Provincial And Federal Dental Care Programs

The Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program covers the cost of routine dental services, including check-ups, cleanings, x-rays, fillings, and treatment of gum conditions, for qualifying seniors aged 65 and older who meet income requirements and do not have other forms of dental benefits. Services covered by the OSDCP are provided at Grey Bruce Public Health dental clinics, located in Owen Sound, Walkerton, Markdale, and Wiarton.

Meanwhile, seniors with an adjusted net family income of less than \$90,000 and no dental insurance can also apply for the Canadian Dental Care Plan, which covers the cost of a range of oral health services.

Qualifying patients can receive services covered by the federal program at any private dental clinic that accepts CDCP clients. GBPH clinics do not provide services covered by the CDCP.

Seniors may qualify for assistance under both the federal and provincial programs. For more information about the provincial program, call GBPH's Oral Health team at 519-376-9420 and press 8.

Environmental Sustainability Fund Accepting Applications

The Town of The Blue Mountains is inviting community organizations to apply for the Town's Environmental Sustainability Fund.

This fund has an allocation of \$8,000 that will be split between the successful applications which demonstrate a clear goal of advancing environmental sustainability within the Town. There is a maximum of \$5,000 available for any single project, meaning the fund will have at least \$3,000 remaining for one or more smaller projects if the highest-scoring proposal receives \$5,000. To better support smaller projects, applicants no longer need to cover 80% of the project's value from other sources, with a minimum funding request of \$1,000.

Past recipients have included Georgian Bay Forever, Treetrust TBM, Thornbury Community Gardens, Beaver Valley Community School, Climate Action Now Network, and Beaver River Watershed Initiative. Their projects have included a wide range of project types including education programs, pilot projects, waste diversion initiatives, tree plantings, shoreline cleanups and public events, exemplifying how the Town and community organizations can work alongside one another to foster environmental sustainability and build community connections.

Mediators Appointed To Assist in Negotiations with CUPW

The federal government has appointed mediators to assist Canada Post and the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) as the parties continue to negotiate new collective agreements for both the Urban and RSMC (Rural and Suburban Mail Carriers) bargaining units.

The mediators will assist the parties in the negotiations and support discussions toward reaching negotiated agreements.

The appointment of mediators does not change the negotiations timeline under the Canada Labour Code.

The parties continue to negotiate during a 21-day cooling-off period that ends on November 2. Only after the cooling-off period ends would either party be in a position to initiate a labour disruption (following a minimum notice of 72 hours). This timeline means no labour disruption can occur before November 3.

GBPH Encourages Residents To Get Latest Covid-19 And Flu Vaccines To Safeguard Health This Fall

The cooler, shorter days and changing leaves are hallmarks of autumn, but they also signal the beginning of the annual fall respiratory illness season in Ontario.

Grey Bruce Public Health encourages residents to protect themselves this fall by getting the updated, publicly funded COVID-19 vaccine and this season's flu shot as soon as they become available this month.

"Vaccination remains the best defence against severe complications from COVID-19 and the flu," says Monica Blair, Manager of GBPH's Vaccine Preventable Diseases program.

"The updated COVID-19 vaccine and this season's flu shot can be given at the same appointment – saving you time. These vaccines are safe and effective at safeguarding you and your loved ones from potentially serious respiratory viruses this fall and winter."

The vaccines are initially being distributed to local hospitals, long-term care and retirement homes, and other congregate living settings to prioritize vaccinating patients, staff, and residents of those facilities. Public Health is also providing vaccine to primary care providers and pharmacies to allow for individuals in high-risk and priority populations, who are at greater risk for severe complications from influenza or COVID-19 illness, to be vaccinated.

The general public can receive this season's COVID-19 vaccine and flu shot from their primary care provider or at a participating pharmacy starting Oct. 28, 2024.

GBPH will be holding vaccine clinics in November for children under 12 years of age who are unable to get vaccinated at a pharmacy or via a primary care provider. Appointments will be required and can be made starting in late October by calling 519-376-9420, Option 2.

The Ministry of Health recommends that all adults and children six months of age and older get the updated flu vaccine each fall as the influenza virus changes frequently. The flu shot takes about two weeks to take full effect.

