Resident Parking Pass Update

The resident parking pass program transitioned to a new online registration system for 2024. The new system allows residents to register vehicles directly through the Town website. Vehicle registration can also be completed in person at Town Hall during regular business hours. All property owners and residential tenants in the Town can register vehicles for free. Multiple vehicles, subject to proof of ownership, can be registered per resident. Registered vehicles can park for free at all Town-owned paid parking locations. Photo identification, proof of residency and vehicle registration are required to register a vehicle, whether online or in person.

Residents must register their vehicles for parking on an annual basis. Non-resident parking passes are available to residents of the Municipality of Meaford, Grey Highlands, Clearview Township and the Town of Collingwood at a cost of \$100.00 + HST. To register your vehicle, or to learn more about paid parking in the Town, visit: www. thebluemountains.ca/parking

Parking Pass Hangers Now Available for Purchase at Town Hall

With concerns raised by residents, parking pass hangers are also available for residents of the Town at a cost of \$5.00 per pass, with a maximum of two per household. Registering a vehicle's license plate remains free for residents, with no limit to the number of vehicles a resident can register.

"While registering your vehicles remains free for all residents, we are happy to offer the physical parking passes," says Ryan Gibbons, Director of Community Services. "The physical passes will complement the existing registration system. Residents who have already registered their vehicles do not need to purchase a hanger."

To purchase a parking pass hanger, residents can visit Town Hall Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. with proof of residency and vehicle registration. Lost or misplaced parking passes cannot be replaced. Vehicle license plate registration or parking pass hangers are only required to park for free at the following Town-owned paid parking lots:




The course is similar to last year but the start/finish is near the top of Osler Bluffs ski resort.



For me walking among trees or living with trees on my property, makes me happy and calmer.



The Blue Mountains and **Collingwood Kick Off Collaborative Multi-Use Recreation Feasibility Assessment**

The Town of The Blue Mountains and Town of Collingwood are excited to announce the launch of their Joint Multi-Use Recreation Feasibility Assessment (MURFA), awarding the consulting contract to Colliers Project Leaders.

"This funding will expand specialized staffing, equipment and other services at homes across the province so long-term care residents with complex needs can connect to the care they need, when and where they need it."

Launched in 2022, the Local Priorities Fund invested \$20 million in 2022-23 to help long-term care homes purchase specialized equipment and train staff to provide more specialized care, so more homes can welcome residents who have complex needs but no longer require acute care in hospital. The fund also helped current residents who have new, or increasingly complex medical or specialized equipment needs which could not be previously accommodated in their long-term care home, helping to avoid unnecessary hospital admissions.

"Through the Local Priorities Fund, our government is continuing to ensure that Ontarians, at every stage of life, have access to the care and support they need, when they need it," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "This investment builds on the historic work our government is doing to provide people with the right care, in settings most convenient to them, whether in their community or in their home."

The Local Priorities Fund is part of a broader investment of over \$120 million in 2022-23 and complements the recently launched Equipment and Training Fund, which helps long-term care homes purchase more diagnostic equipment and train staff to better manage and treat residents' conditions that often lead to preventable hospital visits, such as urinary tract infections, falls, pneumonia and congestive heart failure.

Investments to Increase Export Opportunities for Local Agriculture and Food businesses

The governments of Canada and Ontario are investing over \$7 million in approved projects through the Grow Ontario Market Initiative. This Initiative is a five-year, \$12 million program, launched last year through the Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership.

- Up to \$60,000, for Taltis Foods Inc., in Collingwood, to expand African product line in Canada.
- Up to \$34,092, for The Roadrunner Food Company, in Thornbury, to develop and execute product launch plan and digital marketing campaign.
- Up to \$60,000 for Georgian Bay Spirits Co., in Collingwood, to expands its market in Ontario with a new range of ready-todrink ad eco-friendly alcohol products.

"For many generations the agriculture sector has been the lifeblood of this area," says Simcoe-Grey MPP Brian Saunderson. "Our government supports this important sector as entrepreneurs and their ingenuity leverage the natural bounty of the riding and share them throughout Ontario, Canada and beyond."

The Grow Ontario Market Initiative supports primary producers, food processors and industry organizations with cost-share funding to help them undertake market analysis and planning, new product development and marketing. Applicants can receive up to 50 per cent cost share for eligible costs, to a maximum of \$60,000 per business for producers and food and beverage processors, and up to \$125,000 for sector organizations.

"Our government is steadfast in our commitment to the goals set out in our Grow Ontario Strategy – including growing the province's agriculture and food exports by eight per cent annually," said Lisa Thompson, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs. "In its first year, the Grow Ontario Market Initiative is already making a difference for Ontario agriculture and food businesses by helping them to reach for new market opportunities."

