



Ontario Accelerates Second Doses of AstraZeneca COVID-19 Vaccine



The Ontario government, in consultation with the Chief Medical Officer of Health and other health experts, is further accelerating the second dose interval for individuals who received their first dose of an AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine to eight weeks, with informed consent, from 12 weeks.

With informed consent, individuals can choose between a second dose of AstraZeneca or an mRNA vaccine, at an eight to 12-week interval, recognizing that while waiting 12 weeks helps to ultimately provide more protection, some may choose to receive their second dose sooner to have the increased protection provided by a second dose earlier. All of these options provide protection against COVID-19, including the Delta variant, and have been deemed safe.

This decision is based on emerging clinical evidence about the administration of two doses of different vaccines, as supported by the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI). Evidence from multiple studies indicates that mixing of COVID-19 vaccines (receiving an mRNA vaccine after an AstraZeneca vaccine) at dosing intervals between eight and 12 weeks is safe and demonstrates a beneficial immune response. There is evidence that a longer interval between two doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine (such as a 12-week interval) provides higher protection.

Beginning Monday, June 14, 2021 at 8:00 a.m., individuals who received their first dose of the AstraZeneca vaccine will be eligible to book their second dose appointment at an interval of eight weeks or more with informed consent.

Individuals who wish to receive an mRNA vaccine for their second dose can book an appointment through the provincial booking system, through public health units that use their own booking system, or a participating pharmacy. For individuals who wish to receive second dose of the AstraZeneca vaccine, individuals can contact the pharmacy or primary care provider where they received their first dose.

All Ontarians are encouraged to get vaccinated as soon as they can, and to receive their second dose as soon as they are eligible and within the recommended interval to ensure maximum protection against COVID-19.

Owen Sound Runner to Take on 900KM Bruce Trail Record

On June 11, 2021 Owen Sound-based trail runner Steve Kenny will embark on a 900KM journey from Niagara to Tobermory on the Bruce Trail. He will attempt to set a new Bruce Trail Fastest Known Time or FKT. The current FKT record of 9d 17h 2m 25s was set in 2020 by John Harrison Pockler. Steve had the opportunity to run with Pockler during his run, and that experience inspired him to make an attempt himself.

Trail running is different from running on the road. There are unique challenges including roots, rocks, streams, low branches and wild animals. Navigation of the trail itself can be difficult, especially at night.

Typically athletes attempt to run the Bruce Trail southbound from Tobermory to Niagara. Steve will take the opposite approach, starting in Niagara and ending on the Bruce Peninsula. This is considered a tougher run, as elevation and technical difficulty increase as the trail progresses northward. Running the trail in this direction will bring Steve back to home turf when he is nearing the end. Running on familiar trails, seeing friends and family and hearing encouragement will help drive him during the final days and kilometers.

Steve is relatively new to running. In the fall of 2018 he began to train, unsuccessfully, for a 10km run. He realized that some major changes were needed. Having already given up drinking and smoking, he added yoga, meditation, biking and running-specific strengthening to his daily routine, with advice and encouragement from Jade McMeekin, his partner and a Registered Massage Therapist. The true catalyst for change came when he decided to eat a plant-based diet for one week. After 2 days, he knew he was never going back. Within a year Steve had completed his first marathon, ultra trail race and 100KM run. He then set his sights on running The Bruce.

Steve and Jade have launched the website Fear Know Trail for those who would like to follow the adventure. People can track the progress of the run in real time thanks to GPS location services. The website also offers ways to get involved. Steve and Jade encourage everyone to visit the website and find out how they can get involved.

The run will help raise awareness of local food producers and healthy eating. Food is an important component to what Steve does. Food is fuel, and better fuel means he can perform at his best. As a vegan, he requires high quality nutrient dense foods to complete a feat of endurance like this. His plan is to run on average 100km a day which

will require about 6000-8000 calories daily, with stops every few hours for food and water refills and anything else he may need.

Steve and Jade are proud to partner with and raise awareness for Eat Local Grey Bruce. ELGB is a not-for-profit member-owned farm and consumer co-op that provides to-the-door delivery of sustainable, locally-produced foods. Fundraising to support Eat Local Grey Bruce will help

2021 Town Grants and Donations Program

Southern Georgian Bay Association of REALTORS® MLS® home sales reach second best May on record

Residential sales recorded through the MLS® System for the Southern Georgian Bay region totaled 573 units in May 2021. This was up sharply by 80.8% from May 2020. Residential sales haven't hit this level in the month of May in five years.

Home sales were 25.3% above the five-year average and 22.1% above the 10-year average for the month of May.

On a year-to-date basis, home sales totaled a record 2,434 units over the first five months of the year. This was a substantial increase of 81.2% from the same period in 2020.

The Southern Georgian Bay region comprises two distinctive markets.

Home sales in the **Western Region**, which includes Wasaga Beach, Clearview Township, Collingwood, The Blue Mountains, the Municipality of Meaford, and Grey Highlands, numbered 286 units in May 2021. This was up sharply by 97.2% from May 2020.

