2023 Proposed Town Budget Now Available for Public Input

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise residents that the 2023 Proposed Town Budget is now available for public review and input. The proposed budget includes a three-year operating budget, a five-year capital budget, and proposed Fees and Charges. The purpose of the proposed budget is to serve as a starting point for budget discussions with Council and members of the public.

The budget will be reviewed and deliberated by Council at a series of special budget meetings scheduled for the following dates:

- Wednesday, February 1, 2023, at 10:00 a.m.**
- Thursday, February 2, 2023, at 9:30 a.m.**
- Friday, February 3, 2023, at 9:30 a.m.**
- Monday, February 6, 2023, at 9:30 a.m. (if necessary)**

The special budget meetings will be conducted in-person and will be live-streamed with a recording posted to the Town website following the meeting. Following review and direction from Council through these meetings, revisions to the budget may be made, and the updated budget will be posted to the Town website on Tuesday, February 14, 2023.

Following the release of the updated budget, the Town will hold a Public Meeting on Tuesday, March 7, 2023. The public meeting provides the opportunity for residents to address Council directly or to submit an email or letter that will be read aloud by the Town Clerk.

Following the public meeting, Town Staff will then bring a report to the Committee of the Whole on Monday, March 13, 2023, outlining the public's comments from the Public Meeting. Following this meeting, any further changes will be incorporated into the 2023 Draft Budget for Council approval, which is expected to occur on Monday, March 27, 2023.

About the 2023 Proposed Town Budget

The 2023 Proposed Budget aims to deliver the needed services that residents, businesses, and visitors rely on while keeping property taxes and user fees at a level that ensures growth, prosperity, and community investment. A main focus of the 2023 Proposed Budget is to ensure that the Town's Asset Management Plan is fully funded to allow for long-term financial stability.

The 2023 Proposed Tax Rate increase is 8.28%. This represents an increase of \$175 to an approximate total of \$2,280 for the Town portion of annual property taxes. These numbers are based on the assessed value of an average home in The Blue Mountains as set by MPAC at \$555,840.

Also included in the budget is a proposed increase in water and wastewater user fees. These fees are paid directly by the users that are connected to Municipal water and wastewater services. For the average home in the Town, the below chart outlines the impact of the Water and Wastewater User-Fee increase.

Water (180 m3)	\$59
Wastewater (180 m3)	\$40
Total Impact	\$99

The 2023 Proposed Budget also includes a \$20M capital budget to support key infrastructure projects throughout the Town. Projects include:

- Completion of the Thornbury West Road Reconstruction Phase 1B (\$5.75M)
- Peel Street North Reconstruction (\$4.9M)
- Road Maintenance Equipment Replacement (\$1.7M)

Completing these projects will help ensure that the services delivered by the Town can continue to be delivered efficiently and effectively without service interruptions.

Ontario Reducing Wait Times for Surgeries and Procedures

Community surgical and diagnostic centres connecting people to faster, more convenient care with your health card

The Ontario government is making it easier and faster for people to access the publicly-funded surgeries and procedures they need by further leveraging community surgical and diagnostic centres to eliminate surgical backlogs and reduce wait times. As the government significantly expands the number of surgeries being done through community surgical and diagnostic centres, it will do so with measures in place to protect the stability of health human resources at public hospitals, including requiring new facilities to provide detailed staffing plans as part of their application and requiring a number of physicians at these centres to have active privileges at their local hospital.

National Volunteer Week is celebrated annually during the third week of April and this year it will be observed from April 16 to May 7. This week-long celebration is about placing a spotlight on inspiring figures whose invaluable seeds of kindness through volunteering are bettering the community and our world in general. "When it comes to your health, the status quo is no longer acceptable," said Premier Doug Ford. "Our government is taking bold action to reduce wait times for surgeries, all while ensuring Ontarians use their OHIP card to get the care they need, never their credit card."

Community surgical and diagnostic centres have been valuable partners in responding to the pandemic and addressing the pandemic-related backlog in surgeries. Increasing community delivery of surgeries has proven to increase patient and provider satisfaction and reduces the risk of a rescheduled appointment. Surgeries performed at these centres will be publicly-funded.

Ontario has a three-step plan that better integrates and uses these state-of-the-art facilities to speed up how quickly people are able to get surgeries and procedures using their health card.