It seems that the Castle Glen controversy has spawned an alphabet soup of initials all concerning the Escarpment. Now that we are in "Post Covid Times" many have a passionate interest in saving the Escarpment.



I have here a list of who everyone is and what they are doing. No matter what the political angle is that they are all working from the lofty purpose of their missions can only help to save our natural lands.

NEC: Niagara Escarpment Commission

Set up in 1973 by the Provincial Government to put some planning restraints on the escarpment. Gravel pits were the big problem at the time. It was a widely unpopular with farmers and landowners. Over the years various governments have meddled with it making it a toothless organization.

BMWT: Blue Mountain Watershed Trust

A citizen volunteer group originally formed to cleanup Collingwood Harbour. It expanded into taking care of all the creeks flowing into the harbour. Then with a strong base of supporters it took the fight to protecting wetlands and fighting the Big Quarry at Duntroon.

BRWI: Beaver River Watershed Initiative:

Another volunteer group formed to clear the canoeing route on the Beaver River. Then the focus shifted to improving water quality to enhance the fishing. They mostly work now in the cold-water streams of the watershed. Except for last year when they installed a fish ladder on the Little Beaver River beside the Georgian Trail.

ECA: Escarpment Corridor Alliance

This is the big new group in the neighbourhood. It started out protesting the Castle Glen development which came back to life like a tired zombie. It then adopted the Talisman Ski Resort development issue as part of its mandate. It has a plan to create a corridor of protected land along the high parts of the Escarpment from Blue Mountain Resort through Kolapore and over to the Beaver Valley. It swings a lot of weight in high places – like Queen's Park!

PTLA: Protecting Talisman Land Association

This is a small Kimberley group fighting for other uses of Talisman Resort rather than a housing subdivision. They have hooked up with the ECA to create the corridor concept.

BVST: Beaver Valley Stewardship Tourism

This is a visionary group of Grey County folks who are concerned that the Beaver Valley has been discovered and will come under intense development pressure.

GEO Park:

An ambitious Tourism Plan to promote Georgian Bay area to the World for its rocks and minerals history. This includes the Niagara Escarpment and the 30,000 islands on the far side of the Bay. This organization has created GeoParks around the world.

EBC: Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy

A land trust that is buying up random acreages on the escarpment to keep then natural in perpetuity. Most of the properties are inaccessible but they are starting to do some building and trail repairs on their lands especially in Meaford.

BTF: Bruce Trail Foundation

The famous trail is buying up land that it passes through. This will protect the trail from re-routing as land owner agreements change due to land sales. Ultimately it will own the ideal trail route along the escarpment.

All of these groups are supported by volunteers. (Except the NEC) If you care – Google them and get involved.


Proclamation - CDKL5 Awareness Month 2024

AND WHEREAS, as a result of increased awareness and fundraising by patient led organizations, CDKL5 now has an abundance of research happening around the world.

AND WHEREAS, acknowledgments and proclamations like ours today in the Town of Blue Mountains, contribute to that awareness and provide much needed support for families in Canada.

THEREFORE I, Andrea Matrosovs, Mayor of the Town of The Blue Mountains, do hereby proclaim the month of June as "CDKL5 Awareness Month" in the Town of The Blue Mountains.



Additional 'Blacklegged Tick Established Risk Area' identified in Grey-Bruce

Grey Bruce Public Health encourages residents and visitors to take steps to prevent tick bites while outdoors, particularly in locations where ticks typically live, such as in or near wooded or bushy areas, tall grass, or piles of leaves.

This annual reminder, which follows the return of warmer weather in Grey-Bruce, coincides with the release of Public Health Ontario's 2024 Ontario Blacklegged Tick Established Risk Areas Map, formerly the Ontario Lyme Disease Map: Estimated Risk Areas.

"It's important to stress that these are estimated risk areas only and infective blacklegged ticks can be found pretty much anywhere in Ontario, especially if the habitat is ideal for these poppy-seed-sized arachnids. Because of this, people should take precautions to prevent tick bites whenever they're enjoying the outdoors. Preventing tick bites is the best way to prevent Lyme disease," says GBPH Senior Public Health Manager Andrew Barton.





Lyme disease, a relatively rare vector-borne illness in Canada, is caused by the bacterium B. burgdoferi, which blacklegged ticks can carry. People can get Lyme disease if an infective blacklegged tick bites and then feeds on them long enough to transmit the bacteria – in most cases, this takes at least 24 hours.

Not all blacklegged ticks carry the bacteria and not everyone who is bitten by an infective tick will develop signs and symptoms of Lyme disease.

