Canada unveils new passport design with state-of-the-art security features

May 10, 2023, Ottawa - The Canadian passport is one of the most powerful and respected travel documents in the world. For some, it is used to reconnect with loved ones, to explore, and have an adventure. For others, it marks the final step in their immigration journey, becoming Canadian citizens and joining a diverse and inclusive society that values democracy, freedom, and human rights.

The Honourable Sean Fraser, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, and the Honourable Karina Gould, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, are proud to unveil the new Canadian passport. The new passport has been redesigned from cover to cover with state-of-the-art security features and new artwork, maintaining its status as one of the most secure and universally accepted travel documents in the world for all Canadians.

The new passport includes state-of-the-art security features designed to keep Canadians' identities safe, such as a polycarbonate data page - a technology similar to Canada's driver's licences. Passport holders' personal information will now be laser engraved instead of being printed with ink, making the data page more durable and resistant to tampering and counterfeiting. Other features include a Kinegram over the main photo, a custom see-through window with a secondary image of the passport holder, a variable laser image, and a temperature sensitive ink feature.

The new passport celebrates Canada's heritage and identity with iconic images of Canada's natural beauty throughout the four seasons. It also includes a new cover design with an outline of a maple leaf—the first significant change in decades. The new passport will start rolling out later this summer. Until then, the current passport remains secure and reliable, so Canadians with valid passports will only need to renew them when they are getting close to their normal renewal date.

The Government of Canada has also been working to offer more online service options for Canadians. Starting later this fall, Canadians will be able to renew their passport, pay their fees, and upload their photograph securely and conveniently online. Quick facts

- The Government of Canada awarded a 14-year contract in 2019 to the Canadian Bank Note Company to design, develop, and deploy the next generation of Canadian passports and travel documents. Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada has worked with the Canadian Bank Note Company for the better part of the last century.
- The Passport Index ranks the Canadian passport fourth globally, offering holders visa-free access or visa on arrival to over 170 countries (as of April 2023).
- The current version of the passport was released in 2013.
- With the new polycarbonate data page, we have imbedded the electronic passport chip in a transparent window on page one to better detect tampering attempts.



Canada is among the first in the Commonwealth to introduce a travel document series with reference to His Majesty King Charles III.

The new passport contains the former Coat of Arms. The design and manufacturing of the new passport is a multi-year process that began well before the new Coat of Arms was approved by His Majesty King Charles III in April 2023.

On March 21, 2023, the new online **Passport Application Status Checker** was launched, allowing Canadians to check the status of their passport application online.

We've redesigned the Canadian passport from cover to cover and added many new security features to help keep your identity safe.

For the new passport, we

- · redesigned the cover
- · updated the visa pages to showcase Canada's natural beauty
- added images of Canada's people, landscapes and wildlife that only appear in ultraviolet light

Depending on when you apply, you may get the new or the old version. However, both versions are secure and reliable, so you don't need to renew early to ensure your passport is accepted as a travel document.

We've added a number of new security features to make your passport more secure, including

- an updated, tamper-proof data page
- metallic foils in the shape of a maple leaf on the covers
- a debossed maple leaf on the back

On the inside of the front cover, we've added colour-shifting ink in the shape of a deer and snowflake, and a visible passport chip and antenna on the opposite page. These features can be used to confirm the validity of your passport and keep your information secure.

We've added a kinegram that changes colours and appears to move when you look at it from different angles. The same page also has a photo of you and your date of birth that appears and disappears depending on how you look at it.

The page with your personal information is now made of polycarbonate, which will last longer, and is less likely to be damaged by water than before. Your personal information is also now laser-engraved, rather than printed in ink on the page.

