you have cleaned up the beds, ADD 3"TO 4" OF MULCH to control weeds this summer.
- Remove rose protection. For Hybrid Teas, prune back to 6" or 8" and apply dormant oil spray before the buds break.
- Apply dormant oil spray to shrubs like euonymus that may have suffered from scale last year. Do it before the buds break.
- Prepare your vegetable garden with a good digging. Add compost and manure, if you have it. Mid-month, plant the seeds of coolweather vegetables like peas, spinach, lettuce, onions, beets. Plant seeds of frost resistant annuals like larkspur, sweet peas and calendulas.
- When dry and you can't see your foot prints, rake your lawn vigorously to remove any thatch; repair damage with weed-free topsoil. Add grass seed to bare spots. Keep moist.
- Fertilize your lawn with slow-release high nitrogen fertilizer (the first of the 3 numbers on the bag). Slow-release urea costs more, but it's worth it, as it should last until the fall.
- Apply crabgrass pre-emergence herbicide to your lawn, if required.
- When spring finally comes, plant trees, shrubs, perennials and biennials in your garden. No need to wait until May 24th for perennials, that's for annuals. It may be the first week in June before you can get frost tender annuals safely into the ground.
- Re-fill your pots and planters with compost. But first, put empty plastic bottles with tops at the bottom of large pots. You will need less soil and they will be lighter to move. Add slow-release plant food to the top 4 inches.
- Then plant frost-resistant pansies NOW for a little spring colour.
- Start mowing your lawn only as needed. Keep it long to crowd out any weeds.
- Save Saturday June 3rd for the St. George's, Anglican Parish of the Blue Mountains, giant annual Plant Sale on the church grounds with over 1,100 perennials and shrubs to choose from, plus free gardening advice from 599 Garden Club experts.

Since being founded in 2000 by Rotarians in England, ShelterBox has supported over 2 million people in 97 countries! Although the actual configuration and content of the ShelterBox continues to adapt to changing needs in various regions of the world where disaster strikes, the basic ShelterBox is a large plastic box, containing basic materials to support a family of 10 who have lost their home – large, 2-room tent, cooking equipment, lantern, blankets, tools, water purification and so on.

ShelterBox has thousands of these boxes stockpiled in a number of locations around the world, from which they are dispatched quickly and efficiently after disaster strikes and the needs are identified by ShelterBox personnel (usually volunteers) sent to the disaster zone to coordinate with the local authorities.

Recently deployed to humanitarian crises in Turkey and Syria and Ukraine and the Horn of Africa, ShelterBox is constantly striving to meet the needs of people whose lives have been shattered by disaster. There never seems to be a "slow season".



Living Smartly by Alice Otrysko

Stephen Leacock once said:

"When I go into a bank I get rattled. The clerks rattle me; the wickets rattle me; the sight of money rattles me; everything rattles me"

Money can rattle each of us because we cannot live without it. Stephen Leacock goes on to say: "I keep my money in cash in my trousers pocket and my savings in silver dollars in a sock". I hope none of us listen to that.

We are in hard times in many respects. Prices are up, real estate is down, going out to eat costs a week's grocery bill, gas prices limit travelling for pleasure etc. It's very difficult to save money but we must save money and we must have a reserve most likely in a bank.

Money for certain people is plentiful. But most of us have or had parents who struggled for whatever reason and that experience hopefully has made us stronger and taught us to be able to "make do" with less. Think: Where do I spend the bulk of my money? How can I cut down?

What I have learned has enabled me to live a "smart life".

- Buy groceries once a week in a reasonably priced food market.
- Plan your menus before you shop and make a list.
- Don't throw food away unless it's unedible.
- Try growing as much of your own food as possible.
- Eliminate the take out.
- Eliminate sugary drinks which are costly and are unhealthy.
 Replace them with sparkling water with 0 calories.
- Take out coffee is fine once in a while but I travel with a coffee dispenser in my car and make the coffee when I leave.
- Pay off the mortgage as fast as you can. Any interest you pay on a loan is money you will never get back.
- Learn how to fix things and try not calling the professionals for things like changing the toilet seat.
- Save on home utilities: turn down the thermostat and put another layer of clothing on (we turn our furnace off for the night), don't let water run on and on, turn off lights in rooms not in use, try and dry clothes on a line or at least dry some items on a rack inside. (I miss my laundry line. This is the first house I haven't had one).
- In buying clothing, be practical and ask yourself if you really need this item. Take any clothing you don't use to a consignment store. You get some money and they make some money.
- Learn to mend, polish, restore before throwing something out.
- In buying a car, go for a used one and don't buy from a dealer. Look
 at the classified and choose a car, get it looked over by a mechanic
 and then decide if you want it. You'll save a lot of money. You can
 have it detailed to make it look like new.