In 2022, there were 1,490 cases of Lyme disease throughout Ontario, which represents a rate of 9.9 cases per 100,000 people.

Estimated risk areas are calculated as a 20-kilometre radius from the centre of a location where blacklegged ticks were found through drag sampling. The new estimated risk area in Grey-Bruce was established in response to the results of GBPH's 2023 tick surveillance.

The best way to prevent Lyme disease is to avoid tick bites by:

- · Using bug repellent containing DEET or Icaridin;
- · Wearing light-coloured clothing;
- Tucking your shirt into pants, pants into socks, and wearing closedtoe shoes;
- Walking on clear paths;
- Using a sticky roll brush to remove ticks from clothing before getting into the car;
- Showering or bathing shortly after being outdoors; and Checking your full body, children, gear, and pets for ticks.

If bitten by a tick, remove it immediately. Information on how to remove and identify a tick can be found on Health Canada's Lyme Disease webpage

Early Lyme disease symptoms can include fever, headache, muscle/joint pain, fatigue, and a bull's-eye rash. Residents should consult a healthcare provider if experiencing these symptoms.

If caught early, Lyme disease can be effectively treated with antibiotics. Eligibility information for post-exposure prophylaxis to prevent Lyme disease is available here. GBPH follows up with all residents diagnosed with Lyme disease.

Province Introduces New High School Graduation Requirements for a Stronger Ontario Diploma

TORONTO — The Ontario government is modernizing the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) requirements for the first time in 25 years, and launching consultations with parents, job creators, educators and stakeholders on what skills students need to be better prepared for life beyond the classroom through the reintroduction of modernized home economics education.

The province is introducing a suite of reforms to ensure Ontario's diploma embraces the back-to-basics agenda, including:

- A new financial literacy graduation requirement to ensure students exit Ontario's school system with both literacy and practical financial literacy skills.
- Consulting on important life skills and the return of home economics education.
- Ensuring new teachers hold basic competency in math. Teacher applicants to the Ontario College of Teachers must pass the Math Proficiency Test beginning in February 2025.
- For the first time in 13 years, a wholesale revitalization of guidance and career education to support students' understanding of local labour market needs and pathways to good careers.
- Up to \$14 million in 2024-25 to launch career coaching for Grade 9 and 10 students and to explore new opportunities into STEM and skilled trades.
- Return of the student exit survey to benchmark success and garner feedback on the impact of reforms with an emphasis on guidance.
 Ontario will be introducing a new financial literacy assessment

as a graduation requirement to ensure students have the skills and knowledge to create and manage a household budget, save for a home, learn to invest wisely, and protect themselves from financial fraud. Starting in 2025, students will be required to score 70 per cent or higher to meet the financial literacy graduation requirement in their Grade 10 math course. Furthermore, the province will standardize making EQAO Grade 9 Math scores 10 per cent or more of a student's final mark, a practice already used by the majority of teachers.

Students will also benefit from **modernized career education programming** in their schools with more exposure to the skilled trades and priority economic sectors. The government is investing up to \$14 million in 2024-25 for career coaching for Grade 9 and 10 students in the publicly funded education system. In partnership with the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services, this funding will also provide resources and tools to help at-risk youth, individuals in youth justice facilities, and students in other publicly funded educational settings outside of regular classrooms. Through shared agreements with school boards and other existing structures, this career coaching will help young people succeed and become positive members of their communities.

The government is also working with the Ontario College of Teachers to support aspiring guidance counsellors by revising Additional Qualification guidelines. New changes will update guidance counsellor qualifications and impose annual training to deliver meaningful value to students. School boards will be required to provide opportunities for guidance counsellors to keep current on labour market trends and work with local employers to support skilled young people to find career opportunities in the communities where they were raised.

Ontario will begin consultations this fall with parents and experts on what practical life skills students should learn in school to build a strong foundation that sets them up for success. This can include the mandatory inclusion of life skills like nutritious cooking, changing a tire, sewing a button, using first aid, personal responsibility and basic economics, all of which can prove valuable throughout a student's lifespan. This places an emphasis on personal development, decision-making and intrapersonal skills, all of which are in demand by employers across the economy.



St. George's Plant Sale

On Saturday, June 1st, St George's Anglican Church held its annual Giant Plant Sale, with 2,065 donated plants/garden treasures from 51 donors. This was their largest plant sale yet! All plants were donated to the church. The largest donation was from Jean Northover and Joe MacDonald who donated an entire garden of well over 300 plants, and the smallest donation was one beautifully presented hosta from the granddaughter of one of St George's choir members. By comparison, 26 donors donated 1,175 plants for their sale in 2023.