Step One: Ontario is urgently tackling the existing backlog for cataract surgeries, which has one of the longest waits for procedures. New partnerships with community surgical and diagnostic centres in Windsor, Kitchener-Waterloo and Ottawa will add 14,000 additional cataract surgeries that will be performed each year. This number represents up to 25% of the province's current cataract waitlist, and accounts for the estimated COVID-related backlog of cataract surgeries. These centres will perform the 14,000 additional surgeries with existing health human resources.

Ontario is also investing more than \$18 million in existing centres to cover care for thousands of patients, including more than 49,000 hours of MRI and CT scans, 4,800 cataract surgeries, 900 other ophthalmic surgeries, 1,000 minimally invasive gynecological surgeries and 2,845 plastic surgeries such as hand soft tissue repair. Surgical wait lists are anticipated to return to pre-pandemic levels by March 2023, barring operational issues.

Step Two: To further reduce wait times, Ontario is expanding the scope of community surgical and diagnostic centres to address regional needs with a continued focus on cataracts, as well as MRI and CT imaging and colonoscopy and endoscopy procedures. To start as early as 2023, these procedures will be non-urgent, low-risk and minimally invasive and, in addition to shortening wait times, will allow hospitals to focus their efforts and resources on more complex and high-risk surgeries.

Step Three: Early detection and diagnosis of a health issue has an immense benefit on a patient's quality of life, prognosis and treatment path. As a next step, the government will introduce legislation in February that will, if passed, allow existing community diagnostic centres to conduct more MRI and CT scanning so that people can access publicly funded diagnostic services faster and closer to home.

Starting in 2024, this next step will also expand surgeries for hip and knee replacements. Legislative changes will also, if passed, strengthen oversight of community surgical settings so that patients can continue to expect to receive the world class care they know and deserve and provide the province with more flexibility to continue to expand access to more surgeries and further reduce wait times. As the province expands the role of community surgical and diagnostic centres, Ontario Health and the Ministry of Health will continue to work with system partners and clinical experts to put in place the highest standards for quality and safety.

As the government shortens wait times using community surgical and diagnostic centres, Ontario Health will ensure that these centres are included in regional health system planning. Funding agreements with new community surgical and diagnostic centres will require these facilities to work with local public hospitals to ensure health system integration and linkages, including connection and reporting into the province's wait times information system and participation in regional central intakes, where available. Community surgical and diagnostic centres will also coordinate with local public hospitals to accept patients that are being referred, ensuring people get the surgery they need as quickly as possible.

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Call for Applications for Provincial Appointee to The Blue Mountains Police Services Board

The Ministry of the Solicitor General are seeking applications from members of the public for one appointment to the Town of The Blue Mountains Police Services Board as the Provincial Appointee.

Appointees to the Police Services Boards should be active members of their community with a general knowledge of Police Services Boards duties and responsibilities, and awareness of community safety issues and programs within their local community. Members appointed by the Province of Ontario must be residents of Ontario and cannot be a judge, justice of the peace, a current police officers or a person who practices criminal law as a defence counsel. There is no limit in the Police Services Board Act with respect to the term of the Provincial Appointee.

Per the Police Services Act a minimum of 4 meetings per year are held, plus an additional Joint Town of Collingwood and Town of The Blue Mountains meeting is held once per year. Meetings are generally once per quarter on the third Wednesday of the month from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Meetings are held in-person at Town Hall, Council Chambers at 32 Mill Street, Thornbury, N0H 2P0. Meetings for the 2023 Calendar Year are scheduled as follows:

- January 18, 2023
- April 19, 2023
- July 19, 2023
- October 18, 2023

2022/2023 Winter Parking Restrictions & Resident Snow Removal

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that Winter Parking Restrictions come into effect on Tuesday, November 1, 2022. In accordance with the Highway Traffic Act and Town By-law No. 2003-11, overnight parking is prohibited on all Town streets from 2:00 am to 7:00 am. Winter Parking Restrictions will remain in effect until April 1, 2023.

In addition, residents are reminded that Town By-law No. 2014-65 prohibits the deposit of snow or ice onto a Town roadway, including the shoulder, sidewalk, walkway, boulevard, or ditch, without written permission from the Director of Operations.

Residents are also asked to remove items from the roadside including basketball nets, hockey nets, boats and all trailers, landscaping items or any other items that may interfere with snow removal operations.

Winter parking and snow removal restrictions are necessary to help ensure that snow removal operations can be completed safely and effectively. The Town would like to thank all residents for their cooperation throughout the winter season.

