Government Providing Ongoing Relief For Businesses and Families During Uncertain Times

As part of its plan to help keep costs down for Ontario families and businesses, the government's 2022 Fall Economic Statement will propose legislation that would, if passed, extend the current gas and fuel tax rate cuts to December 31, 2023.

"At a time when inflation has reached the highest levels in over four decades, we know families are feeling the pressure from rising prices on everything from gas to groceries," said Premier Doug Ford. "To continue providing real relief, our government is proposing to extend the gas tax cut for another year to put more money back in peoples' pockets where it belongs."

The proposed extension of the gas and fuel tax rate cuts for an additional year would save Ontario households \$195 on average between July 1, 2022, and December 31, 2023. This extension follows legislation passed this spring that cut the gas tax by 5.7 cents per litre and the fuel tax by 5.3 cents per litre for six months, from July 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022.

This proposed extension would see the rate of tax on gasoline and fuel (diesel) remain at 9 cents per litre until December 31, 2023. This would save Ontario households \$195 on average between July 1, 2022, and December 31, 2023. The price paid at the pump is made up of the cost of crude oil, wholesale margins, retail margins, federal excise tax, the federal carbon tax, Ontario gasoline/fuel tax and HST.

"By proposing to extend the gas and fuel tax rate cuts our government is helping Ontario families keep more money in their pockets during this time of economic uncertainty," said Minister Bethlenfalvy. "Ontario, like the rest of the world, will continue to face economic challenges in the year ahead. This is why our government's Fall Economic Statement will take a responsible approach to advance our plan to build while also being ready for any challenge that may come our way."

The proposed extension to the gas and fuel tax rate cuts builds on the government's other measures to help keep costs down for families and businesses, including:

- Cutting costs for millions of Ontario vehicle owners by refunding licence plate sticker renewal fees paid since March 2020, and eliminating licence plate renewal fees and plate stickers on a go-forward basis, saving vehicle owners \$120 a year in southern Ontario and \$60 a year in Northern Ontario for passenger and light commercial vehicles.
- Permanently removing tolls on Highways 412 and 418.
- Enhancing the Low-income Individuals and Families Tax (LIFT) Credit to provide claimants of the credit up to \$875 in tax relief, as of 2022.
- Providing additional tax relief for workers, families and seniors through the Seniors' Home Safety Tax Credit, the Ontario Jobs Training Tax Credit, the Ontario Childcare Access and Relief from Expenses (CARE) tax credit, and the new Ontario Seniors Care at Home Tax Credit.
- Delivering both near-term solutions and long-term commitments to build more homes faster to put home ownership within reach for all Ontario families, through the government's housing supply action plans.

2022 Warden's Closing Address - Selwyn 'Buck' Hicks

On December 4th, 2018 – exactly three years, eleven months & six days ago – the members around this horseshoe were sworn into office by her Honour – Justice Morneau. Little did we know that one year later we would be faced with an unprecedented health care challenge that would rock the world. In my 2022 inaugural address, I told you that I wanted us to be remembered, not for what we faced, but for our relentless commitment to achieve results for the people of Grey County in spite of it. That said, I would like to take a moment to reflect on some of our accomplishments over the last year.

In **Long Term Care**, thanks to the redevelopment committee, we made great strides with the Rockwood Redevelopment Project. This included a decision by Council to include assisted living beds in the build. Staff continue to manage outbreaks while protecting residents. We celebrated the opening of the new Nursing Wing at Georgian College which will pump, much needed, home-grown nurses into our health care system. You will recall that Grey County contributed \$1 million to this important initiative to reinforce our long-standing partnership with Georgian College as well as our commitment to addressing the nursing shortage in a meaningful way. We continue to look for ways to support our Long Term Care Staff including vacation & well-being initiatives.

In **Planning**, we kicked off the OPA 11 process with public meetings in February. Council also approved the Age-Friendly Community Strategy and Action Plan.

Turning next to **Climate Action** - Grey County approved its first ever climate change action plan: Going Green in Grey. That, my friends, is cause for applause. Credit goes to our Climate Change Task Force and our Deputy Warden for suggesting creation of that Task Force. We joined the Clean Air Partnership and began planting trees toward our commitment of 1 million trees by 2030. We adopted a Green Fleet Strategy with recommendations for preparing for battery electric vehicle implementation over the next 15 years. Lastly, we commenced naturalization of the Grey County Administration Office property as a positive step forward towards our tree planting goals of Going Green in Grey. It was so much fun to attend that event where young and old worked together to plant trees. My daughter Chloe has claimed several trees that she helped plant as "hers".

In my 2022 inaugural speech, I called for action on **Mental Health & Addictions**. Thanks to you, a Mental Health and Addictions Task Force was formed in February of 2022. The Task Force received a number of community delegations from organizations such as: CMHA, Keystone Youth and Family Services, the Grey/Bruce Poverty Task Force, the Community Drug and Alcohol Strategy, our Public

Health Unit & the Bluewater and Catholic District School Boards. I learned a lot from this committee. I want to thank the members of the task force – especially the Chair, Councilor O'Leary who pushed us to find tangible ways to move the dial on Mental Health & Addictions. I am confident that great things will come from the final report of this Task Force.

Turning to COVID-19. Our Emergency Declaration was terminated on March 14, 2022 – just a few days shy of the 2-year anniversary of the declaration.

Turning next to **Paramedic Services** – our paramedics were heavily involved in the Supportive Outreach Services project - bringing care to the most at-risk individuals in our community. We also completed a 10-year service deployment review.