The Ministry of Health also recommends that all individuals six months of age and older receive the KP.2-containing COVID-19 vaccine as soon as it becomes available to them this fall.

Along with getting vaccinated, residents can protect themselves, their family members, and communities from respiratory illnesses by staying home when sick, cleaning hands and disinfecting high-touch surfaces frequently, and practicing coughing and sneezing etiquette.

Individuals unable to get influenza or COVID-19 vaccines through a primary care provider or participating pharmacy can call Grey Bruce Public Health's Vaccine Preventable Diseases Team at 519-376-9420, Option 2, for assistance.

Town of the Blue Mountains Drainage Master Plan Notice of Public Information Centre 3

The Corporation of the Town of The Blue Mountains is undertaking a Drainage Master Plan under the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Master Planning Process to identify existing drainage deficiencies and develop drainage solutions to address the deficiencies, reduce flooding, resolve public safety concerns, and improve maintenance opportunities within the settlement areas of the Town. A Public Information Centre (PIC1) was previously hosted in February 2022 to review the identified drainage deficiencies and elicit input from the public regarding additional observed deficiencies and public preference regarding potential alternative solutions. A second Public Information Center (PIC2) was held in March 2023 to present the preliminary preferred alternative solutions developed to address the drainage deficiencies identified throughout the study area and elicit input from the public regarding the solutions. A third Public Information Centre (PIC3) is planned to advise the public and interested stakeholders of the final preferred solution selected for implementation.

The Study area encompasses the whole Town with the primary focus being the settlement areas including Lora Bay, Thornbury and Clarksburg, Craigleith and Camperdown, and the Blue Mountains Village area. The existing drainage infrastructure in the study area consists of a combination of open channels, ditches, watercourses, culverts, storm sewers, overland flow routes, stormwater management facilities, and low impact development measures.

The Drainage Master Plan is being completed in accordance with Approach #2 of the Master Planning Process outlined in the Municipal Engineers Association Municipal Class Environmental Assessment document (October 2000, amended in 2007, 2011, 2015, and 2023). The Town has retained the consulting firm Tatham Engineering Limited to complete this Drainage Master Plan.

The Town hereby notifies all interested individuals and parties that Public Information Centre 3 will be held virtually and in-person. The PIC3 pre-recorded presentation will be posted to the project website (www.thebluemountains.ca/MasterDrainagePlanEA) on October 8, 2024. Following posting of the Virtual PIC, Town staff and representatives from Tatham Engineering will be hosting an in-person Open House Question and Answer Session on October 29, 2024, between 5:00 and 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall.

Public Meeting – Official Plan Amendment # 23 - Rural Permitted Uses and Development Policies

The Grey County Official Plan was approved by the province on June 6, 2019 and came into effect on June 7, 2019. In working with the existing policy framework, there are some policies in the County's Rural designation which have caused questions. The County is proposing some changes to the County's Rural permitted uses and development policies to clarify these policies via Official Plan Amendment (OPA) # 23. The purpose of OPA 23 would be to clarify the permitted uses and development policies in the County Official Plan's Rural designation. The effect of OPA 23 would be to:

- · Update permitted uses in the Rural designation,
- Change development policies in the Rural designation,
- Update definitions related to the Rural permitted uses, and
- Change one Agricultural development policy which currently conflicts with the Aggregate Resource Area policies.

The above-noted policy changes, if approved, would apply across the County, and are not specific to any one piece of land. No changes are being made to the mapping in the County's Official Plan. OPA 23 does not impact existing planning applications which have already been submitted and are already in process. The County is inviting comments on proposed Official Plan Amendment # 23, either in writing (email / letter) or verbally at our public meeting on November 7, 2024.

GBPH Releases 2024 Report On Food Affordability

Grey Bruce Public Health's latest report on food affordability and food insecurity, released this week, calls attention to the struggles many Grey-Bruce households face to afford basic living expenses – such as adequate food and monthly rent – as incomes and social assistance rates fail to keep pace with rising costs.

The new report, "The Cost of Eating Well & The Urgent Issue of Food Insecurity," is based on local food cost data collected by Public Health in 2024.