In my own life my drive was to be successful and own my own house. Thanks to the lessons my parents gave me, the first house was paid off as quickly and with ambition so that the mortgage did not act like a stone around my neck. Renovating helped to sell it faster and enabled us (my husband and myself) to buy up, renovate and sell etc.

I never felt deprived in order to save and pay off the mortgage. There were travels, parties, going out and eating well. However, everything has to be calculated and measured before large sums of money are put out. In all of this, my parents were there as role models and I never asked them for anything because, truly, they didn't have that much except good advice. As immigrants they managed to buy a small house in which they lived until their deaths. Their drive and determination and ability to make ends meet, was a great lesson for me.

I am sharing a quick and inexpensive recipe that feeds 2 for 2 days: Buy 6 chicken thighs. Place them in a baking pan with salt, pepper, fresh garlic and olive oil. I also shred fresh herbs on top (parsley) for extra nutrition and taste. Bake for 45 min at 350 in a preheated oven.

First day each, eat 2 thighs with choice of two veggies.

Next day make tacos with the two left over thighs. I put my left over veggies into the tacos as well as your choice of condiments and shredded lettuce. There are 2 meals for 2 people at a reasonable price.

Potential Establishment of a Lobbyist Registry

Public Meeting, April 18, 2023 at 9:30 a.m. Hybrid Format In-Person AND Virtual/Online Town Hall, 32 Mill St., Thornbury

from Staff Report, January 30, 2023

Council directed staff to bring forward a Final Lobbyist Registry By-law, and Final Lobbyist Code of Conduct as well as the proposed staff resource structure, policies and proposed Public Consultation Plan for Council consideration.

Staff have utilized the Town of Collingwood's Lobbyist Registry Program as a resource and greatly appreciated the cooperation that Town of Collingwood staff had provided during the preparation of this report. The Draft Lobbyist Registry Bylaw and Draft Lobbyist Code of Conduct, are essentially duplicates of the Town of Collingwood's Lobbyist Registry documents.

Staff suggest that potential Lobbyists registered with the Town of The Blue Mountains may be similar to those registered with the Town of Collingwood and having similar processes could be seen as beneficial.

During the development of this report, staff reviewed options that would allow for the provision of appropriate resources to manage, administer, and maintain the Lobbyist Registry Program over the long term. The Draft By-law presented in the report identifies the Town Clerk as the staff that would be appointed as the Lobbyist Registrar. Staff recommend that a fulsome structure be considered through Corporate Organizational Structure Review that will be completed later in 2023. The preliminary work, to have the Lobbyist Registry considered would be initiated in advance of the Final Corporate Organizational Structure Review.

"Lobby" or "Lobbying" means any communication with a public office holder by an individual who is paid or who represents a business or financial interest with the goal of trying to influence any legislative action including development, introduction, passage, defeat, amendment or repeal of a by-law, motion, resolution or the outcome of a decision on any matter before Council, a Committee of Council, or a staff member acting under delegated authority.

"Lobbyist" means:

- a) "consultant lobbyist" an individual who lobbies for payment on behalf of a client (another individual, a business, partnership, organization or other entity):
- b) "in-house lobbyist": an individual who is an employee, partner or sole proprietor and who lobbies on behalf of their own employer, business or other entity; and
- c) "voluntary unpaid lobbyist": an individual who lobbies without payment on behalf of an individual, business or any other for-profit entity for the benefit of the interests of the individual, business or for-profit entity.

Resident Parking Pass

All residents of the Town of The Blue Mountains are permitted to park for free at all paid parking locations throughout the Town by either registering their licence plate or by displaying the printed resident pass in their rearview mirror. Printed resident passes are mailed to all taxpayers each spring.

Non-Resident Parking Passes are available to residents of Meaford, Grey Highlands, Clearview Township and Collingwood. The cost is \$100 +HST for each registered licence plate.

Moratorium for New Short Term Accommodation Licenses Outside the Prescribed Exception Area

Recommended THAT Council receive Staff Report FAF.23.050, entitled "Moratorium for New Short Term Accommodation Licenses Outside the Prescribed Exception Area"; AND THAT Council hereby implements a moratorium on:

- The consideration of any application received for a Type B Municipal License under By-law 2021-70 for properties that have not been licensed prior to January 1, 2023; and,
- The issuance of any Type B Municipal Licenses under By-law 2021-70 for properties that have not been licensed prior to January 1, 2023 until the Town's Official Plan Update is complete or this moratorium is alternatively ended by Council resolution;
- AND THAT Council hereby revokes its delegated authority of the Town's License Issuer to issue any Type B Municipal Licenses under By-law 2021-70, except for properties that have been licensed prior to January 1, 2023, until the Town's Official Plan Update is complete or this moratorium is alternatively ended by Council resolution.

Ontario Sunshine List - Grey County

The end of March brings Ontario's annual Sunshine List, when light is shone on the highest earners among workers paid with tax dollars.

The government passed the Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act in 1996. The act "lets taxpayers compare the performance of an organization with the compensation given to the people running it" and provides taxpayers with "more details of how their tax dollars are spent."