In **Economic Development**, we co-hosted and organized three regional job fairs throughout the area. We also developed a Foreign Direct Investment strategy. Our Summer Company program for young entrepreneurs and the Starter Company and Digital Main Street program for small businesses were provided through the BEC. We saw a return of the Ag 4.0 technology and agriculture conference. We also saw enhanced Grey Transit Route (GTR) service levels and experienced exceptional increase in ridership (240% increase). Lastly, the Grey Bruce Local Immigration Partnership (GBLIP) celebrated Welcome Week and other community events.

Next, highlighting our **transportation department**, think back to late February 2022. Specifically, the Family Day Weekend where our transportation team was operating through a significant multi-day storm that saw heavy accumulation and several prolonged road closures. We completed seven resurfacing projects on Grey Roads: 2, 31, 13, 15, 10, 8, & 9.

In other areas, we developed a four-year corporate communication strategy to grow and improve Grey County's internal and external communications efforts through to 2026. Grey Roots saw a return to general events and exhibits. Council elected to enhanced 35.5km of CP Rail Trail - improving the surface and making it more enjoyable and accessible to various trail users in southern Grey County. We also approved the updated asset management plan to ensure our \$1.6 Billion in assets are well managed.

Turning now to **Social Services and Housing**. Our Grey County team supported the evacuation of residents following the fire at a rooming house in Hanover. Grey County moved Emergency Shelter services in-house for enhanced efficiency. We implemented the Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care program. Lastly, we purchased a property on 14th Street in Owen Sound for the creation of Supportive Housing. Renovations are underway.

2022/2023 Winter Parking Restrictions & Resident Snow Removal

The Town of The Blue Mountains would like to remind residents that Winter Parking Restrictions come into effect on Tuesday, November 1, 2022. In accordance with the Highway Traffic Act and Town By-law No. 2003-11, overnight parking is prohibited on all Town streets from 2:00 am to 7:00 am. Winter Parking Restrictions will remain in effect until April 1, 2023.

In addition, residents are reminded that Town By-law No. 2014-65 prohibits the deposit of snow or ice onto a Town roadway, including the shoulder, sidewalk, walkway, boulevard, or ditch, without written permission from the Director of Operations.

Residents are also asked to remove items from the roadside including basketball nets, hockey nets, boats and all trailers, landscaping items or any other items that may interfere with snow removal operations.

Winter parking and snow removal restrictions are necessary to help ensure that snow removal operations can be completed safely and effectively. The Town would like to thank all residents for their cooperation throughout the winter season.

Ontario Helping People on Social Assistance Find Jobs Stratford-Bruce Peninsula Consortium announced as Employment Services System Manager

After a multistage competitive process, the Ontario Government announced (link is external) that the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula Employment Services Consortium has been selected as the regional Employment Services system manager (SSM). The announcement came as part of a broader provincial announcement related to Employment Services Transformation.

The Stratford-Bruce Peninsula Employment Services Consortium, which includes Bruce County, Grey County, Huron County, and the City of Stratford (Perth County), will provide funding, support, and oversight for the region's employment services network. The transition to full implementation will occur over the upcoming year, with Bruce County serving as the lead in this Consortium.

Building on the strengths of the existing employment services network, which helps people prepare for and find employment, the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula Employment Services Consortium will foster a collaborative, efficient system to meet the needs of diverse local job seekers and employers. This includes individuals receiving social assistance, individuals with disabilities, youth with higher support needs, and individuals who are new to the region. This new approach will be more responsive to local labour market needs and drive results for job seekers, employers, and communities.

"The opportunity for local employment services leadership represents an exciting milestone for the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula economic region. This will enable us to work closely with local employment service providers and community partners to respond

to the diverse needs of job seekers and employers across the region," said Bruce County Warden Janice Jackson, speaking on behalf of the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula Employment Services Consortium.

The estimated annual budget allocation from the province for employment services for the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula economic region is \$9.8 million, with an estimated client volume of approximately 5,000 individuals.

"In the middle of the greatest labour shortage in a generation which is increasing the cost of living for families, it's all hands on deck," said Monte McNaughton, Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development. "To build a stronger Ontario that works for everyone, we have to help the 800,000 people who rely on social assistance get back on their feet. That is why we are revolutionizing Ontario's employment services, so that anyone who wants to, can find a job they are proud of, earn a bigger paycheque and make their dreams a reality."

System managers selected for the new regions include:

WCG (York), a workforce development leader with a proven history of helping people find work, including working as the system manager in Peel already.

Fedcap (Halton), a global not-for-profit specializing in tailored support for unemployed people, including those with disabilities, including working as the system manager in Hamilton-Niagara already.

The County of Bruce (Stratford-Bruce Peninsula), a municipality with extensive experience leading employment services in the region.

Serco Canada (Kingston-Pembroke), a national organization, specializing in the delivery of innovative programs and case management.

Services for York, Halton, Stratford-Bruce Peninsula, and Kingston-Pembroke will all be underway by Fall 2022. The next phase of the government's expansion is underway with the selection of system managers in Durham, London, Windsor-Sarnia, Kitchener-Waterloo-Barrie, and Ottawa, to be announced in 2023.

The integrated employment services will offer tailored services to jobseekers to help prepare them for good jobs in their communities and help support employers, so they have the skilled workers they need to fill vacancies.

In June, there were over 370,000 jobs in Ontario waiting to be filled.

Employment Ontario is supported through labour market transfer agreements between the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario.
