COUNCIL UPDATES

Council Direction to Preliminary Proceed with the Implementation of Municipal Accommodation Tax" FAF.24.067

AND THAT Council receive the draft Municipal Accommodation Tax By-law and directs staff to schedule a Public Meeting on September 10, 2024, to receive comments from the public regarding the draft By-law;

AND THAT Council acknowledges that the Town's Notice Policy, requires 21 days' notice of this Public Meeting, and that notice of the public meeting will be posted to the Town website on August 20, 2024;

AND THAT Council receive the draft Town Use of MAT Funds Policy, and directs staff to make the draft policy available on the project webpage to receive feedback from the public and stakeholders throughout Summer 2024;

AND THAT Council approves the Blue Mountain Village Association as the Town's official Destination Marketing Organization and confirms that if Municipal Accommodation Tax is implemented, the Blue Mountain Village Association will be deemed as the eligible tourism entity that will receive a portion of the collected revenue based on a revenue sharing agreement between the Town and the

Blue Mountain Village Association that will be brought forward to Council in a future staff report;

AND THAT Council approves a project budget at an upset limit of \$80,000 to be temporarily funded through working capital and directs staff to finalize the request-for-proposal process by awarding the Tourism and Marketing Strategy Request-for Proposal 2024-30-P-ADM contract to the successful bidder as determined through the formal evaluation process.

The Municipal Accommodation Tax is a hotel tax that is becoming increasingly popular among municipalities. MAT is a tax on the accommodation of short-term rental properties such as hotels, motels, bed and breakfasts, and other similar establishments. It is imposed on the guest during check-out and collected by the hotel or other accommodation providers towards the end of the stay.

In addition, the tax is used to fund tourism and other municipal initiatives. It is important to note that the MAT is implemented and managed by each municipality. While the tax rate and implementation vary from one municipality to another, it is a percentage (4% on average) of the total accommodation fee.

Municipal Funding Agreement – Canada Community-Building Fund, FAF.24.088

The 2005 Federal budget established a federal Gas Tax Fund to share federal gasoline excise tax revenues with communities over five years to support environmentally sustainable infrastructure. The federal infrastructure funding has been a reliable source of funding for Municipalities since 2005, changing names from the Gas Tax Fund to the Canada Community Building Fund in 2021. The Municipal Funding Agreement extends the infrastructure funding from 2024 to 2034. This new agreement will provide over \$8 million to Ontario municipalities each year.

Funds are allocated to municipalities across the province on a percapita basis based on the 2021 census.

The following represents an estimate of the funds to be provided by AMO for the first five years (2024-2028) of the agreement. 2024-\$295,223; 2025-\$307,524; 2026-\$307,524; 2027-\$319,825; 2028-\$319,825



Grey County Council Updates June 27

- Council discussed a notice of motion from Councillor Boddy regarding the cost of security at courthouses. The Community Safety and Policing Act states that the local police service is responsible for the security of courthouses. Locally this cost falls on Owen Sound Police Services and was \$236,000 in 2023. Council supported the motion directing staff to create a report outlining other options for funding this service at the County level. The Ontario Court of Justice and Superior Court of Justice in Owen Sound serve communities in the Grey and Bruce region.
- Council received a delegation on the Community Safety and Wellbeing Plan and the newly developed action tables. Five action tables have been created focusing on housing and homelessness, poverty, mental health, addictions and substance use, and crime prevention.
- Council approved a sponsorship agreement for the 10-year naming rights of the theatre at Grey Roots Museum and Archives. Wheildon Investments Inc will contribute \$50,000 to Grey Roots over the next five years and the theatre will be known as the Thomas Wheildon Theatre through 2034. Warden Milne thanked Mr. Whieldon for the generous sponsorship. In the report, Council also learned about the proposed theatre improvement plan which will be implemented in phases over the next three years. www.grey.ca

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Ontario Bolstering Nursing Workforce in Emergency Departments

The Ontario government is continuing to build a stronger, more resilient health care workforce by investing \$10 million to help more than 1,000 nurses upskill their training to provide emergency department care. This will help bolster, stabilize and maintain the nursing workforce in emergency departments across the province, especially in rural and remote hospitals, to connect more people to critical care close to home.

Since its launch last year, over 400 nurses from 72 rural and remote hospitals received this upskill training. Today's investment enhances the program this year to allow more than 1,000 nurses working in small, rural and remote emergency departments across the province to access four crucial training and education programs:

Virtual Training Modules to deliver high-quality, interactive sessions for general ED orientation, core competency skills and more. Over the last year, 847 sessions were attended by nurses from 72 small, rural, and remote hospitals.

Immersion Programs that provide multi-day, in-person, skills training to educate new emergency department nurses in small, rural, and remote hospitals. Over the last year, 53 nurses from 26 small, rural, and remote hospitals attended three Immersion Programs and were able to get hands-on upskilling.

Specialty Training Fund to provide training education grants to support nurses to complete training courses for core ED nursing skills. Last year over 2,600 courses were funded to break financial barriers for nurses to upskill.

