Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant Expansion

The Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant was completed in 1994, with a rated capacity of 3580 m3/day. This project will include the construction/ installation of all equipment required for operation of the Extended Aeration treatment system to increase capacity to 5,330 m3/day. This will ensure the Plant is capable of providing reliable service in line with the forecasted growth of the community.

Expansion of the plant was approved as part of the 2020 Town Budget. Construction will be completed in two steps to allow for scheduled advancements. The first step is scheduled to be completed in Q3 2022, with the second step beginning immediately afterwards. The project is expected to be completed in Q4 of 2026.

- · Addition of one extended aeration tank, including aeration system, required accessories, and alum addition
- Addition of one clarifier and associated mechanical system
- Increase the current Ultraviolet disinfection system to meet 5,330 m3/day
- Replacement of existing air blowers, including required valves, controls, instrumentation and distribution piping
- Additional 14,000 m3/day mechanical screen and associated hardware to be
- Incorporate energy efficiency throughout the plant
- Construction of a new outfall pipe to Georgian Bay

June 28, 2024: The Town's contractor continues to make great progress on the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant Expansion project. Work continues on the new aeration tank #3 including the installation of the channel walls and air header piping along the upper walkway. The walls of the new secondary clarifier #3 have been completed and have undergone concrete testing. Upgrades to the existing secondary clarifier #2 have been completed, and work is under way on upgrades to the existing secondary clarifier #1. Excavation around the base of the Ultraviolet Disinfection building has begun to allow for expansion of that facility, and work also continues on the installation of utilities within the new Activated Sludge building and on upgrades to the Administration Building.

July 8, 2024: The Stage 2 Archaeological Field Study for the installation of the Thornbury Wastewater Treatment Plant's new outfall pipe will be taking place on Thursday, July 11 and Friday, July 12. The work will take place on the Grey Street road allowance extension between Bay Street East and Georgian Bay. The contractor does not plan to use any mechanized equipment, and will will face off for Blue be reinstating the test sites to pre-existing conditions following the work.

Planning Decisions Need To Save Wetlands

Canada's wetlands are diverse. They take the form of marshes, bogs, fens, swamps and open water. They appear on the prairies, in the boreal forest, along coastlines and even in the tundra. Every type helps to keep our communities healthy and safe.

Wetlands are defined as land that is saturated with water long enough to promote wetland or aquatic processes as indicated by poorly drained soils, vegetation and other biological activity adapted to a wet environment. (National Wetlands Working Group 1997).

Wetland ecosystems provide ample food sources for a range of plants, insects, microbes, waterfowl and wildlife.

Wetland plants absorb carbon dioxide as they grow, and when they die, that carbon doesn't get released back into the atmosphere.

They protect us from flooding, drought and climate change. They protect wildlife by providing hundreds of species with safe places to eat, sleep and raise young. They give us natural places to play, learn and explore. They also clean the water we enjoy at beaches, lakes and rivers. *from Ducks Unlimited*



Ontario Supporting Wetland Restoration in Ajax

Province working with conservation partners to improve the health of wetlands

AJAX — The Ontario government is investing \$650,000 in a project led by the Town of Ajax to restore approximately seven acres (three hectares) of wetlands in the Carruthers Creek watershed through the Wetlands Conservation Partner Program. This project is one of approximately 200 wetlands projects across Ontario that are collectively receiving \$11 million from the program this year.

As part of this project, the Town of Ajax and conservation partner Toronto and Region Conservation Authority will remove unnecessary drainage pipes left over from past agricultural use to help restore the land to a more natural state. With additional support from Ducks Unlimited Canada, this work will also include creating wetland "pockets" that will hold water on the landscape, as well as planting native trees, shrubs and aquatic plants which will help mitigate urban stormwater impacts, prevent flooding and provide increased habitat for fish and wildlife in the area. The enhanced wetland habitat will also act as a natural water filter to improve water quality.

The Wetlands Conservation Partner Program is one of the largest investments in wetland enhancement and restoration in the province's history. Over the past five years, Ontario has invested over \$31 million to support a wide range of projects, restoring and enhancing large-scale wetlands, smaller wetlands on marginal agricultural lands, and wetlands in more urban areas as part of municipal stormwater management.

Quick Facts

- In the first two years of the Wetlands Conservation Partner Program, an estimated \$6 million worth of damage due to flooding has been avoided and over 170 green jobs created in Ontario's rural and urban communities to undertake restoration work.
- Since the program began in 2020, 30 organizations have received funding for approximately 560 wetlands projects across the province.
- The Wetlands Conservation Partner Program represents one of the largest investments in wetland restoration in Ontario's history.



Construction Notice - Monterra Road

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public of upcoming construction activity on Monterra Road in Craigleith from Grey Road 19 to 200 metres east of Grand Cypress Lane.

Cox Construction Limited will be will be resurfacing approximately 875 metres of Monterra Road. Work will include a new 7 metre wide road surface and a 1.2 metre wide paved shoulder on the north side of the road for a portion of the road section. Sewer maintenance holes and valve chamber chimneys will be rebuilt and guide rail cable posts will be replaced along with other miscellaneous work.

This work is expected to be ongoing until mid to late August 2024. Monterra Road will remain open, but alternating one-way traffic controlled by flaggers will be in place at times.

