The Blue Mountains receives \$25.3M from the Ontario Government in Infrastructure Funding

On September 23rd Brian Saunderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey announced that the Ontario government is investing \$25,397,523.99 to enable the construction of new homes in the Town of The Blue Mountains. The funding is being delivered through the first round of investments under the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund, which includes \$970 million to help municipalities develop, repair, rehabilitate and expand drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure.

This funding will support Wastewater System Upgrades and Rehabilitation and will enable 2,078 units in the Town of the Blue Mountains.

"Simcoe-Grey is growing, and we know a major piece to responsible and sustainable growth is infrastructure," said MPP Brian Saunderson. This funding will allow the Town of the Blue Mountains to create critical housing for hundreds of families and people who want to make this beautiful part of Ontario home."

The government is also allocating an additional \$250 million and accepting a second round of applications through the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund, bringing the province's total investment in the fund to \$1.2 billion.

"By investing in drinking water and wastewater treatment facilities and connecting pipes to land, we are helping municipalities build more homes," said Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure. "Homes can't be built without connections to drinking water and wastewater."

"I would like to extend gratitude to the Province of Ontario for the generous support through the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund," stated Mayor Andrea Matrosovs. "This funding is critical for completing this important project, which includes upgrades to the Mill Street Sewage Pump Station and the Craigleith Sewage Lift Station. This project will significantly increase our wastewater storage and pumping capacity which will support over 2,000 new housing units. This investment is crucial for meeting the demands of our growing population and ensuring the continued vitality and sustainability of our community."

In this year's budget, Ontario announced more than \$1.8 billion in housing-enabling infrastructure funding through the \$825 million Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund and the \$1 billion Municipal

Housing Infrastructure Program, in addition to funding announced previously through the province's Building Faster Fund. In response to the significant demand for investments in water and wastewater infrastructure to enable the construction of more homes, and after consulting with municipalities, the province is transferring \$275 million from the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program to the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund in order to meet this demand. In addition, the \$120 million from the Building Faster Fund that was reserved for small, rural and northern communities is being flowed to these communities through the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund.

The second intake is now open and will provide an additional \$250 million in funding.

The Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program will support core infrastructure projects that help enable housing, such as roads and water infrastructure.

Investing in key local infrastructure through programs like the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund and the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program is part of the province's capital plan of over \$190 billion to build critical infrastructure and get more homes built faster to support growing communities and lay a strong foundation for future generations.

Temporary Water Outage - Bay Street

Ontario Helping More Women Build Skills and Get Jobs

The Ontario government is investing up to \$8.9 million through the Women's Economic Security Program this year to support 25 local programs across the province that provide career training opportunities for women. The program helps women gain the skills, knowledge, and experience they need to find a job, start a business and achieve financial independence.

The Women's Economic Security Program offers training in four streams: the skilled trades, entrepreneurship, information technology and general employment. To help remove barriers to participating, the training programs also include additional supports such as providing meals throughout the training day, transportation to and from training, and support finding child care.

Through the program, women, including those who have experienced or are at risk of intimate partner violence, can also access wraparound supports, including referrals to mental health and wellbeing supports, counselling, housing, and legal support.

Women interested in the program can visit Ontario.ca/women.

This investment is part of Ontario's four-year action plan to prevent and address gender-based violence. In addition to the province's \$5 million investment in the Women's Economic Security Program, Ontario is providing another \$3.9 million through the bilateral agreement with the federal government on the National Action Plan to End Gender-based Violence.

Organizations funded under the Women's Economic Security Program deliver employment, pre-employment, pre-apprenticeship, and entrepreneurship training to low-income women. The 25 training programs are delivered through partnerships between womencentred organizations, educational institutions, and businesses.

Ontario Exploring Feasibility of New Highway 401 Tunnel Expressway

The Ontario government has launched a technical evaluation for the construction of a new driver and transit tunnel expressway under Highway 401. This expressway is expected to provide a new, faster route for some of the most gridlocked roadways in the province north of the City of Toronto, extending from beyond Brampton and Mississauga in the west to beyond Markham and Scarborough in the east. This project is expected to significantly reduce traffic in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA) while supporting economic growth during construction and in the long-term by helping to get goods and services to market sooner.