The Ontario government published the names, positions and employers of people paid all or largely with public funds, who earned in salary and taxable benefits of at least \$100,000 in 2022.

Ontario Court justices Julia Morneau, Valerie Brown and Kevin Sherwood, each earned \$347,138.

Grey Bruce Health Services president and CEO Gary Sims earned \$348,115 and appears to be the top earner in Grey-Bruce in 2022. For Grey Bruce Health Services, the list has 232 names, up from 149 in 2021.

Grey Bruce Public Health employees on the list numbered 11, down from 27 in 2021. Grey-Bruce medical officer of health, Dr. lan Arra, earned \$339,229 and physician consultant Rim Zayed earned \$301,008.

The Bluewater District School Board has 568 employees on the list, one fewer than in 2021.

Bruce-Grey Catholic District School Board has 156 employees listed, down from 163 in 2021.

Grey County - 98 on the list, up from 71 in 2021. CAO Kim Wingrove earned \$218,217, followed by deputy CAO Randy Scherzer, \$167,780; director of legal services Michael Letourneau, \$167,092; director of community services Anne Marie Shaw, \$164,810; director of long-term care Jennifer Cornell, \$158,602; director of transportation Services Patrick Hoy, \$156,675; director of paramedic services Kevin McNab, \$155,792; and director of economic development and tourism Savanna Meyers, \$150,821.

Owen Sound - 79 on the list (*inc police and fire*), up from 73 in 2021, with the top earner being Police Chief Craig Ambrose, at \$198,938. City manager Tim Simmons earned \$195,732, followed by Pam Coulter, director of community services, and Kate Allan, director of corporate services, each of whom earned \$143,887; chief librarian Tim Nicholls Harrison, \$136,230

Owen Sound Police Service - **32** on the list, down from 34 in 2021. In addition to Ambrose, top earners included inspectors Dave Bishop and Jeff Fluney, each earning \$161,869.

Owen Sound Fire & Emergency Services - **24** on the list, two more than last year. Fire Chief Phil Eagleson earned the most, \$162,398.

Hanover - 14 on the list, (*inc 9 police and fire*) up by two from 2021. Police Chief Chris Knoll, \$179,703; Deputy Chief George Hebblethwaite, \$148,204; and town CEO Sherri Walden, \$136,539, are the top three earners there.

West Grey - 24 on the list, (*incl 15 police*) up from 17 last year, led by Police Chief Rob Martin, \$200,458; CAO/deputy clerk Laura Johnston, \$163,712; and Rhonda Lantz, police records manager, \$156,591.

Meaford - 6 on the list, the same as in 2021. CAO Rob Armstrong earned \$174,325; clerk/director of community services Matt Smith earned \$128,852; and director of development services Robert Voigt earned \$127,354.

Chatsworth - 2 on the list, up from one in 2021, led by CEO Patty Sinnamon, who earned \$153,984.

Georgian Bluffs - 5 (*incl 1 fire*) on the list, the same as in 2021, led by CAO Cynthia Fletcher, \$177,418; Inter Township Fire Department Chief Jeff Gautreau, \$125,357; and director of corporate services/clerk Brittany Drury, \$116,157.

Southgate - 2 on the list, the same as in 2021. CAO David Milliner earned \$139,446 last year.

Grey Highlands - 8 on the list, up 3 from 2021. CAO Karen Govan earned \$185,457; director of environmental services Shawn Moyer, \$125,105; director of corporate services Raylene Martell, \$119,276; economic development director Michele Harris, \$118,776.

Blue Mountains - **26** (*incl* 5 *fire*) on the list, six more than in 2021, led by CAO Shawn Everitt, \$211,382. Its four directors all earned about \$145,000: Ruth Prince, finance/information technology; Shaw Carey, operations; Ryan Gibbons, community services; and William Thomson, legal services. Library CEO Sabrina Saunders earned \$131,461.

2023 Town Budget Approved by Council

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise residents that Council approved the 2023 Town Budget on Monday, March 27, 2023, during the scheduled Council meeting. The approved budget includes the three-year operating budget, the five-year capital budget and the 2023 Fees and Charges.

The 2023 Budget includes a property tax rate increase of 2.55%, representing an increase of \$53 on the Town's portion of the tax bill for an average home in The Blue Mountains as set by MPAC at \$555,840.

The approved budget includes an investment of \$23.2 million to support key infrastructure projects throughout the Town, including:

- Completion of the Thornbury West Road Reconstruction Phase 1B (\$5.75M)
- Peel Street North Reconstruction (\$4.9M)
- Road Maintenance Equipment Replacement (\$1.7M)
- Engineering at the Craigleith Wastewater Treatment Plant for the Lift Station(\$1.35M)

Completing these projects will help ensure that the services delivered by the Town can continue to be delivered efficiently and effectively without service interruptions.