Restaurants Canada calls on Federal Government to Take Action on the Industry's CEBA Repayment Proposal by May 31

Time is of the essence to address the acute CEBA loan repayment challenges facing restaurants and other small businesses

TORONTO, May 08, 2023 (GLOBE NEWSWIRE) -- Today, Restaurants Canada (RC) is calling on the federal government to adopt its Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) repayment proposal from RC's 2023 Federal Pre-budget Submission. With only a few weeks until the House of Commons rises for the summer on Jun. 23, 2023, and the repayment deadline quickly approaching on Dec. 31, 2023, time is of the essence to address the acute CEBA loan repayment challenges facing restaurants and other small businesses. Bankruptcy filings in foodservice have increased 116 per cent since 2022 and RC is expecting more restaurants to close their doors as a result of the federal government's failure to take action. RC's CEBA recommendations ask parliament to provide struggling small businesses with a 36-month payback extension on CEBA loans, with a scale-down model on the forgivable portion. The effective plan will ensure that taxpayer funds are paid back to the government owed while saving thousands of restaurants and other small businesses from being forced to declare bankruptcy in the near future.

"Thousands of small independent operators in our industry are at breaking point as a result of their CEBA debts. That's why we are calling on the Deputy Prime Minister, Chrystia Freeland to take meaningful action by adopting our CEBA repayment proposal to help ensure their survival," said Olivier Bourbeau, Vice President, Federal & Québec Affairs. "We are nearing our sector's summer high season. However, with half of all foodservice companies currently operating at a loss or just breaking even and 80 per cent making less profit today compared to pre-pandemic (2019), many of our members are weighing their options to either remain open and continue incurring further debt, or close their businesses and file for bankruptcy; a decision on CEBA before the summer season is integral to providing small-businesses with predictability."

For the majority of Canada's foodservice sector, the pandemic created seismic financial challenges which it is still struggling to recover from. In response, the federal government launched the CEBA program, which gave small businesses, including 83 per cent of table service and 56 per cent of quick-service restaurants, and not-for-profits interest-free loans of up to \$60,000. As the repayment deadline approaches, a Restaurants Canada survey has revealed that nearly 20 per cent of the restaurants that have yet to reimburse CEBA will not be able to repay it in part or at all given the state of Canadian foodservice, findings that are unsurprising given;

- Canada's foodservice industry has hit the 100-billion-dollar mark, yet when adjusted for inflation, in comparison to all other Canadian business sectors, restaurants have experienced a 12 per cent drop in economic activity (GDP) from 2019 to 2022; second last to the arts, entertainment and recreation industry which is down by 19 per cent, and;
- nearly every operational cost is on the rise due to inflation; utilities have increased by 6 per cent, proteins have increased by 9 per cent (beef), 11 per cent (seafood), 13 per cent (chicken), and cooking oil (up 40 per cent), as well as rising labour costs, and restaurateurs have been forced to absorb as much as they can to avoid impacting consumer traffic.

"For many restaurateurs, the December 31st repayment deadline is simply impossible to meet - which reflects the state of our industry as a whole. Post-pandemic operational challenges like inflation, labour shortages and supply chain hurdles are further diminishing the profitability of these businesses and lengthening the sector's recovery process entirely," added Bourbeau.

Restaurants Canada looks forward to learning about the government's future plans to address the CEBA loan repayment challenges by May 31st at the latest to ensure that foodservice remains an active part of the nation's economy.



Grey County Meeting Highlights

Grey County Council met on April 27, 2023, in the Council Chamber and virtually on Zoom. The meeting was immediately followed by a session of Committee of the Whole. Recordings of the meetings can be found on Grey County's YouTube Channel.

Committee of the Whole

Dave Shorey, Executive Director of Georgian College Owen Sound Campus and students from the Marine and Nursing programs thanked Grey County Council and staff for their partnership over the past several years and recognized the County's role in helping support the college, including through the recent Health and Wellness wing. The Georgian College Student Association recently recognized Grey County as their Community Partner of the year.