Home sales in the Western Region were 19.8% above the five-year average and 17.9% above the 10-year average for the month of May.

On a year-to-date basis, home sales in the Western Region numbered a record 1,258 units over the first five months of the year. This was a substantial increase of 98.7% from the same period in 2020.

Meanwhile, home sales in the **Eastern Region**, encompassing the Towns of Midland and Penetanguishene, the Townships of Tay and Tiny, Severn, and Georgian Bay Townships, numbered 287 units in May 2021. This was up sharply by 66.9% from May 2020. Residential sales haven't hit this level in the month of May in five years.

Home sales in the Eastern Region were 31.4% above the five-year average and 26.5% above the 10-year average for the month of May.

On a year-to-date basis, home sales in the Eastern Region numbered a record 1,176 units over the first five months of the year. This was a substantial increase of 65.6% from the same period in 2020.

"Home sales haven't taken their foot off the gas since around June of last year, with this May posting the second highest level in history for the month," said Matthew Lidbetter, President of the Southern Georgian Bay Association of REALTORS®. "There hasn't been much relief on the supply side. New listings have come back stronger than before, but this has only managed to stop inventories from declining further, which have now more or less stabilized at record lows. Market conditions remain historically tight and prices continue their ascent to new highs."

The number of new listings was up sharply by 36.6% from May 2020. There were 829 new residential listings in May 2021.

New listings were 3% below the five-year average and 13.5% below the 10-year average for the month of May.

Active residential listings numbered 658 units on the market at the end of May, a substantial decline of 51.8% from the end of May 2020. Active listings haven't been this low in the month of May in three decades.

Active listings were 48.1% below the five-year average and 69.1% below the 10-year average for the month of May.

Months of inventory numbered 1.1 at the end of May 2021, down from the 4.3 months recorded at the end of May 2020 and below the long-run average of 4.8 months for this time of year. The number of months of inventory is the number of months it would take to sell current inventories at the current rate of sales activity. The dollar value of all home sales in May 2021 was \$511.1 million, more than double the levels from a year earlier, surging 163.2% from the same month in 2020. This was also a new record for the month of May.


Notice of Public Information Centre The Town of The Blue Mountains Schedule B Municipal Class Environmental Assessment for Drinking Water Storage and Pumping Capacity Deficiencies in West Pressure Zones 1, 2 and 3

The Town of The Blue Mountains is undertaking a Municipal Class EA to investigate opportunities to address the Town's Water Storage and Distribution System needs in the West Pressure Zones 1, 2 and 3.

Background: In November 2019, a Water Distribution System Master Plan was completed to evaluate the Town's long-term water distribution and storage needs. As part of the Master Plan, potential near and long-term storage and/or pumping deficiencies were identified in the Town's West Pressure Zones 1, 2, and 3. The purpose of this Schedule B Class EA is to evaluate and select the preferred water storage alternative(s) for these pressure zones.

Current Status: In Phase 2, the study evaluated a number of options to address the issues identified in Phase 1 based on environmental, social, technical, and financial criteria. Based on this evaluation, a preliminary preferred alternative has been identified, which consists of:

- Rehabilitation and recoating the Victoria St. Elevated Tower (Immediate Need)
- Expanding the 10th Line Booster Pumping Station and constructing a transmission main and adding an in-ground reservoir at the 10th Line BPS



Public and agency consultation is a key element of the process and input is being sought on storage alternatives which may have an impact on stakeholders and property owners. Public Consultation: A Virtual Public Open House (PIC 2) is being held to gather input from stakeholders on the preliminary preferred solution. What is being proposed?

The Town of The Blue Mountains Official Plan describes Town Council's policies on how land in the community should be used and helps to ensure that future planning and development will meet the needs of the community. An Official Plan deals with issues such as where housing, employment, agricultural, industrial and commercial uses should be located; what services such as roads, sewers and parks will be needed to support growth; and the way in which parts of the community will grow or be protected.

The Ontario Planning Act requires our Municipality to review the Official Plan every 5 years and it is now time to begin the update. Prior to finalizing the items included in the review, the Planning Act requires that the Municipality hold a public meeting to obtain input on the revisions to the Official Plan that may be required.

This Public Meeting is the first of the statutory meetings to be held for this review and will include an overview presentation by Town Staff. In the future, there will be additional opportunities for the public to review draft documents and to provide comments to Council and Staff including a Public Open House and Second Public Meeting prior to Council considering the adoption of any new proposed changes to the Official Plan.

The Town of The Blue Mountains is looking for public input on the type and scope of revisions to the Plan to be considered as part of the upcoming review. It is our intention that this input will

be obtained through your written and verbal comments & via discussions to occur at a special public council meeting to be held at **5:00pm on July 12th, 2021.**

Also available at that link is the current Town of The Blue Mountains Official Plan.

