## Be Prepared This Winter Season

The Town of The Blue Mountains Fire Department would like to remind the public to be prepared for a winter emergency with a plan and supplies available to keep themselves safe during the holiday season.

Steps you can take to ensure you are prepared this winter season include:

### Keeping a winter survival kit in your car

Be prepared for winter driving and always keep a winter survival kit in your car. Kits should include:

- charged phone
- water
- non-perishable food
- flashlight
- blanket and warm clothes
- jumper cables
- shovel
- traction mats or sand
- candles and a lighter or matches

### Build a 72-hour kit

During an emergency, it may take time to get to your household while first responders are assisting those in immediate danger. Having a 72-hour kit will allow your family to be self-sufficient and supported in an emergency.

Your emergency survival kit should have everything you and your household would need to be safe and take care of yourselves for at least three days immediately following an emergency.

The following list is broken down into the essentials, items you may need to meet your household's unique needs, and items to have ready in case you have to leave your home.

#### Essentials

- food (non-perishable and easy-to-prepare items, enough for three days) and a manual can opener
- bottled water (4 litres per person for each day)
- medication(s)
- flashlight and glow stick
- radio (crank or battery-run)
- extra batteries
- first-aid kit
- candles and matches/lighter
- hand sanitizer or moist towelettes
- important papers (identification, contact lists, prescriptions, etc.)

- whistle (to attract attention, if needed)
- zip-lock bag (to keep things dry)
- garbage bags
- Special considerations
- items for babies and small children—diapers, formula, bottles, baby food, comfort items
- prescription medication
- medical supplies and equipment
- pet food and supplies
- any other items specific to your household's needs
- Extra supplies for evacuation
- clothes, shoes
- sleeping bags or blankets
- personal items (soap, toothpaste, shampoo, comb, other toiletries)
- playing cards, travel games and other activities for children

#### Tips

1. Pack the contents of your kit in an easy-to-carry bag(s) or a case on wheels.
2. Store your kit in a place that is easy to reach and ensure that everyone in your household knows where it is.
3. Your kit does not have to be built overnight. Spread your shopping over a few weeks. Purchase a few items every time you go to the store.
4. Your water supply is meant to cover what you would drink as well as what you might need for food preparation, hygiene and dishwashing.
5. Check and refresh your kit twice a year—when the clocks shift to/from daylight savings time is a good time. Check all expiry dates and replace food and water with a fresh supply. Check batteries and replace as needed.
6. Keep your cell phone or mobile device fully charged.

#### Road Safety

The Blue Mountains Fire Department encourages all travelers to drive according to road conditions. Plan your travel by using Ontario 511 to check road status, cameras, weather, and Track My Plow to find out where plows are on provincial highways.

Grey Bruce CSWBP  
**Community Safety &  
 Well-Being Planning**

**Bruce-Grey is recruiting participants for an action table focusing on crime prevention.**

This will bring together interested members of the public with representatives from local police services, municipalities, businesses, educational organizations, and other community agencies. The focus will be on crime prevention through social development by identifying opportunities for increased awareness, education, and engagement with the public concerning the risk and protective factors related to crime.

Members of this action table will work towards educating the public by addressing misconceptions related to crime and social disorder and providing evidence-based information relating to how we understand perceptions of safety, with the goal of sustaining safe communities across our region. Together, they will promote collaborative approaches to enhance planning and preventative strategies to community safety.

**What is Community Safety and Well-Being Planning (CSWBP) Bruce-Grey?**

CSWBP promotes an evidence-based, research-driven approach to reducing crime by focusing on factors that impact safety and well-being before crime occurs. As a collaborative venture, the CSWBP Advisory Committee is comprised of representatives from lower-tier municipalities, the counties of Bruce and Grey, police services and police service boards, boards of education, and education, health and social services agencies and community partners. CSWBP provides a model for cross-section collaboration and coordination that focuses on crime prevention by investing in social development, prevention and risk intervention in order to reduce the need for acute incident responses.

**Why is CSWBP establishing a Crime Prevention Action Table?**

In Phase 2 of CSWBP, action tables are being identified to address five priority areas - including crime prevention - that have been determined to be of greatest concern. Action tables focus primarily on social development and prevention as we work together to create and sustain safer communities throughout Grey-Bruce. Action tables will respond to issues that fall within the purview of each priority area by implementing an action plan that will identify and track measurable indicators, progress, and outcomes. Issues addressed through action tables will require a broad, system-level response and will bring together community partners and individuals who are interested in collaborative responses to actionable, evidence-informed issues impacting safety and well-being.

In the community engagement survey that informed the initial phase of CSWBP, crime prevention was identified as an area of priority, ranking third overall, and in the top three areas of importance by 44% of survey respondents (Bruce County 42%, Grey County 46%). When asked which areas were of particular concern in this category, break and enter, drug trafficking and theft were the top concerns, followed by intimate partner or domestic violence and human trafficking. Members of the crime prevention action table will address these and other aspects of crime prevention through research, education and public outreach, and will work towards collaborative strategies that focus on improving safety and perceptions of safety in our communities.

## Ontario Expanding Safe Use of Biosimilars

Transitioning to biosimilars will allow province to invest in and improve access to medicines

Ontario is joining several other provinces and territories by expanding the use of biosimilar drug treatments for Ontarians. Starting March 31, 2023, Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) recipients who are on an originator biologic will begin to transition to a Health Canada approved biosimilar version of the drug at no cost.

“Ontario is joining other provinces and territories in the country by expanding the use of safe and effective biosimilar drugs,” said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. “Patients will continue receiving the same high-quality treatment, while allowing the government to fund more new drug therapies, bring innovation to the health care system and continue its work to deliver better, connected patient care.”