Council received a delegation from Clinical Lead Heather Prescott from the Supportive Outreach Service regarding provincial changes to the Uninsured Persons Program. As of April 1st, medical care for those without insurance or a valid Ontario health cards is no longer covered by the province. This places an undue hardship on the most vulnerable. Ms. Prescott urged Council to contact the Ministry of Health requesting a six-month extension to the program in order to create a new permanent policy to address this issue. Council voted unanimously in favour.

Council received a report from Scott Taylor, Director of Planning, regarding public meetings for subdivision and condominium planning. Though public meetings are not legally required, Council recommended that they be held for new plans of subdivisions and condominiums to improve communication with the public.

Council received an update on the University of Guelph student project, 'Advancing Additional Residential Units in Grey County.' Staff will continue to work on additional residential unit resources for residents and municipalities.

Council approved the 2023 property tax ratios, voting to reduce the tax ratio for the multi-residential property class by 7.65% and maintain all other tax classes. Related by-laws will be drafted for Council's future consideration and approval.

2023 Road Construction Begins in Grey County

The 2023 construction season is here and Grey County is making a number of investments into county roads through construction and resurfacing, bridge rehabilitation and surface repairs.



Planned Projects

Grey Road 2 between Grey Road 31 and Grey Road 19 – Work is scheduled from June 19 to July 21 and will include an overlay and granular shoulder replacement. This project will include alternating lane closures with traffic control.

Grey Road 7 between Grey Road 40 and Sideroad 4, and from 2.8km north of Grey Road 13 to Sideroad 22 – Work is scheduled from May 15 to August 25 for reconstruction. This project will include periodic closures and barricaded and impassable sections of the road, as well as alternating lane closures. Detours will be signed prior to construction. Non-local traffic is asked to avoid the construction area during the project.

Grey Road 18 between Grey Road 11 and Grey Road 29 – Work is scheduled from May 15 to August 25 for reconstruction. This project will include periodic closures and barricaded and impassable sections of the road, as well as alternating lane closures. Detours will be signed prior to construction. Non-local traffic is asked to avoid the construction area during the project.

Grey Road 19 between Grey Road 2 and The Blue Mountains- Clearview Townline – Work is scheduled from June 19 to July 21 and will include an overlay and shoulder replacement. This project will include alternating lane closures with traffic control.

Grey Road 7 between Highway 26 and Muir Street in Meaford—Work will take place between mid-June to early September (dates are being determined and will be shared when they are known) and will include reconstruction, shoulder paving, and storm sewer and watermain infrastructure. This project will include a full road closure from July to September. Detours will be posted along Muir Street and Highway 26.

Grey Road 28 between 14th Street North to the Saugeen River Bridge in Hanover – Work will take place throughout the summer (dates are being determined and will be shared when they are known) and will include reconstruction, paved shoulders, and sidewalk installation, and storm sewer and watermain infrastructure. This project will include a full road closure. Detours will be posted on Grey Road 10 (west side) and Grey Road 3 (east side).

Planned construction timelines are a best estimate. Projects may be impacted by weather conditions and other delays.

Be sure to plan your routes and allow yourself extra time to safely reach your destination if traveling through a planned construction zone. Always pay attention to signage and be extra cautious in areas of active construction when workers are present.

Grey County follows an asset management plan to help determine which road projects to invest in each year. Decisions are based on several of factors, including condition rating and estimated lifespan. A 10-year construction and resurfacing map can be found online at www.grey.ca/roads



What is being proposed?

The Council of The Town of The Blue Mountains is considering options to updating the current Municipal Tree Preservation By-law 2010-68. Planning Staff began the process of reviewing By-law 2010-68 in 2019 with the overall goal to prevent premature tree cutting/removal on larger privately owned properties in advance of a development application. Since that time, staff have conducted an extensive review process that included different methods of engagement.

The draft by-law presented to Council in September 2022 applied to properties that are 0.5ha or larger which are located within the Settlement Area boundary of the Town. In October 2022, the previous term of Council deferred a decision on the by-law due to the municipal election occurring in November 2022.