Public Meeting Information

To help limit the spread of COVID-19, this Public Meeting will be held in a virtual (online) format. Ontario Resumes In-Vehicle Passenger Road Testing Provincewide

Ontario is resuming in-vehicle passenger road tests on Monday, June 14, 2021, at DriveTest centres across the province. To address the backlog of road tests resulting from COVID-19 restrictions, road testing capacity will be increased by hiring 167 additional driver examiners while introducing extended hours for in-vehicle passenger road tests (class G1/G2).

"Throughout the pandemic, our government's top priority has been the health and safety of Ontarians. As more people get vaccinated and COVID-19 case numbers decline, we are able to safely restart passenger road testing at DriveTest centres. We have developed a comprehensive plan to clear the backlog of road tests created as a result of COVID-19 restrictions," said Caroline Mulroney, Minister of Transportation. "Earlier this year, our government started the process of adding new driver examiners at DriveTest locations in every part of the province. We will continue to hire more driver examiners while also extending road testing hours and introducing weekend road testing in areas where the backlog is greatest, so that people who need a road test can book one as soon as possible."

To address the backlog of passenger road tests, Ontario will invest more than \$16 million to increase road testing capacity provincewide by hiring 167 additional temporary driver examiners, increasing support staff, expanding road testing hours, and introducing Saturday and Sunday road tests at locations where the demand is highest.

Driver examiners will be assigned to DriveTest centres across the province. In the Greater Golden Horseshoe, Ontario will work with its service provider, DriveTest, to open six temporary locations to conduct passenger road tests seven days a week in areas where the backlog is greatest starting in September 2021.

Kitten season is upon the south Georgian Bay region, so it is all hands on deck at the Georgian Triangle Humane Society (GTHS). Currently, the organization has over 80 kittens in foster care, not including those housed at the GTHS Animal Centre.

Last year, 218 kittens were cared for by loving foster volunteers until they were old enough to find homes of their own (with a total of 335 kittens taken in by the organization). "This year, the organization expects to surpass the number of kittens fostered in 2020. We are extremely grateful for the dedication and commitment of our volunteers. If it wasn't for their kindness and their willingness to open up their homes to these animals, we would have nowhere for these kittens to go – our Animal Centre just doesn't have the capacity," explained Foster Care Coordinator, Julie Davis. She went on to say, "we rely on donations, both in-kind and monetary, to purchase the food and supplies needed to care for these babies, and are thankful for the support of our wonderful community."

In preparation for an already demanding kitten season, the organization is recruiting new foster volunteers to join the GTHS team.

Foster volunteers provide a safe, loving and temporary home for pregnant or nursing cats and kittens. They are responsible for helping the cat/kittens in their care thrive until they are ready to be adopted. This includes, but is not limited to, feeding the animals at least twice a day, maintaining clean litter boxes and socializing the animals. It may also include bottle feeding (for neo-natal kittens) and administering oral medications. Fostering is a rewarding experience and is an important way to help animals in need in the comfort of your own home. To learn more about fostering, visit the GTHS website. Donations are also being gratefully accepted helping the non-government funded organization provide life-saving supplies to volunteers. Once kittens are old enough to leave the care of their foster homes and find families of their own, they are listed on the adoptions page of the GTHS website. The organization is thankful to their community of adopters as they navigate their virtual adoptions procedure during this time. The demand for adoptable cats and dogs has increased exponentially over the course of the past 15 months. They would like to thank all adopters for their patience and understanding as they continue to follow safety guidelines and offer contactless adoptions. Grey Bruce Health Unit Supports Peel COVID-19 Mass Immunization Clinic



Staff from the Grey Bruce Health Unit assisted at an immunization clinic in Peel on Saturday, June 12, demonstrating the Hockey Hub mass immunization system.

A group of clinical and non-clinic staff from Grey Bruce shared their expertise with staff from Peel at an immunization clinic held at the CAA Centre in Brampton. About 5700 vaccines were administered in one day using the Hockey Hub model.

"I cannot be more proud of every one of our team members, and of every minute we invested." Says Grey Bruce Medical Officer of Health (MOH), Dr. Ian Arra. "Most of what we do in Public Health is seldom immediate and the benefit is usually long-term before we see results. This was different. The joy and sense of fulfillment of volunteering in Peel has been immediate and I believe will be long lasting."

Thanks go out to Dr. Lawrence Loh, the MOH for Peel, for offering the opportunity to collaborate to demonstrate a large scale operation of the Hub in Peel and to support their tremendous effort to manage the pandemic in a hotspot.

Thanks also go out to Bruce Power team for their leadership in supporting Public Health and Peel by fundraising/funding/and setting up all the logistics related to the Peel Hub.

The Hockey Hub model was designed by Grey Bruce's Top Doctor, Dr. Ian Arra, and developed at the Grey Bruce Health Unit. It is an example of the health unit's role as a Centre of Excellence in Rural Public Health. The Hockey Hub model is a streamlined flow-through process designed to administer more vaccines with fewer clinical staff than traditional mass vaccination clinics.