"Ontario's gridlock problem is leaving the average Toronto-area commuter stuck in traffic for 98 hours every year, taking up precious time that would be better spent with family, friends and loved ones, and is costing our economy \$11 billion every year in the GTHA alone," said Premier Doug Ford. "Today's announcement is the latest step in our nearly \$100 billion plan to tackle this gridlock by building and expanding highways and transit, including Highway 401, the Bradford Bypass and Highway 413, so we can get people and goods moving across Ontario once more."

Engineering services will be secured through the Ministry of Transportation, with support from Infrastructure Ontario. The feasibility work will include the following:

- Examining various options to increase Highway 401 capacity, including potential routes within the existing right-of-way, number of lanes, length, and the number and design of interchanges connecting to other highways;
- Refining the province's understanding of the proposed tunnel's economic contributions, both in the short- and long-term, as well as the project's impact on reducing gridlock;
- Reviewing best practices from similar projects in other jurisdictions;
- Conducting initial soil boring testing to improve the province's understanding of the route's geology and its impact on design and construction;
- Preparing to start the environmental assessment processes for the project; and
- Conducting an initial market sounding, with feedback informing any potential procurement and commercial structuring strategies.
- Additionally, the province will begin meaningful consultations with First Nations communities about the potential project.

As Ontario continues to grow, there is a clear need to continue building out the province's roads and highways to keep drivers moving and improve economic productivity. Ministry of Transportation modelling confirms that by 2051, travel times on the main stretch of Highway 401 will double with travel time taking 90 minutes longer on the 401 through the GTHA. The ministry's modelling also shows that all of the province's 400-series highways in the GTHA, including Highway 407, will be at or exceed capacity within the next decade. The numbers of hours lost in congestion will more than triple by 2051 if capacity is not added beyond the committed highway and rapid transit projects, adding to the \$11 billion in annual lost productivity the region is already experiencing due to existing congestion.

- Ontario is currently experiencing unprecedented population growth, with more than 500,000 new residents in 2022 and projections forecasting an additional two million by 2031.
- As part of Ontario's nearly \$100 billion plan to tackle gridlock by building and improving highways, roads and transit, the province is building major new highway projects including Highway 413 and the Bradford Bypass, while expanding existing highways, including Highway 401.
- Construction on Highway 413 is set to begin in 2025 and will save drivers travelling the full length of the highway 30 minutes per trip compared to the existing highway options.
- Early works are underway on the Bradford Bypass, which will connect Highway 400 and Highway 404 through York Region and save drivers up to 35 minutes each way.

What is being proposed?

The Council of the Town of The Blue Mountains will be considering a new Draft Official Plan as part of the 5 year Official Plan review. The Town of The Blue Mountains Official Plan describes Town Council's policies on how land in the community should be used and helps to ensure that future planning and development will meet the needs of the community. An Official Plan deals with issues such as where housing, employment, agricultural, industrial and commercial uses should be located; what services such as roads, sewers and parks will be needed to support growth; and the way in which parts of the community will grow or be protected.

The Official Plan 5 year review was completed over two Phases. Phase 1 revisions were previously presented to Council through a similar Public Open House and Public Meeting process in 2022. Phase 2 is now complete and a Draft Official Plan that consolidates the work of Phase 1 and Phase 2 is available in Track Changes and a Clean Version for review and public comment.

The Town of The Blue Mountains is looking for public input on the proposed Draft Official Plan. The Public Open House is an opportunity to ask questions and have general discussions with the Town and its consultants on the proposed revisions. The Public Meeting is held in front of Council to receive your written and verbal comments on the planned changes.

This Public Meeting will be held in-person and virtual (online) format. You are encouraged to provide your comments or questions in writing using email or regular letter mail to the Town Clerk in advance of the Public Meeting. All written comments are circulated to Council for their consideration. Comments received by September 27th will be summarized and read by the Town Clerk at the Meeting.



What is being proposed?

Rogers is proposing a new 90 metre guyed telecommunications tower at the above address to improve wireless coverage and to meet rising demands for wireless service.

The geographic coordinates for the proposed site are as follows: N 44o 27' 48.9'' W -80o 25' 04.9''

The establishment of new telecommunication facilities is under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Federal Government. Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada is the approval authority for telecommunication towers and requires all proponents of new facilities to consult local planning authorities to ensure local protocols and surroundings are considered during the mandated site selection process. The Town of The Blue Mountains Protocol for Establishing Telecommunication Facilities requires public consultation for all new telecommunication facilities.