Patients and health care providers can be confident that the quality, safety and patient benefits of the biosimilar are highly similar to the biologic drug. Biosimilars undergo the same robust and rigorous approval process by Health Canada and to be approved in Canada, a biosimilar must be proven to be highly similar, with no clinically meaningful differences in terms of safety and efficacy.

Ontarians receiving coverage under the ODB program for Copaxone®, Enbrel®, Humalog®, Humira®, Lantus®, NovoRapid®, Remicade®, and Rituxan®, will be required to transition to the biosimilar version by December 29, 2023. During the transition period between March 31 and December 29, 2023, patients are encouraged to discuss a transition plan with their health care provider through in-person, telephone or virtual visits. Exemptions will be considered for patients in certain clinical circumstances on a case-by-case basis in consultation with their health care provider.

Ahead of the transition period starting on March 31, 2023, the ministry will continue to work with partners, including physicians, pharmacists and manufacturers, to ensure a smooth and successful transition. This switch will allow Ontario to invest more in new and innovative drug treatments and continue to grow the roster of publicly funded life saving drugs.

- Biosimilars have been used in the European Union for more than 15 years and Ontario is the eighth Canadian jurisdiction to expand the use of biosimilar medications, following British Columbia, Alberta, New Brunswick, Quebec, Northwest Territories, Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan.
- Biologics are drugs made with living organisms (e.g., yeast or animal cells), rather than being synthetically manufactured, and are often used to treat patients with chronic health conditions such as rheumatoid arthritis, inflammatory bowel disease, and diabetes. An originator biologic is the first version of a biologic drug.



### Notice of Study Completion - The Corporation of the Town of The Blue Mountains Transportation Master Plan

The Town of The Blue Mountains (Town) has developed a comprehensive Transportation Master Plan (TMP). TMPs are long-range plans that guide transportation planning and infrastructure needs to accommodate growth and development within a broad area, along with policies to guide transportation and land use decisions.

As part of the TMP process, our consultants, Stantec Consulting Ltd. assessed the Town's existing and future transportation challenges and opportunities, and worked to identify short- and long-term transportation infrastructure needs. Recommendations in the TMP support improved connectivity and travel times, enhance safety, and encourage active transportation and transit. The TMP includes recommendations for operational, design, and transportation policies that the Town will use to manage its transportation infrastructure to 2042.

The TMP is an important resource for the Town as it continues to adapt to changing needs, growth and development, and new opportunities. The TMP will shape how we travel, help us further understand and define our regional connections, and support the movement of goods and services throughout the region.


#### The Process

### 2022/2023 Winter Parking Restrictions & Resident Snow Removal

## Ontario Creating More Affordable Child Care Spaces Across the Province

The Ontario government is making child care more affordable and accessible for families across the province, creating an additional 53,000 new, affordable licensed child care spaces by December 2026 – bringing our total to 86,000 new spaces since 2019.

In March 2022, Ontario secured a six-year, \$13.2 billion agreement with the federal government which will lower fees for families and deliver an average of \$10 a day child care by September 2025. This included an initial investment of \$10.2 billion for the first five years of the agreement and an additional commitment for at least \$3 billion in year six. Today, as part of that agreement, Ontario is announcing a targeted plan to create new licensed child care spaces, with a focus on increasing access to families across Ontario.

“We are delivering savings directly to families while increasing access to child care spaces in communities small and large,” said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. “Our government is making child care affordable — with savings averaging between \$6,000 to \$10,000 per child by the end of this year — and investing in new spaces that will benefit parents for years to come. With the cost of living rising across the country, the Ontario government is increasing access to child care spaces and delivering needed financial relief for families.”

The new spaces will be allocated to communities across Ontario using a model that incorporates demographics, socio-economic indicators, and existing licensed child care capacity. The new spaces will be part of the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care (CWELCC) system and includes a mix of not-for-profit and for-profit centres, a key priority of the Government of Ontario to respect and ultimately provide families with choice and flexibility. Additionally, the province will enhance the availability of flexible models of care for a changing economy and labour market – for example, child care spaces that are available on weekends and overnight to support people who work shifts.

To ensure child care spaces are also created in locations and for populations most in need — including for children with special needs, Indigenous and Franco-Ontarian communities — Ontario is launching a \$213 million grant program for new and existing operators. These one-time grants, prioritizing regions with historically low rates of space availability, will help child care operators offset the initial costs of expanding or creating spaces, such as purchasing equipment or renovating facilities.

To date, 92 per cent of Ontario’s licensed child care sites have enrolled in the CWELCC system. Families across the province with children in these centres are already seeing fee reductions of up to 25 per cent, retroactive to April 1, 2022. By the end of this year,

families with children under the age of six in participating licensed child care programs will see a further fee reduction of up to 50 per cent relative to 2020 levels.

Ontario remains committed to the success of the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care system and will continue to work with municipalities and stakeholders across the province to ensure affordable child care is available in communities where it is needed most.

## Ontario Investing in Licensed Child Care

The Ontario government is creating 53,000 new licensed child care spaces across the province by December 2026, in addition to more than 33,000 licensed child care spaces created since 2019 –bringing the total to 86,000 new spaces.

These spaces will include a mix of not-for-profit and for-profit centres to provide families with choice and flexibility, with a focus in communities with children who need them most.

Funding is available to support municipalities to achieve new space creation targets:

County of Grey - 504; County of Simcoe - 3,082

Funding for an additional 8,032 spaces is available in contingency funding. The contingency funding is to address higher than anticipated capacity for growth across the province and will follow from discussion with municipalities to address additional growth.