Georgian Bay Home Share

GBHS interviews both home seekers and home providers before the participants meet each other. References and police checks are required.



Ontario Expanding Seniors Active Living Centres

Call for proposals now open for new Seniors Active Living Centre programs

QUEEN'S PARK —The Ontario government is expanding access to services and activities for seniors through a call for proposals for new Seniors Active Living Centres (SALC) programs. These programs provide social, cultural, learning, and recreational opportunities for seniors to stay fit, healthy and connected in their communities.

Due to the overwhelming success of the more than 300 Seniors Active Living Centres being delivered by municipalities, new changes to the Seniors Active Living Centres Act, 2017 came into effect June 1, 2024 that enable more types of organizations to deliver Seniors Active Living Centre programs.

The call for proposals is now open to eligible organizations until **September 12, 2024, at 5 p.m.** In addition to municipalities, other local and community-based organizations such as Legions, Lion's Clubs, and recreational clubs, are now welcome to apply.

This expansion is in addition to the more than \$15 million announced last month to support all current SALC programs across the province, an increase of approximately \$1 million from last year. This will result in a majority of SALC programs getting a maintenance and operating funding increase from \$42,700 to up to \$50,000. Organizations that deliver SALC programming contribute 20 per cent of the cost of delivering the program, with the province providing the remaining 80 per cent.

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Youth Climate Action Fund Now Accepting Applications

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public that the Youth Climate Action Fund is now accepting applications.

Youth-led climate initiatives are eligible for microgrants worth between \$1,500 and \$6,000. These projects can be implemented in any community within the traditional Territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, which includes The Blue Mountains, Grey County, Southern Georgian Bay communities, Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation, Chippewas of Saugeen First Nation, Bruce County and other communities within this area.

Projects must be led and implemented by youth between the ages of 15 and 24 and support The Blue Mountains Future Story (the Town's sustainability plan) and/or Going Green in Grey (Grey County's Climate Action Plan). Proposals require the support of an eligible sponsoring organization to be considered. Organizations that are looking to participate or partner with a youth applicant are encouraged to refer to the Recipient Eligibility section of the Youth Climate Action Fund website.

Applications received by or before July 8, 2024, will be considered in a first round of evaluations. Applications received after July 8 will be considered in a second round that will close on August 12, 2024. Successful projects will be announced on August 26, 2024, with all projects to be completed by December 31, 2024.

The Town is also seeking applications, in the form of letters of interest, from members of the public to fill two vacancies on the Town of The Blue Mountains Youth Climate Action Fund Project Team. All applications should be submitted no later than Friday, June 21, 2024, at 1:00 p.m.

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Town to Begin 2024 Road Surface Treatment Work

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to advise the public that surface treatment road work will be conducted on various rural and urban roads beginning in late July. Partial lane closures will be in effect during construction. Work is anticipated to be completed by mid-August.

Road surface treatment will occur on:

- Pretty River Road
- 10th Line between Grey Road 13 and 9th Sideroad
- 10th Line between Russell Street and 30th Sideroad
- 30th Sideroad between 10th Line and The Blue Mountains -Meaford Townline
- The Blue Mountains Meaford Townline between Highway 26 and 30th Sideroad
- 33rd Sideroad between Duncan Street and The Blue Mountains -Meaford Townline

Residents are asked to reduce speeds on roads that have recently been treated to help lessen the disturbance of the roadway.

The Town utilizes surface treatment paving on many rural roads with low to medium traffic volumes as a more cost-effective and durable alternative to asphalt concrete paving. The maintenance of surface-treated roads occurs every 5-7 years between May and September. To learn more, visit the Road Maintenance webpage.

What is Tar and Chip?

Tar and chip roads look similar to asphalt concrete roads but have some differences. Both pavement surfaces use asphalt cement bitumen (Tar) and Aggregates (Chip). Asphalt concrete road surfaces are mixed in a central plant and shipped to the road site hot and mixed for paving. This type of paving is cost prohibitive for smaller rural municipalities such as The Blue Mountains. "Tar and Chip" pavement involves evenly applying hot asphalt cement tar onto a roadway, followed by an even layer of angular aggregate stones which is rolled into place. The stones are further compacted and pushed into the asphalt cement tar over time by the traffic on the roadway. As a result for a period of weeks or months following the application of Tar and Chip to a roadway, there is some loose crushed stone on top of the road surface. The road will eventually resemble the asphalt concrete roads in higher traffic areas after a period of time dependent on the heat of summer and the volume of traffic.


What can you expect?

On roads that have been previously treated, one layer of tar and chip will be applied (single surface treatment). Roads which are being newly paved will receive two successive layers of tar and chip (double surface treatment). Town road maintenance staff may sweep the road several weeks or months following the initial application of tar and chip to reduce the loose stone. The brief periods of inconvenience will be followed by a road surface similar to an asphalt concrete road for periods of 5-7 years.

What can you do?

When your road has been recently paved using tar and chip technology, residents are requested to not sweep the road during the period when the chip is loose, as sweeping may result in a poor wearing surface and an unsafe road condition. The most helpful thing you can do is reduce your vehicle's speed. This will help to reduce the disturbance of stone on the roadway to ensure a clean even surface as well as minimizing dust from the road. Be a good neighbour – slow down