This year's event involved a HUGE volunteer effort from a total of 56 volunteers before and during the sale days - a team of volunteers from St George's, four members of the Ardiel family, members of the 599 Garden Club, and from the broader community. Volunteers dug/transported plants for donors who couldn't; loaned their garden wagons/carts for plant intake and sale purposes; moved and set up 56 tables, 2 tents and signage; organized, watered, cared for and priced all 2065 plants/garden treasures; and ran a modest volunteer appreciation event. On the day of the sale, more volunteers managed the flow of traffic and people; provided gardening advice; and handled the checkout process.

On Saturday, June 1st, thanks to all the buyers, the team sold 1475 plants/garden treasures; by Wednesday after the sale, over 1700 plants/garden treasures were sold. Proceeds from the sale will be used for a variety of initiatives, including:

- Community meals for 30-35 local seniors every 2 weeks
- Funding for Beaver Valley Outreach's programs and services
- Financial support for over 100 locals in need
- Grey Grannies' contributions to support grandchildren in Africa orphaned by AIDS
- Funding for victims of the wars in Ukraine and Gaza Overall, it was a great day!!


The Master Gardener's Corner

JUNE GARDEN TIPS - IT'S SUMMER!

- · Summer is really here! Lots of sun and much needed rain. Get your annuals & veggies planted now. Add a little general-purpose fertilizer and water well.
- Fertilize perennials, roses, shrubs and vegetables using a balanced fertilizer - not the one for your lawn, it has too much nitrogen. Pull back the mulch (that should already be there) from the perennials. Dig the fertilizer in lightly around each plant (or, if you have it, wellrotted manure) and replace the mulch.
- · Start cutting your lawn higher/longer and leave cuttings on the lawn as fertilizer.
- Prune spring blooming shrubs and trees (forsythia, lilac) after they have flowered.
- Prune evergreens and hedges now, not later in the summer.
- · Finish removing all daffodil and tulip flower stems. Leave the leaves to mature and feed the bulb for next year's bloom. Only remove them when brown. Add a little bone meal around bulb clumps to promote bulb growth for next year.
- Stake or cage tomato plants, dahlias, gladiolas, peonies & delphinium plants.
- · Thin vegetable seedlings and plant successive crops. (Plant a second crop as the first is maturing e.g., lettuce, spinach, radishes.)
- Seed flowering cabbage/kale into garden rows for later transplanting.
- · Plant seeds of fast-growing flowers such as cosmos, marigold, calendula, etc.
- If desired, move houseplants outside to a protected area.
- · Deadhead (cut off) faded blooms on plants such as petunia, rose, verbena, etc. This will promote continuous blooms & bushy plants for later in the summer/fall.
- Weed and water garden beds as needed.
- · Add at least 2" mulch to suppress weed growth and hold in moisture.
- · Cut back by a third, late bloomers such as mums and asters. This will make the plants bushier and give them a mounded shape and more blooms in the fall.
- Turn compost regularly and check moisture level, not too wet, not too dry, just right, like Goldilocks.
- Take cuttings of perennials, shrubs, roses, etc. for rooting, for next year.



Capital Gains Planning – New Capital Gains Inclusion Rate

In April, the federal government proposed changes to the capital gains inclusions rate. This change can impact various asset types, including non-registered investments, and real estate.

A capital gain is realized on the sale of investments and real estate when the sale price is above its adjusted cost base (ACB). Inclusion rate refers to what percentage of a gain is taxable.

For individuals, the proposed inclusion rate for capital gains is:

- Up to \$250,000 in capital gains annually: Inclusion rate remains at 50%.
- Over \$250,000 in capital gains annually: Inclusion rate increases to 66.67%.

For corporations and trusts the new rate applies to any capital gain. There's been lots of discussions surrounding realizing capital gains before June 25, 2024 to take advantage of the existing effective tax rate.

Before making any decisions, it's essential to understand how these changes will affect your situation. For liquid investments, a cost-benefit analysis can be done to compare the present net value of selling now or in the future.

If you were already planning to sell an asset, you may consider doing so before June 25, 2024, as long as this aligns with your investment goals and isn't only a tax-driven decision.

Remember, for individuals, the first \$250,000 in capital gains each year remains at the current inclusion rate and the increase will not impact most Canadians. This will also apply for the period of June 25, 2024 to December 31, 2024.

For those in their golden years, and with significant non-registered investments or a second property, care should be taken to evaluate your options as the capital gains could be high if they are realized all

If you are impacted by this change, be sure to talk to your tax and legal advisors and wealth planning team to help ensure you are taking advantage of the relevant opportunities.