Establishment of Regional Educator Program that will increase access to important continuing education and training resources for ED nurses in their region.

Through Your Health: A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care, the Ontario government continues to take bold and decisive action to support the province's highly-skilled workforce and ensure people and their families have access to high-quality care where and when they need it, closer to home.

The Emergency Department Nursing Education, Retention and **Workforce Program** is furthering nursing skills in the emergency department to better meet the needs of communities. The program enables access to education, particularly for nurses in small hospitals that do not have ready access to emergency department nurse education and those in remote areas who would otherwise have to travel long distances. Access to the program supports the retention and recruitment of emergency department nurses.

Quick Facts

- · Since 2018, Ontario has seen a record-breaking number of new health care professionals join the workforce, adding 80,000 new nurses with another 30,000 nurses currently studying at Ontario colleges and universities, and adding over 24,000 new PSWs since 2020.
- Since expanding the role of registered nurses to prescribe medications, 122 registered nurses have been authorized to prescribe, after meeting specific requirements, with close to 900 more prepared to take the required education.
- The province continues to work with the College of Nurses of Ontario to break down barriers for internationally educated nurses. The Supervised Practice Experience Partnership provides internationally educated nurses the opportunity to demonstrate their current nursing knowledge, skill and language proficiency while working to meet the requirements to enter practice as a nurse. This program has funded more than 3,400 internationally educated nurses since it launched in January 2022.
- · Last year, over 17,000 new nurses registered to work in the province, a record number of new nurses registered to work in the province, with another 30,000 nursing students currently studying at one of Ontario's colleges and universities.
- Ontario is investing \$743 million over three years to continue to address immediate health care staffing needs, as well as to grow the workforce for years to come.

opportunities by building 300 new campsites and bringing electrical services to 800 existing campsites at several parks throughout the province, the largest addition of new and electrified campsites in Ontario Parks' history. Since 2018, the province has invested \$55.4 million to help maintain and build more facilities including roofed accommodations in provincial parks to help meet the demand of the province's growing population, while ensuring an enjoyable experience for all visitors.

Throughout the summer, Ontario Parks offers numerous ways to engage with nature including:

- In-park Discovery Programs which allow kids and adults to gain confidence in nature and around wildlife through activities such as guided hikes to explore a new trail and other educational programs.
- The 30x30 Nature Challenge to encourage people to spend 30 minutes in nature for 30 days during the month of August.
- Take a Hike Day on August 10, providing guided hikes at provincial parks around the province. Visitors can join in on one of the many events happening across the province.
- To guarantee access on Healthy Parks Healthy People Day, visitors are strongly encouraged to obtain a daily vehicle permit up to five days before the celebration, at no charge, for the 75 parks that offer this service.

Quick Facts

- Studies show spending time in nature can improve our mental, physical and social well-being, including lower blood pressure, increased self-esteem and reduced anxiety.
- Every dollar spent at Ontario Parks, from seasonal passes to merchandise, is re-invested into Ontario Parks, helping to create a better park experience for visitors, improve services, programs and amenities and protect over 630 provincial parks and conservation reserves across the province.
- As part of the 2024 Ontario Budget: Building a Better Ontario, the government committed \$19 million over three years to establish Ontario's first urban provincial park, Uxbridge Urban Provincial Park in the Township of Uxbridge, which opened to the public July 1, 2024. This funding will support costs related to regulation of the initial parcels of land, park management planning and consultation, park operations, and possible future expansion.
- Planning is underway to open the first new, all-season operating provincial park in 40 years near the Town of Bracebridge. Bigwind Lake Provincial Park will offer facilities and recreational activities including swimming, hiking and cross-country skiing, and add around 250 new campsites to the Ontario Parks system. https://www.ontarioparks.ca/

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Youth Climate Action Fund Now Accepting Applications

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public that the Youth Climate Action Fund is now accepting applications.

Youth-led climate initiatives are eligible for microgrants worth between \$1,500 and \$6,000. These projects can be implemented in any community within the traditional Territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, which includes The Blue Mountains, Grey County, Southern Georgian Bay communities, Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation, Chippewas of Saugeen First Nation, Bruce County and other communities within this area.

Projects must be led and implemented by youth between the ages of 15 and 24 and support The Blue Mountains Future Story (the Town's sustainability plan) and/or Going Green in Grey (Grey County's Climate Action Plan). Proposals require the support of an eligible sponsoring organization to be considered. Organizations that are looking to participate or partner with a youth applicant are encouraged to refer to the Recipient Eligibility section of the Youth Climate Action Fund website.

Applications received by or before July 8, 2024, will be considered in a first round of evaluations. Applications received after July 8 will be considered in a second round that will close on August 12, 2024. Successful projects will be announced on August 26, 2024, with all projects to be completed by December 31, 2024.

The Town is also seeking applications, in the form of letters of interest, from members of the public to fill two vacancies on the Town of The Blue Mountains Youth Climate Action Fund Project Team. All applications should be submitted no later than Friday, June 21, 2024, at 1:00 p.m.

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