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Notice of Public Information Centre: Municipal Class Environmental Assessment and Preliminary Design for a Gravity Sewer, Lift Station and Septage Receiving Station at the Craigleith Wastewater Treatment Plant

The Town of The Blue Mountains' sanitary sewer collection and pumping infrastructure within the Craigleith area requires upgrades and enhancements to meet the projected demands of growth. The Town has initiated a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment to evaluate and select the preferred solution to address the need for a gravity sewer and associated lift station at the Craigleith Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). Additionally, an assessment will be completed to determine if the septage and leachate receiving station should be relocated to the WWTP. After an evaluation of alternatives against the natural, social and economic environmental criteria, the preferred alternative consists of the following:

- Extending the sewage collection system to the existing gravity sewer on the southern boundary of the intersection of Grey Road 21 and Highway 26 north within the Long Point Road allowance to the Craigleith WWTP.
- The construction of a new lift station located close to the administration building in the southeast quadrant of the site to raise the wastewater from the new sanitary sewer into the treatment plant.
- The relocation of the septage and leachate receiving station from its current location on Lakeshore Road to be integrated into the new lift station building.
- Design of all facilities to accommodate imminent near-term and build out needs.

The gravity sewer along Long Point Road is considered a Schedule "A" project and may proceed; however, the pumping station and septage receiving station at the Craigleith WWTP on Long Point Road is considered a Schedule "B" project. The proposed solution has been selected in consultation with regulatory agencies and the public. Input from the public, agencies and other stakeholders will be sought throughout the study to identify options to address the study findings and optimize the evaluation process.

Grey County Council Meeting Highlights

Grey County Council met January 12th, in the Council Chamber and virtually through Zoom. Recordings of the meetings can be found on Grey County's YouTube Channel.

County Council

- Council recognized several paramedics who recently received Exemplary Service Awards for 20, 30 and 40 years of service.
- Staff gave a short verbal update to council highlighting the incredible response of staff during the holiday blizzard. Highlights were shared about road plowing, paramedic services, housing and community services, and long-term care.

Committee of the Whole

- Herb Shields of TC Energy provided council with an update of the proposed Ontario Pumped Storage project at the 4th Canadian Division Training Centre. TC Energy is asking Grey County staff to review an Impact Assessment later this year, to share project details with local vendors and suppliers, and to provide feedback and advice on the project.
- Council heard a delegation from board members of Eat Local Grey Bruce. The cooperative local food organization delivers locally sourced products to subscribers in the region. Eat Local Grey Bruce has faced several challenges in recent years and is facing insolvency. Grey County was asked to consider providing \$20,000 and ongoing warehousing support.
- Staff presented council with a preliminary budget overview report. The report shows estimated revenues, expenses, and levy funding required to deliver services in 2023. The report highlighted several pressures impacting the budget, such as previously committed investments, inflation, insurance premiums and more. After factoring in new levy collected from additional growth in the

past year, an additional \$2,340,000 would be required to deliver services and programs at the levels recommended, an increase of 3.66% to the levy compared to 2022. After discussing the report, Council directed staff to target a \$1 million levy increase. Staff will prepare a detailed budget package which will be discussed by County Council at a special budget meeting on Friday, January 27.

- Council approved the 2023 Early Years and Child Care agreements with the Ministry of Education.
- Grey County will enter into an agreement with the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation for \$600,000 in funding in support of the 14th Street Supportive Housing project.
- Grey County will enter into an agreement with the Province to receive over \$500,000 in funding through the Ontario Priorities Housing Initiative in support of the 14th Street Supportive Housing project.
- Council approved increasing insurance levels to adequately protect the County following changes with the Workplace Safety and Insurance Board.
- Staff presented a report highlighting issues with off-road vehicles (ORVs) at the Glenelg Klondyke County Forest. ORVs are not permitted in this forest but have caused damage to trail surfaces. Staff proposed making a request to West Grey to amend its ORV By-law to prohibit off-road vehicles from driving down portions of the adjacent roads. Council voted to defer the motion to a future meeting and directed staff to bring back additional details outlining options to enforce the active by-laws preventing ORVs from accessing the forest.
- Council provided pre-budget approval to tender approximately half of the year's road construction projects. Tendering projects early increases the County's ability to find contractors at competitive prices.
- Council provided pre-budget approval for the capital purchase of mechanical compression devices for paramedics. Patient Care Standards have been updated by the Ministry of Health. These devices are now recommended to increase the chance of survival for cardiac arrest patients in certain settings.
- Council approved the terms of reference and membership on a variety of task forces and committees.