The report determined the cost of groceries for a family of four in Grey-Bruce in 2024 was \$289 a week or \$1,250 a month, representing a 1% increase from 2023. A single adult, meanwhile, must spend about \$434 a month on food to meet Canada's Food Guide recommendations, which is also a 1% increase from 2023.

Based on those costs, a family of four on Ontario Works would have to spend nearly half (43%) of their monthly income on food to meet Canada's Food Guide recommendations. After covering only rent and groceries, they would be left with only \$314 a month to cover all other expenses, including utilities, transportation, and medications.

Single individuals on Ontario Works are unable to meet core needs of housing and food as more than 100% of their income is required for housing alone (107%), with nothing left to cover the \$434 needed for food each month.

"The data collected for our annual Cost of Eating Well report clearly shows – as was the case in 2023 – that our social safety net is failing to meet basic, essential needs of housing and food," says Public Health Manager Jason Weppler.

"While the local grocery data indicates a slowing of food inflation compared to previous years, we know many households are continuing to feel the strain of a rising cost of living, including costs related to rent."

For the 2024 Cost of Eating Well report, Grey Bruce Public Health used the Ontario Nutritious Food Basket survey to determine food affordability.

Public Health dietitians collected data on the lowest costs of 61 food items in 12 grocery stores across Grey-Bruce. The items on the survey are based on Canada's Food Guide (vegetables, fruit, whole grain foods, and protein foods) and reflect eating and purchasing patterns of many Canadians. The survey assumes that people have the knowledge, equipment, and skills to prepare food mostly from scratch. Prepared convenience foods or non-food items, such as toiletries, were not included.

The results of the survey are shared in the report through a variety of income scenarios to demonstrate the difficult choices households with different income sources may face.

The report also highlights the serious and lasting impacts of food insecurity and includes steps all levels of government and community partners can take to address the issue.

"Food insecurity is a problem of inadequate income, not solved by food," Weppler says. "Improving the financial circumstances of food insecure households requires action from all levels of government and community leadership. More than half of those experiencing food insecurity are employed. We need to see wages and benefits that reflect the true cost of living along with government interventions that ensure that everyone can meet their basic needs."

Almost one in five of Grey-Bruce households struggle to purchase the food they need and are food insecure. Evidence shows the issue may be worsening. In 2023, 24.5% of Ontario households lived with food insecurity, which is significantly higher than the 16.1% of Ontario households that experienced food insecurity in 2021.

Food insecurity is an important social determinant of health that leads to heightened risks for infectious diseases, injuries, poorer mental health, and chronic diseases. These health impacts result in early mortality and inflated healthcare costs.

South Georgian Bay Tourism Association Announces Cessation of Operations

October 23rd, 2024— It is with deep regret that the volunteer board of directors of the South Georgian Bay Tourism Association (SGBT) announces the cessation of operations for the local not-forprofit organization formerly known as the Georgian Triangle Tourist Association.

For 45 years, SGBT has played a vital role in promoting tourism to support small businesses within the region bounded by Meaford, The Blue Mountains, Collingwood, Clearview, and Wasaga Beach. The association was supported by a committed board of tourism industry leaders and municipal staff representatives, full-time staff and annual funding from regional municipalities. Through its decades of promotional efforts, the association has significantly contributed to building the local tourism economy and the well-being of many small businesses.

For the past three years, SGBT had been working with staff in Collingwood and the Town of The Blue Mountains to establish parameters around implementation of a Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT). The association had anticipated being a key recipient of MAT funding, given its 45-year history as the direct marketing organization for the regional tourism sector.

In January 2024, the five municipalities mentioned above abruptly withdrew their financial support from South Georgian Bay Tourism. Municipal staff members subsequently resigned from their board positions. The SGBT volunteer board of industry representatives chose to continue operations and support local tourism businesses by utilizing reserve funds. Those reserve funds have now been exhausted.

Currently, there are no known municipal resources available to handle public inquiries regarding tourism in the greater South Georgian Bay region.

Additionally, the association is unaware of any actionable local programs to support the hundreds of tourism businesses that relied on the association for promotional assistance.

The SGBT board expresses profound gratitude to all past and present community members, staff, partners, and stakeholders for their support over the years. While the closure of the association is a significant loss for the tourism economy in the region, we remain hopeful that new opportunities for promotion and support will emerge in the future.


